



January 8, 2009

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on January 8, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station # 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, Joe Wolfe, Jim Graven, John Volkerding, Rick Tonini, Faye Ellerkamp, and Jack Monohan. Also present were Chief Seng, Larry Heaphy, Brendan Montgomery, George Wiggins, Joe Bewley, Dave Dugan, Charles McCune, Nick Clark and Nick Heilmann.

Minutes

The minutes of the December 11, 2008 meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved; Rick Tonini seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for November was \$1,525.87.

After 6 months of the fiscal year the finances are still in excellent shape. The District now has about \$1,169,000 spread between 5 local banks for security. The first major real tax revenue check was received in December and the second large check should be received in January. Through 6 months expenses have run 50.53% of the budgeted amount.

Jim discussed the current interest rates on our CD's and how they will have to be renewed at lower rates in the near future.

Jack Monohan moved to approve the treasurer's report. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief Seng reported the following items:

January 8, 2009, Trustee meeting:

The final contract for the new aerial truck has been signed and returned from Pierce Mfg. Several members of the truck committee will travel to Pierce later this month to finalize the details of our specifications with their engineers.

Unit 2633 is back in service with a rebuilt engine from Clark Diesel. The rebuilt engine includes a 3 year warranty. The final cost of the repair was \$19,874.13.

Firefighter Tom Marshall is off work for several months with a non work related shoulder injury. In order to save overtime Sergeant Charles McCune as been moved to shift work on a temporary basis to fill Tom's vacancy.

All the major communication equipment has been installed on the cell tower at station 2. The new radio equipment for all Metro agencies is expected later this spring.

Enclosed is a letter of thanks from Captain Mike Beneke and the crew of 2658 Platoon 3 for the awards dinner and holiday gift cards.

The 2008 Electrical Code was adopted for Kentucky.

Chief Reckner of Jeffersontown is still involved in a lawsuit with the State concerning the rights for local cities to require home sprinklers.

Jack Monohan moved to send \$1000 to Jeffersontown Fire District to help with legal costs of this lawsuit. Jim Graven seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

January 28, 2009, Ice Storm:

Kentucky's Ice Storm Worse in Aftermath, By S. James Snyder, Monday, Feb. 02, 2009

Life has come to a standstill in Kentucky, and it's difficult to imagine just who in the Bluegrass State had the more miserable Super Bowl weekend. For those half-million residents who were still without power Saturday night (and 200,000 who were also reported to be without water), this past weekend involved shuttling between one of the estimated 172 emergency shelters that have been operating across the state since Wednesday. For utility crews who worked overtime through the weekend — battling subzero conditions Friday and Saturday — the challenge was not just repairing a few downed lines, but instead rebuilding a ravaged utility infrastructure from the ground up.

As for state officials, the weekend involved a rapid reassessment of just how dire the situation had become. Speaking out the day after some local municipalities decried a lack of federal or state emergency relief, Gov. Steve Beshear described the fallout from last week's ice storm as the state's largest-ever natural disaster. He then activated every last member of Kentucky's National Guard, dispatching all 4,600 Guardsman to assist with the statewide crisis. On Sunday, they were going door to door in some areas, to reach stranded citizens. But by Monday, there were still a quarter-million people without power, with scores of residents who had first attempted to ride out the storm now giving up and fleeing to shelters.

Most reports of the chaos have focused solely on the numbers: 700,000 Kentuckians thrown into the dark last Tuesday, nearly 200,000 of those concentrated in Louisville alone, with more than a dozen deaths now being investigated. But behind those statistics, Louisville residents on Sunday — without power for yet a sixth day in a row — described a city struggling to adapt to a new status quo. Fuel shortages and restrictions were common at the busiest gas stations. Along many city streets, entire rows of cars were frozen in place, trapped under fallen tree trunks and branches. Some citizens made use of facilities at the University of Louisville to charge portable electronic devices. Students who had lost power watched the Super Bowl Sunday evening in the Rauch Planetarium. The city's Oxmoor Center may have well been the busiest shopping mall in America this weekend: it became a temporary haven for powerless residents seeking a place to warm up while they window shopped.

Some like Erin Schuster, 28, a doctor living on Louisville's east side, have been forced to impose on friends fortunate enough to still have power, setting up camp in their apartment. Schuster says she went to bed last Monday well aware that a powerful ice storm was bound for Louisville, but she was shocked the next morning by the breadth of the damage. "You heard a lot of cracking, but when I finally made it outside, you realized that it wasn't branches that were breaking but entire trees that were snapping in half" under the weight of the ice.

As trees broke and power lines went down, state officials started to scramble. By Wednesday morning, President Obama had been notified about Kentucky's state of emergency. On Sunday afternoon, Schuster, still without power, was surprised to see that work crews — some apparently dispatched from Alabama — were erecting new utility poles next to the fallen poles that had not yet been cleared away. Neighbors told her that the utility crews reported seeing the same sight on every block — decimated power and communication lines that had to be entirely rebuilt.

Jay Blanton, a spokesman for Gov. Beshear's office said late Saturday night that Kentucky was in the grip of "the biggest natural disaster in the state's history,' and that it was a crisis of not only electricity but of communication. "This is a situation that's awesome in scope. Ninety of 120 counties are declared emergencies, and it's becoming an issue of communication. Communication towers and lines have gone down, whole communication systems have been devastated," which made it difficult to assess conditions and target relief efforts. He also acknowledged that given the breadth of the emergency, some municipalities had been slow in receiving aid. "There's a level of frustration at the local level, and that's completely understandable, but we're currently assessing how best to assess what capacity we need, and how best to move in the equipment that will provide enough electricity."

Perhaps no one in the state was more frustrated than Randell Smith, the emergency management director of Grayson County in western Kentucky, who told the Associated Press Friday that they had yet to receive any aid from either the Federal Emergency Management Agency or the Red Cross. As for the 25 National Guardsman who had arrived in his county, Smith said they did not have any of the equipment needed to clear away fallen trees. "Disgusted" was the word that the mayor of Leitchfield, Ky., William Thomason, used to describe his frustration with state and federal officials.

As for Schuster, who lives in one of the state's most densely populated areas, she says she's not sure when life will return to normal. On Sunday, the traffic lights in her neighborhood were not working (she's seen several drivers fail to stop at intersections) and she had not been to work in a week (she was told by her clinic to remain at home, rather than risk the icy, treacherous drive into work). That's the same message that went out to Louisville's public school students; classes for the remainder of last week were called off by Wednesday morning. Schools were still closed Monday.

