Outside wall of the hall is walnut half-logs "put there to stay forever."

Boy Scouts

Although Broadway no longer has a Boy Scout troop, scouting was an active group sponsored by the church for more than fifty years. The program was described in an earlier publication by this statment: "Scouting is another way Broadway served her neighbors, whether on East Broadway or Brownsboro Road."

The more recent troop (Troop 216) chartered in 1954, continued to serve the neighborhood by teaching the ideals and skills that are an integral part of scouting well into the 1970s. The adult leaders who served as scoutmasters during this period included

Bryan McCoy, Russell Shifley, Stanley Mour, Robert Shell, and Donald Clark.


A favorite activity of the troop was hiking. Some of these activities covered historical areas and events and varied in length from nine to fifteen long miles. The Massacre Trail at Middletown, the Wah-la-ha Trail at Frankfort, the Bluegrass Trail at Lexington, the Dry Canteen and Dug Road Trails at the Perryville battlefield site and many others will live in the memories of all the boys who were participants.

Weekend Camporees, usually held in the spring and fall, offered an opportunity for the troop to compete in camping and woodcraft skills against other units in the Seneca district. Week-long summer camping at the Covered Bridge Reservation gave those who attended a special opportunity to win merit badges in aquatics, camping, cooking, and handicrafts. There were winter troop outings in the Adirondack shelters at Covered Bridge that sharpened the skills needed to survive under adverse conditions.

The annual Scout-O-Rama exhibition gave the troop members an opportunity to demonstrate originality and teamwork through such diverse activities as building and firing model rockets and planning and construction pioneer bridges.

Boy Scout Troop 216 become inactive in 1978 when units were organized in other churches in the area.







The Harry S. Frazier, Jr. Scout Reservation, which is the home of Camp Crocked Creek, was opened in 1988 at an initial cost in excess of five million dollars. The 1,100 acre property replaced Camp Covered Bridge, located in western Oldham County, Kentucky on Harrods Creek, which had a history spanning back to the early times of Scouting.

In 1992 the original boy scout camp dining hall was beautifully redecorated into a private residence by Bill Martin, Architect. From the soaring ceilings to the hardwood & Mexican tile floors the quality of the restoration is obvious. The views from every window are wonderful and include the sweeping front lawn, the forest behind and a waterfall Koi pond.