Basic communication, meanwhile, has ground to a halt. Schuster says that many of her friends' cell phones don't work, given the ways in which the electrical outages have affected cell towers. Without televisions to rely on, many people are turning to the radio for updates. She's kept in touch with many of her friends via Facebook — "just about anyone who lives in Louisville has updated their status to talk about what they've seen, or to tell people where they're staying." As the week-long waiting game continues, Schuster says it's the small miracles that are still making people smile: "My roommate works at a Dollar Store, and they've moved the microwave up front so people without power can come in, buy frozen meals, and then cook and eat them right there, on the spot."














√ 1 hope everyone survived the snow and ice storm last week. I have a huge mess in my yard at home. Station 1 was on generator power all week while Station 2 never lost power. Please let me know if you have any large limbs or yard waste you may need help with.

Asst. Chief Monohan, Sergeant McCune, John Volkerding and I made the trip to Appleton Wisconsin two weeks ago to order the new aerial ladder. Everything went smoothly and we should see some final drawings of the truck any day now. The delivery date is still set for the end of July.

Firefighter Tom Marshall is still off from work because of his recent shoulder surgery. He should be able to return to work around the end of April or early May.

Major Dave Dugan is out of town on his second week leg of the National Fire Academy, Executive Fire Officer Program. If you remember this is a four year program that puts a very strong emphasis on all aspects of fire department operation. This is a very prestigious program and everyone should be proud that Dave was selected as a participant.

The new fire hydrant for training has been installed by the Louisville Water Company at the rear of Station 1 and is fully functional. We should start getting a lot of use out of it this spring.

Contractors are currently in Station 1 removing the old boiler and associated piping and blowers. They should be finished with this project by the end of the week.

If you still need to make a few purchases at the Westport Road Target Store, it's too late. Target closed its doors on February 7th and won't re-open until the new store is completed, which will be somewhere around 8 months from now. Since they have decided to close, the security Department for Target has donated a lot of video equipment that will complement our current

system. Most of the equipment is outdoor stuff and I plan on using it to give video coverage to our parking lots and employee vehicles.

As usual, the roof at Station 1 is leaking in several places. We have made the usual phone calls and they promise to be out to make the repairs as soon as the weather dries up. If you recall our roof system has a twenty year warranty for leaks and repairs. That current warranty only has 5 years left on it so we may want to start budgeting for a new roof in about five or six years.

The Louisville Fire and Rescue along with all the other Jefferson County Fire Districts were awarded a Federal FEMA AFG grant for the purchase of life saving PASS Devices to be used by firefighters during the event of a fire or an emergency. Since the grant is an 80/20 matching funding source, our portion on the grant will be about \$20,000.00. Most likely this project will not start for several months and our funding will probably not be due until the first of July.

Minutes

The minutes of the January 8, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Rick Tonini moved; Jack Monohan seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for January was \$1,511.19. CRC collections are expected to surpass our projected budget.

After 6 months of the fiscal year, the finances are still in excellent shape. The District has about \$3,098,000 spread among 5 local banks. The district has now received 92.66% of the expected real property tax revenue. Through 7 months, expenses have run 59.27% of the budgeted amount.

Jack Monohan moved to approve the treasurer's report. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

Major Dave Dugan is completing his second week at the National Fire Academy in the Executive Fire Officer Program. This is Dave's second year in the 4 year program that requires 2 weeks of intense study each year.

February 12, 2009, Trustee meeting:

Chief Seng, Stuart Monohan, Charles McCune and John Volkerding went to Appleton, WI to complete the detailed specifications with the Pierce engineers. All specifications are now complete and the final drawings and engineering specs. will be sent to us from Pierce in the coming weeks. Delivery is still promised for July. The committee was very impressed with the Pierce facility.

Firefighter Tom Marshall is still off work on medical leave. He is expected to return in 60-75 days.

The new hydrant at the rear of Station 1 was installed by the Louisville Water Company. It should be ready to use for trainings when the weather warms up.

The old boiler has been removed at Station 1.

The roof at Station 1 has developed several leaks. They will be repaired under warranty when the weather clears up. The warranty has only 5 years left and the roof will probably need to be replaced at that point.

Louisville Fire & Rescue and the other Jefferson County districts have been awarded a FEMA AFG grant to purchase a new life saving tracking device that is mounted on each firefighters SCBA, The grant is 80/20 matching. The District's share will be about \$20,000. The money will probably not be needed until the 2009-2010 budget year.

Campbell's Gourmet Cottage owner charged in fire

Campbell's Gourmet Cottage burned in '06

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The owner of Campbell's Gourmet Cottage, which in 2006 sat across Sherrin Avenue from the Trinity High School football stadium, has been indicted on charges that she set fire to her store to collect an insurance settlement and open in a new location.

Investigators allege that Susan Kay Lukjan wanted the insurance settlement to offset poor business conditions and allow her to move to another location, according to a release from Maj. G. Henry Ott of Louisville Fire & Rescue's arson bureau.

Jefferson County Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Arthur McLaughlin said Lukjan was having financial problems at the time and was in contentious lease negotiations with the Trinity High School Foundation, which owned the building at 127 N. Sherrin Ave.

The dispute was such that, "On game nights, she would have (fans') cars towed" from parking spaces at the store, he said.

On Aug. 19, 2006, firefighters arriving at the store found heavy smoke pouring from the building. The fire destroyed inventory and much of the structure, which was later razed.

McLaughlin said prosecutors have an "overwhelming amount of physical evidence, including videotape" against Lukjan, although he would not say what the video revealed. He said authorities also have data that will show Lukjan was having financial troubles at the time of the fire.

Lukjan, who reopened her store weeks later in the Woodlawn Shopping Center on North Hubbards Lane in St. Matthews, has been charged with second-degree arson, burning personal property to defraud an insurer and fraudulent insurance acts over \$300.

Lukjan has not been arrested but must appear for arraignment

Monday.

Reached at her business yesterday, Lukjan, 45, referred questions to her attorney, Tom Clay.

"She is going to plead not guilty and we are going to contest these charges vigorously," Clay said.

He noted that the investigation has been going on for more than two years and Lukjan has "been here the whole time" and will be in court Monday.

McLaughlin said the case took a long time because it was "heavily" investigated by both the local arson squad and the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

He also said the case was delayed because it was initially presented to the U.S. attorney's office, which declined to prosecute it. McLaughlin would not say why the U.S. attorney would not take the case but said the commonwealth's attorney's office believes it is strong.

Tim Culver, executive director of the Trinity High School Foundation, issued a statement yesterday saying, "As we have done since the incident occurred we will continue to cooperate fully with local authorities and participate in this matter as needed."

In a Sept. 1, 2006, Courier-Journal story, Lukjan said she had been planning to move her business to the Westport Village shopping center before the fire.

According to its Web site the store sells "cookware, bakeware, gadgets, pot racks, butcher blocks, aprons, and even coffee and tea."

In November 2005, Lukjan sued Trinity in Jefferson Circuit Court, asking that the school provide her "unfettered access" to 23 parking spaces around her building.

The lawsuit said that the store had used those spaces for more than 20 years but that Trinity faculty, staff, parents, students and others were using at least 16 of them.

Both Lukjan and the school said the suit was settled amicably out of court.

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Fire officials are confident they have enough evidence to prove the fire that destroyed Campbell's Gourmet Cottage in St. Matthews in August 2006 was intentionally set.

Susan Kay Lukjan, the owner of the business, was indicted Monday on charges of second-degree arson, burning personal property to defraud an insurer and fraudulent insurance acts over \$300. She faces 10 to 20 years for the arson charge and one to five years on each of the fraud charges if convicted.

Maj. Henry Ott, head of the Louisville Fire & Rescue arson squad, and Chief Bill Seng of the St. Matthews Fire Department discussed the case at a press conference yesterday morning at the St. Matthews fire headquarters.

"We think this was strictly a financial problem," Ott said. "Lukjan was having cash flow problems at that time."

She has since relocated the business to Woodlawn Shopping Center on North Hubbards Lane.

Lukjan, who is to be arraigned Monday, will plead not guilty and will fight the charges, said Thomas Clay, her attorney.

"Apparently it's the theory of the arson squad that Ms. Lukjan did this because she didn't have any money," he said.

He said he has proof that Lukjan had an agreement with the Trinity High School Foundation to not pay rent from October 2006 through April 2007 and had plans to relocate the business, taking all of her inventory to the new location. The foundation owned the building at 127 N. Sherrin Lane.

"It just seems inconsistent that she was going to do business there rent-free within a few weeks of when that fire happened, and she had already made plans to move," Clay said.

He said his client, who filed a proof of loss with Ohio Casualty Group for about \$220,000, also has sued the insurance company.

Clay said the arson squad never tried to contact him or his client in the days leading up to the

Seng, who assisted arson investigators in preparing the case, said he felt strongly the fire was intentionally set.

Ott said the fire, which began in the basement, was started using "everyday combustibles." He would not discuss details.

The blaze escalated quickly, pointing to foul play, Seng said. The fire was reported about 5:30 p.m., just 30 minutes after the store closed, but by the time firefighters arrived on the scene shortly after the call, the business was fully engulfed in flames.

"The fire to be that large and big in that short amount of time is not normal," Seng said.

Ott said video surveillance from surrounding businesses, forensics experts and electrical engineers have been used during the lengthy investigation.

This spring we will be participating with the Louisville Water Company and their new fire hydrant maintenance project which pays the fire district money based on the amount of fire hydrants we service. For every fire hydrant we service and paint they will pay us \$10.00 each and for every fire hydrant we just service they will pay us \$7.00 each. The St. Matthews Fire District has about 650 public fire hydrants that we service in our fire district. Based on the smaller dollar amount we should at least expect to see about \$4550 per year from the Louisville Water Company. Every little bit helps! We will need to okay this agreement at Thursday's meeting.

All of the lighting systems at Station 1 and 2 have been changed out with the new high output but lower operating cost light fixtures. They really have made a dramatic difference in the amount of light they put off. We will try to keep some kind of running comparison with previous years to see what kind of cost savings we are experiencing.

Currently there are no major apparatus maintenance problems at this time. The 2000 Chevy Tahoe needed some maintenance performed recently that was completed by the Harrods Creek Fire Department maintenance shop. They have recommended that if we decide to keep the 2000 Chevy Tahoe for an extended period of time that we should consider some other major engine repairs. This car will be recommended for replacement during the next fiscal year.

We are currently training at several donated houses on Westport Road that belong to Walden School. We will utilize these houses until the end of March, when at that time we will finally burn all three of them to the ground. I will e-mail everyone the exact dates of the burns as soon as I get them.

The latest status on Firefighter Tom Marshall is that he is still undergoing physical therapy three days a week and still anticipates returning to active duty around mid to late May.





March 13, 2009, Region's Firefighters Get Lifesaving Security Devices

Friday March 13, 2009—Nation's largest FEMA grant to buy equipment for nearly 1,700 firefighters

The Federal Emergency Management Agency joined Louisville Mayor Jerry Abramson, Congressman John Yarmuth and regional fire chiefs today to announce a \$1.7 grant to 22 fire departments serving Louisville Metro and southern Indiana. The grant will purchase individual security devices for each of the region's nearly 1,700 firefighters, which will vastly improve firefighter safety and agency interoperability during large-scale emergencies.

The award is the largest of its kind in the country and is among the first regional grants FEMA has approved.

"This project will help to protect the safety of our firefighters across Louisville and southern Indiana as they work to protect our citizens," Abramson said. "These security devices will allow us to track and identify each of our firefighters at a scene – a critical component of accountability during emergencies."

"Our firefighters show up to work each day ready to put their lives on the line for our community. They are our heroes, and it's critically important that they have our full support even in tough economic times," Congressman Yarmuth said. "This funding gives Louisville area firefighters state-of-the-art protective and communicative tools that are critical to keeping our community— and themselves— safe."

The \$1.7 million grant will be matched with \$437,000 in local funding to purchase a complete, electronic accountability system and Personal Alert Safety System (PASS) to replace antiquated technology which is more than 15 years old.

"Advances in technology can better protect firefighters as they put their lives on the line to save others," said FEMA Federal Coordinating Officer Kim R. Kadesch. "The funds from this grant will help increase the personal safety and job effectiveness for first responders working in hazardous conditions."

Currently, most fire departments track firefighters at emergency scenes using a manual "dog tag" system. Each firefighter attaches a tag to an accountability board maintained on the fire vehicle. Those boards are collected and maintained on scene at the command post by an accountability officer. During large-scale emergencies involving multiple agencies, precise accountability is difficult as units report on scene and deploy personnel at different times. The "dog tag" system also doesn't allow commanding officers to know exactly where an individual firefighter may be at any time, and there is no immediate notification if a firefighter is injured or incapacitated.

Another complication is reliance on radio communication only during an emergency – interference and background noise may prevent incident commanders from hearing calls for help, and during heavy radio transmissions, not all messages may be transmitted.

The grant will purchase new PASS devices – small, durable plastic transmitters that attach to a firefighter's coat or oxygen tank that transmit identification information to a central tracking computer on site at an emergency.

When a firefighter leaves the fire apparatus, the device is activated and transmits the firefighter's identification to the incident commander, giving the command unit real-time documentation for their entire team. The remote alert devices are designed to send distress or mayday signals if a firefighter activates the alarm or if the firefighter stops moving for a certain number of seconds. Once a distress signal is received, all remote alert devices would receive notification so firefighters can immediately search and rescue a responder in trouble. Remote devices can also receive evacuation messages.

"The PASS devices are the next best thing to having someone over your shoulder," said Louisville Fire Chief Greg Frederick. "Being able to recognize and immediately locate a firefighter in trouble will prevent injuries or even deaths."

Frederick said the accountability system will be purchased and distributed to all participating fire departments by early summer. Every firefighter will receive a PASS. The grant will also purchase laptops and accountability software.

The 22 participating fire departments respond to 55,000 runs each year. Over a three-year period, the total cost of the equipment averages \$13 per run. Participating fire departments include:

Paper carrier Chris Wooldridge was called a "guardian angel" after he rescued two people from their burning home on Monday.

"I saw clouds of white smoke," he said. "At first I thought the church was on fire."

Wooldridge said he could see that smoke was coming from a home in the 700 block of Indian Ridge Road in the Windy Hills subdivision. So, as he'd played out in his mind many times before, he called 911 and sprang into action.

"I banged on the front door, rang the doorbell, got no response," he said. "I ran to the back of the house. The smoke was so thick I couldn't get to the back door."

Inside, homeowner John Jones and his wife, Virginia, had been fast asleep.

"All of a sudden, bang, bang, bang on my front door," he said. "When I opened the door, he grabbed me." Chris Wooldridge Wooldridge said he told Jones his house was on fire and that he needed to get out immediately.

Then, as Jones called for his wife, Wooldridge said he ran back into the smoke-filled home to find her.

"I just put the comforter around her and grabbed her like a football stance and got her out to the porch," he said.

St. Matthews Fire Chief Bill Seng said the fire was pretty intense when firefighters arrived and that the homeowners didn't have any working smoke detectors.

"It probably took us about 30 minutes to get it under control," he said. "Minutes count in a house fire and the results might have been drastically different if he hadn't stopped by." John Jones Wooldridge scoffed at the idea of being called a "hero."

"To me, the heroes are the people who do it every day when they go to work," he said. "They have a chance of putting their life on the line."

He said he would do it all over again if he encountered a similar situation.

"Anybody needing help, I'd give them a helping

hand," he said.

John Jones said he's thankful that Wooldridge stressed the urgency of the situation to him.

"That air was toxic and I wasn't feeling that right away," he said. "I wasn't in a big hurry, but he caused me to be in a big hurry."

Jones said Wooldridge was their "guardian angel."

"I told him: 'If you weren't a hero before, you are now as far as I'm concerned.' Because he is," said Jones.

Fire officials said a faulty light in the couple's kitchen likely sparked the blaze.

April Trustees meeting is this Thursday at 5:30pm.

√We have completely finished training on the three houses on Westport Road that were donated to us by the Walden School. This donation provided our firefighters with very valuable training opportunities that we do not normally get during the course of our regular training schedule. We had several of our firefighters come out with a few bumps and scrapes but overall everyone managed to keep themselves out of harm's way. Congratulations to Captain Mike Richardson and everyone else that were involved in making this huge endeavor a great success.

√The latest information from John Chilko about Denny Engnehl is that he is staying in Florida with his daughter and that he is in a very weak condition, most of the time he is not physically able to talk to John on the phone. His daughter has indicated that he most likely will not be returning back to Louisville. I will keep everyone informed of his progress.

Two weeks ago we had a fairly significant house fire in a home located on Indian Ridge Road. The fire started from a faulty light fixture located in the kitchen ceiling which eventually set the entire attic space on fire. The blaze was under control after several minutes due to the great efforts by all of the firefighters and fire departments (Lyndon and Harrods Creek) involved. The occupants of the home were not even aware the home was on fire until a paper carrier passing by stopped and got them out of the house. His heroic efforts probably saved their lives. We will be honoring this individual (Chris Wooldridge), at the Windy Hills city council meeting on April 13th at 6:30 pm, which is held at the Calvin Presbyterian Church.

The trial dates have been set for Ms. Susan Lukjan, who has been charged with setting the fire at the Campbell's Gourmet Cottage back in the summer of 2006. A pre-trial hearing has been scheduled for 9:00 am on October 19th with an actual trial to be held on January 19, 2010 at 9:30 am. As these dates get a little closer I will remind everyone again just in case you would like to attend.

Early last month "Betsy" the 1931 Seagrave, broke down and lost her get up and go. The Harrods Creek Fire District's maintenance department determined that she had broke and axle. Apparently after talking to several historians that this was about the six or seventh time that this has happened that they are aware of. Republic Diesel has been given the task of finding a replacement axle and making all of the necessary repairs to get her up and running again. Republic said it may be difficult to find a replacement axle because of her age. If a replacement axle cannot be found they will have to make one. I will keep you posted.

Several changes have been made over the last several days as it relates to Hazardous Duty CERS and the way it is calculated. Also, the Kentucky State Incentive Pay has been changed recently as it relates to overtime calculations. The Trustees will need to make a decision soon on how we as a district will proceed when calculating overtime and whether it should be with or without the inclusion of the incentive pay.

✓ We should be hearing something soon, maybe this week or next, from the Jefferson County PVA office about the preliminary assessments for real property for the 2009 – 2010 fiscal year. Once we have these numbers we can move forward on working on an operating budget for next year.

Carrier's mental plan saved couple in Windy Hills fire

Newspaper carrier Chris Wooldridge had often thought about what to do if he came upon an emergency in the middle of the night.

Wooldridge, 43, who delivers The Courier-Journal in the Crossgate and Holiday Manor area off Old Brownsboro Road, had a chance to act March 23, when he came upon a house fire about 1:15 a.m. in Windy Hills.

Now he's being hailed for helping a couple in their 80s escape their burning home on Indian Ridge Road next to Christ Church United Methodist Church.

"We're out when nobody else is out," Wooldridge said.

"He literally probably saved those peoples' lives," St. Matthews Fire Chief Bill Seng said. There was not a working smoke detector in the house, and the occupants "were not even aware there was a fire."

"He's a real hero," said homeowner John Jones, who was in a bedroom with his wife, Virginia, when Wooldridge repeatedly banged on the door. "I'll be forever thankful."

Jones also expressed appreciation to firefighters from the St. Matthews, Lyndon and Harrods Creek departments, who brought the blaze under control about 1:50 a.m.

Windy Hills Mayor Lou Phillips and Seng both say they plan to honor Wooldridge, who grew up in St. Matthews and now lives in New Albany.

The Joneses are staying at a hotel while waiting for their house, which was insured, to be repaired. The fire is thought to have been caused by a faulty light in the kitchen, Seng said. Jones said he had replaced fuses in the basement the night of the fire, but a wall light still hadn't come on.

Wooldridge is just glad he was driving by.

"The Lord put me at the right place at the right time," he said, speaking while visiting his mother, Mary Wooldridge, at her home in St. Matthews.

"He actually cried the second time he called me" to talk about it, "it shook him up so bad," his mother said.

Wooldridge said he was driving on Brownsboro Road near Hubbards Lane on the cold night of the fire to pick up papers at a distribution center in Lyndon when he saw smoke billowing near the church.

He then noticed flames coming through the roof of the Jones house and didn't see any other headlights or activity: "It was just me and the smoke."

He said he immediately dialed 911 to report the fire and then started beating on the front door and ringing the door bell. "I couldn't get any response," he said. "I tried to go to the back door, but the smoke was so thick I couldn't get to the back door."

When John Jones finally came to the door, "I said, 'Sir, your house is on fire,' and I grabbed him,"

Wooldridge said.

Wooldridge said he also helped get Virginia Jones out of the house and went back in to get her slippers and socks when he discovered she was barefoot in the cold before firefighters arrived.

Wooldridge said he followed all the emergency response procedures he had mapped out in his mind. "I stuck to my plan, and everything worked great," he said.

Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

April 9, 2009

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on April 9, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, John Volkerding, Rick Tonini, Faye Ellerkamp, Joe Wolfe, and Jack Monohan. Also present were Chief Seng, Stuart Monohan, Dave Dugan, Matt Board, Derrick Miskell, Ron Renner, Mike Frantz, Greg Crabb, Walter Sales and Michael Monohan.

Minutes

The minutes of the March 12, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved; Rick Tonini seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Chief Bill Seng gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for March was \$846.36.

After 9 months of the fiscal year, the finances are still in good shape. The district has now received 93.04% of the expected revenue. Through 9 months, expenses have run 73.91% of the budgeted amount. It appears that interest income will be below the budgeted amount because of low interest rates on CD's. Tangible goods revenue has been strong and should make up for the interest revenue rate shortfall.

Faye Ellerkamp moved to approve the treasurer's report. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

The live fire-training has been completed on the three houses on Westport Road. Lyndon, Harrods Creek, and McMahan also trained on the houses and it was very beneficial to all personnel involved.

Marshal Denny Engnehl is staying in Florida with family because of his weak condition. It appears that he will not be returning soon.

There was a house fire on Indian Ridge Rd. two weeks ago. We will be honoring Chris Wooldridge who is a paper carrier in the area; Chris found the fire, called 911 and was able to awaken the residents of the house who were unaware of the fire. He will be honored at the Windy Hills city council meeting on April 13th at 6:30 p.m.

The arson case involving Susan Lukjan, the owner of Campbell's Gourmet Cottage, will begin with a pretrial hearing scheduled for 9:00 a.m., October 19^{th.} The trial is scheduled to begin January 19, 2010 at 9:30 a.m.

Our 1931 Seagrave Engine, "Betsy" has a broken drive axle. Because of the engine's age, Republic Diesel is trying to locate a replacement. If one cannot be found, we may have to have a replacement made.

The Jefferson County PVA expects to have preliminary numbers for the 2009-2010 fiscal year in mid April. Once the numbers are received, we can begin work on the budget.

Several changes have been made in Kentucky State law involving the way Kentucky State incentive pay is calculated. For many years, the labor cabinet has ruled that this incentive pay is to be calculated including scheduled overtime. The new law requires that incentive pay is to only be added to unscheduled overtime. The board discussed this issue at length, because by making the change, our firefighters will be receiving a pay cut since the money has been included for over 10 years. John Volkerding suggested that when we begin work on the budget we consider a plan to adjust the firefighter's hourly wage, so no wages are lost. Joe Wolfe also favored this as a way to make sure firefighter wages remain at current levels. No action was taken at this time, but it will be addressed when working on the budget.

Chief Seng requested no expenditures for April 2009.

Old Business

Jack Monohan reported that the Reunion Committee is working on the final plans for this summer's event. Invitations will be sent out in May.

Walter Sales reported that the District's case was not overturned by the Kentucky State Court of Appeals. Walter was surprised by the ruling and still believes the District should submit the case to the Kentucky Supreme Court for consideration. Walter also said his firm has agreed to pick up the tab for submitting the case to the Supreme Court. If they agree to hear the case, it will

cost the District \$20,000 to \$30,000, but the odds of winning at that point would be much greater. The board discussed the issues involving this case at length.

Joe Wolfe moved to submit the case to the Supreme Court for review. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

New Business

Joe Wolfe reported on the upcoming trustee election. The career firefighter's representitive position is up for election this year. Joe will not run for a third term. The firefighters have been informed and have until May 1st to apply to run for election for this seat. Two firefighters have applied to date. The election will be held June 27, 2009 at station 1 from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Joe will oversee the election along with Faye Ellerkamp and Jack Monohan.

In addition, Faye Ellerkamp's term is up for an appointed trustee.

Joe Wolfe moved to submit Faye Ellerkamp's name back to the mayor for reappointment. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Tom Eifler asked the board to move the next meeting to May 7, 2009, to avoid a scheduling conflict. The May 7, 2009 date was approved.

The next board meeting will be May 7, 2009.at 5:30 p.m.

There being no further business, Rick Tonini moved and Joe Wolfe seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion passed unanimously at 6:20 pm.



Fire heavily damages St. Matthews home

An early morning fire heavily damaged a two-story brick and frame home on Eline Avenue, but no one was injured, a spokesman for the St. Matthews Fire Department said.

Public information officer Rick Tonini said there was "major fire showing with flames shooting outside the windows" on the second floor when firefighters arrived shortly after the blaze was reported at 1:27 a.m.

Because firefighters had been told there was a possible rescue, he said, they quickly searched the home and determined that the owner and a woman who rented living space in the basement had both evacuated.

Tonini said the owner of the home said he had been working on the upstairs but added that it was "way too early" to say what caused the fire.

The owner said he did not want to comment early today.

Tonini said four units from the St. Matthews department and one from the McMahan Fire Department responded to the fire at 517 Eline Ave. The fire was under control at 2:04 a.m., a MetroSafe Commuications supervisor said.

The unit from McMahan responded as a "rapid intervention team" to step in had firefighters from St. Matthews gotten into trouble, Tonini said, adding that almost 30 firefighters were involved at the scene.



On May 17th Fire Channel One will become a low priority operation channel for all fire districts in Jefferson County. If the incident is of a medium priority or larger, radio will reassign you to a different operational channel so that you will have a secure channel all by yourself. I have enclosed an informational sheet for your review so that you may have a better understanding of how things will be changing on May 17th. By the way, the reason for the change is for a more efficient operation on all radio channels. Do you believe it?

Minutes of the Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

May 7, 2009

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on May 7, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 5:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, John Volkerding, Rick Tonini, Faye Ellerkamp, Joe Wolfe, Jim Graven, and Jack Monohan. Also present were Chief Seng, Dave Dugan, Tony Glass, Moss Clore, Patrick Montague, Joe Bewley, Sam McCune and Michael Monohan.

<u>Minutes</u>

The minutes of the April 9, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Rick Tonini moved; Jack Monohan seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for April was \$4.13.

After 10 months of the fiscal year, the finances are still in excellent shape. The district has now received 95.054% of the expected revenue. Through 10 months, expenses have run 81.12% of the budgeted amount. Total income should come in very close to the budget even with the down economy. Overall expenses should fall within the budget, but Chief Seng expects overtime to run about 10% over budget.

Rick Tonini moved to approve the treasurer's report. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

2009-2010 Budget

Chief Seng presented a proposed budget for the upcoming 2009-2010 fiscal year. Revenue increases are projected to be lower than in past years due to the economy. The proposed budget included a 2% raise for all employees and in reimbursement for volunteers, \$60,144 for capital projects, \$47,182 in reserve, \$100,000 for apparatus replacement and \$36,000 to continue the physical fitness program. The largest area of added expenses was health insurance and the

CERS retirement payments. The board discussed all of these areas with Chief Seng. After the discussion John Volkerding, moved to approve the budget as presented with a 2% salary increase for all employees and in volunteer reimbursement. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

Marshal Denny Engnehl passed away in Florida while staying with his daughter. The family is not planning a funeral, but may have a short visitation at an undecided date.

Our 1931 Seagrave Engine, "Betsy" had the broken a drive axle repaired, but now is awaiting the starter to be repaired. It should be running again soon.

Firefighter Tom Marshall expects to return to work around June 1.

Captain Larry Heaphy injured the ACL in his knee while doing physical fitness training on duty. The doctors are still trying to determine how long he will be off, but it is expected to be long term. Sergeant Charles McCune will replace Larry on his shift when Tom Marshall returns to work. Overtime will be used to replace Larry until that date.

The fitness training program has now started a new phase with a goal of more weight loss. There will be a monetary prize for the firefighter who loses the most weight.

Four members of the Apparatus Committee will be traveling back to Pierce to inspect the new aerial ladder truck. The truck is expected to be about 90% complete at this time and will be inspected to make sure it is built according to our spec. The final acceptance inspection is projected to be the week of June 8 with delivery to follow once the truck is accepted.

Starting May 17th radio operations in Jefferson County will be changed. Dispatches will remain as always, but all non-priority and single company runs will be on fire 1. Any run that is dispatched as a fire will be assigned to Fire 2, 3 or 4 for operations as needed. This plan is to work out issues before the new Metro Radio System will be implemented.

The Harrods Creek Fire District wants to sponsor a seminar that brings IAFC and the IAFF into Jefferson County to discuss labor relations. This is not an attempt to start a local organization but will be used to start off on the right foot if labor organizations are ever legally recognized by Chapter 75 fire districts. The board discussed this idea with Chief Seng and decided not to participate in the seminar.

May 7, 2009, Trustee meeting:

The WHAS Crusade for Children will be June 2 through 7. The District plans to collect money as always, but will make some major changes in our collection efforts due to man power shortages and far fewer volunteers than when our collection processes began. Many of the other East end districts have been changing as well. The plan is still a work in progress and our collection total is expected to be less this year.

A motion has been filed with the Kentucky Supreme Court to do a discretionary review of our case has been made by Tim Eifler and Walter Sales our attorneys.

ISO has notified the District that they plan to review our operations sometime around mid summer. Chief Seng has asked that this inspection be done in July after the new truck is in service.

Chief Seng asked the board to approve hiring a summer intern again this summer to help with extra work and man the truck during the many vacations. Jack Monohan moved to approve hiring a summer intern. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

The Duncan House has been sold. The District is expected to share in the sale revenues with the Louisville Fire Department and the North Oldham Fire District. The amount and timetable are unknown at this time.

Chief Seng requested the following expenditures for May 2009.

With the new truck's arrival expected in early June, the new tools and equipment for the truck needs to be ordered to coincide with the arrival of the truck so it be put in service. The equipment budget was projected to be \$73,000 and the majority of the equipment is being purchased under Louisville Metro contract pricing. Joe Wolfe moved to approve up to \$69,863.00 for equipment for the new truck. Jim Graven seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Old Business

Jack Monohan reported that the Reunion Committee is working on the final plans for this summer's event.

New Business

Re-deployment of Radio Channels

JEFFERSON COUNTY FIRE DISTRICTS FIRE DISPATCH STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES

Re-deployment of Radio Channels:

 The Jefferson County Fire Districts Fire Dispatch Standard Operating Procedures is modified as followed. This change is effective at 0800 on May 17, 2009.

There will be a 60 day evaluation of this change. Should issue arise, the Best Practices Committee may make adjustments, or even abandonment, as necessary.

Primary Operations Channel:

Fire One (154.250) shall be the Primary Operations Channel.

The Primary Operations Channel shall be used for <u>Low Priority</u> incidents (such as single company response incidents).

Fire districts shall have their radios set on Fire One unless they are directed by Radio to use another Fire Operations Channel. The alert tone ("Sputnik") preceding incident dispatches, will occur only on Fire One.

General communications, such as the reporting of motor vehicle accidents that are "happened upon" by fire units, shall take place on the Primary Operations Channel.

Secondary Operations Channels:

Fire Two (154.370), Fire Three (154.160) and Fire Four (154.400) will be Secondary Operations Channels.

Secondary Operations Channels shall be used for <u>High Priority</u> incidents. Examples of high priority incidents are structure fires, Level II or Level III Hazardous Materials Incidents (this does NOT include mitigations), and alarm sounding incidents. An incident to which three (3) or more companies respond should be considered as a high priority incident.

When radio dispatches a fire district to a high priority incident, radio shall assign the incident to an available Secondary Operations Channel and instruct responding units to use the assigned channel.

Secondary Operations Channels shall be presumed as "secured channels". Unless a unit has been directed by radio to use a secondary channel, units shall not make transmissions on Secondary Operations Channels. (Testing may take place on Secondary Operations Channels when they are not in use at an incident).

Medium Priority Incidents:

The assignment of an operations channel for use at medium priority incidents (such as auto accident rescues) would be a judgment call made at the time of the incident. Radio can assign a medium priority incident to a Secondary Operations Channel upon dispatch or the Incident Commander may request assignment to a Secondary Operations Channel.

Factors to consider are the number of on-going incidents assigned to the Primary Operations Channel, or whether the incident would require numerous radio transmissions.

Request to use a Secondary Operations Channel:

An Incident Commander always has the discretion to request that an incident be assigned to a Secondary Operations Channel, should be anticipate numerous radio transmissions.

Mutual Aid Channel:

The Mutual Aid Channel may continue to be used to obtain times and run numbers from Radio. When this will occur, Radio shall be first requested/directed to switch to the Mutual Aid Channel.

The Mutual Aid Channel will also be available for use at special details as well as landing zone coordination for medical helicopters.

Other:

When units are directed to use a Secondary Operations Channel, a unit *need not* inform Radio on the Primary Operations Channel that it will be switching to the assigned channel.

When a unit has concluded its involvement at an incident to which a Secondary Operations Channel has been assigned, it shall inform Radio on the assigned channel that it is available. The unit shall then resume monitoring the Primary Operations Channel. The unit need not report to radio it is back on the Primary Operations Channel. The apparatus officer has the responsibility to assure the apparatus radio and all associated portable radios have been re-set to the Primary Operations Channel.

Gifts grow despite tough times

Caring and sharing still strong, firefighters, others find

The steadfast commitment of firefighters and numerous others throughout Kentucky and Southern Indiana – giving to and collecting for the WHAS Crusade for Children – paid off again last night for the area's special-needs children.

The 56th annual Crusade raised \$5,289,841, up slightly from last year's \$5,249,094, despite an economy that had Crusade officials bracing for a decrease even as they received 202 requests for aid totaling \$11 million.

"In these tough economic times, people still gave from the heart," said McMahan Fire Chief Paul Barth, the chairman of the Crusade board who participated in his 50th Crusade.

"My heart is warmed by the people in this community who dug deep," said Dawn Lee, the first-year executive director.

The largest contributions from fire departments were Pleasure Ridge Park, \$269,472; Fern Creek, \$231,580; McMahan, \$154,755.30; Highview, \$140,177.69; and Zoneton, \$101,252.

The total from Zoneton, in Bullitt County, represented the first time a department outside Jefferson County reached six figures, Crusade officials said.

Among the largest nonfire department contributors were the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Louisville, \$215,500; LG&E/EON-US, \$167,501; Kroger Stores, \$153,248.67; Norton Healthcare, \$139,167.23; and the Louisville Triple Crown of Running, \$128,880.

"It's such a wonderful community effort where everybody comes together," retired executive director Bud Harbsmeier said, reflecting on the effort before the total was announced.

"Here we've got the lousiest economy we've had in 25 years and \dots there have been so many departments up that you've got to be optimistic."

Participants at the station's Chestnut Street studio ran the gamut of Crusade experience

Five-month-old Alyssa Priddy took part in her first Crusade, sort of, resting on her mother's shoulder.

"She was here last year," her mother, Dana Priddy, said inside the downtown television studio. "I just didn't know I was pregnant yet."

Alyssa's father, Pleasure Ridge Park Fire Sgt. Gerald Priddy, who has collected for more than 30 years, said he's grateful for the good fortune of his children.

"I don't do it because I feel like I have to," he said. "It's just something I want to do. ... There are some people in our district, some of our firefighters' children, who do use the services of the Crusade. You know, it just kind of makes you want to get out there and do it a little bit more."

The Crusade also was the first of sorts for Joseph Kurtz in his second year as Roman Catholic archbishop of Louisville. He was out of the country last year, and retired Archbishop Thomas Kelly

stood in

Before announcing the archdiocese's total, Kurtz said he has quickly realized the Crusade's importance.

"The Crusade is enmeshed into the fabric of our community," he said. "There is nobody that I know who doesn't know about the Crusade for Children. It's an integral part of our parish structure."

Kathy Kerpestein, of Anchorage, took photos of her son, Peter, a 13-year-old with William's syndrome who has benefited from the Crusade, standing in front of a television camera yesterday as the Anchorage Fire Department collections were announced.

She said it was their second year at the studio.

"Last year we made the mistake of planning vacation this week in June, and Peter let us know that he was not pleased," Kerpestein said. "We didn't make that mistake again this year. ... We won't miss it again."

At the other end of the Crusade spectrum was Harbsmeier, who retired as executive director nine years ago, "but I've been coming back every year."

He said he remains involved with the Crusade through the Highview Fire Department, where he is a board member.

Harbsmeier reflected on changes through the years, such as the old tote board that was a "hand-medown" from Churchill Downs that only had enough digits for \$999,999.

This was Harbsmeier's 44th Crusade -- he thinks. Sitting in a chair at the back of the WHAS studio, he spoke with his current successor, Dawn Lee.

"My big question is, 'Do you want to go through a second Crusade,' " he said.

Lee answered enthusiastically in the affirmative, with the realization that "in 10 years, I'll still be the new kid."

Two firefighters overcome in blaze

Morning fire damages 16 units at complex

Two firefighters were overcome by heat exhaustion while fighting a fire that damaged more than a dozen units at the Camden Brookside Apartments off Whipps Mill Road yesterday morning.

One firefighter was taken to University Hospital, and the other was treated at the scene, in the 8200 block of Copper Creek Drive, said Maj. John Stich of the Lyndon Fire Department.

Stich said no other injuries were reported, but eight apartments were severely damaged, displacing an unknown number of residents. Eight other apartments had smoke and water damage, but Stich did not know if any of them were vacant.

He said the cause of the fire is under investigation and the Louisville Fire & Rescue arson squad was called to the scene, which is standard procedure.

When firefighters arrived on the scene, there was heavy fire on the first and second floors, and it quickly spread to the attic, Stich said. Firefighters had trouble dousing the flames with hoses from the ground, so everyone was evacuated from the building and water was sprayed onto the fire from aerial ladders.

The Lyndon, St. Matthews and Middletown departments responded to the fire. Stich said it took about 40 minutes to get the blaze under control.—

More than an hour after the fire began, smoke continued to billow and flames could still be seen coming from the edges of the roof.

Portions of the roof collapsed and the front of the building near an open-air hallway was charred.

Ginny Hobbs lived in a second-floor apartment that was destroyed.

"I was sitting down to read my Bible and I smelled smoke," she said. "I couldn't see the fire, but I heard someone banging on the doors downstairs."

She said a woman who lived in another building saw the fire and alerted other residents to get out of the building. Hobbs said that minutes after she left the building, fire could be seen moving up onto the second floor and into the attic before the entire middle portion of the building was engulfed.

Stich said the fire was reported about 9:05 a.m.

Sorry for the delayed report but I have been under the weather for the last three days!

The 2009 WHAS Crusade for Children is over and we feel as if we had a really successful year! Although the total collection of \$57,122 is down a little from last year we had a great time with all of the Boy Scouts from Our Lady of Lourdes who have been helping us now for the past seven years! Hats off again to Marshal John Volkerding for doing another excellent job of making the whole thing come together!

Currently all of our fire apparatus is working and online as we speak. The annual pump testing started to take place today and should be finished by the end of the week.

The new 2009 Tractor Drawn Pierce Aerial Ladder "2659" is just about ready and should be delivered on Monday June 15th. Assistant Chief Monohan, Major Dugan, Sergeant McCune, and Marshal Volkerding just returned from the plant yesterday making sure all the final details on the truck have been worked out. It should take about two to three weeks of work here at the station to get all of the hand tools and equipment mounted before the truck actually goes into service. Assistant Chief Monohan and myself will be attending the Southeastern Association of Fire Chiefs Conference starting next Wednesday through the following Saturday. While we are gone Major Dave Dugan will be riding as Acting Fire Chief. As always, if you need to get in touch with of any of us we will be accessible by cell phone.

It has been since 1996 when we last had our ISO review. We are currently scheduled to be reviewed on July 15th. The whole process should take about two days to complete. The three main things they look for is personnel, water flow (fire hydrants), and training, all of which we should be in good standing.

The alumni group is still going strong and is meeting about once a month. The current plan is still to hold a public open house at Station One on August 8th from 3pm to 4pm. After the open house is finished, there will be an Alumni Party across the street in the Steepleton parking lot. Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

June 11, 2009

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on June 11, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 5:15 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, John Volkerding, Rick Tonini, Jim Graven, and Jack Monohan. Also present were Chief Seng, Stuart Monohan, Mike Frantz and Greg Crabb.

<u>Minutes</u>

The minutes of the May 7, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved; Rick Tonini seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for May was \$1,414.60. The total includes money from both April and May. Overall CRC revenue is up \$2,230.06 over the budget projection.

After 11 months of the fiscal year, the finances are in excellent shape. The District has now received 96.77% of the expected revenue. Through 11 months, expenses have run 89.26% of the budgeted amount. Our total income should come in close to the budget and overall expenses should fall within the budget.

Our lowest interest rate CD (1%) with Stock Yards bank was cashed in to meet June expenses.

Our tax rate for the 2009-2010 fiscal year will need to be set at the July meeting.

Jack Monohan moved to approve the treasurer's report. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

The annual pump testing for all of the districts engines has been completed with all passing with flying colors.

The summer intern position has been filled by Adam Hanrahan who is a 26 year old volunteer.

Chief Seng and Assistant Chief Monohan will be attending the Southeastern Chiefs Conference June 17th through June 20th. Major Dugan will be acting Chief in their absence.

Faye Ellerkamp has been reappointed to serve on the board by Mayor Jerry Abramson.

Chief Seng has been asked to again serve on the FEMA AFG Grant Review Team in Washington, July 5th through July 9th. While Chief Seng does not take part in reviews of local grants, the District has been very successful in the past 4 years in receiving these grants.

Four members of the apparatus committee were at Pierce to make the final inspection of the new aerial ladder truck. The truck 2659 is expected to be delivered the week of June 15th.

The WHAS Crusade for Children was last week. Crusade Chairman John Volkerding reported that the District turned in \$57,122.00. The new collection plan adopted for this year seemed to achieve its goals of fewer hours on road blocks for firefighters and less overall stress. Our collection effort was in the top 10 of all fire departments collecting.

The District was notified that ISO will arrive at St. Matthews on July 16th to begin their review. The whole process should take about 2 days. No change in the Districts class 2 rating is expected.

The State has donated a \$5000 elliptical exercise machine for use with our fitness program.

The landscaping has been cleaned up and the new yard barn is now complete at station 2.

Captain Heaphy is expected to have his knee surgery on July10th. His return to the work schedule will be determined later. Sergeant McCune will continue to fill his shift position until he returns.

Metro Safe has a September 11th target date to be in full operation with the new equipment. The new center is expected to open soon with the old equipment and the new equipment is scheduled to begin to be installed in equipment all Police, Fire and EMS vehicles soon.

Chief Seng requested no expenditures for June 2009.

Old Business

Jack Monohan reported that the Reunion Committee has finalized of all their plans for the reunion on August 8th. The Fire District will have an open house from 3pm to 4pm the same day.

New Business

Chief Seng reported for Joe Wolfe that the firefighter trustee election will be held June 27, 2009 at Station 1 from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Joe will oversee the election along with Faye Ellerkamp and Jack Monohan.

Assistant Chief Monohan reported that the final delivered price for the new truck 2659 is \$838,157. The final prices included several safety changes and that were made during the construction and engineering process. The District's share of the cost will be about \$488,000, plus the \$69,863 already approved for equipment.

Chief Seng reported that the financing needs to be finalized so the District's share of the bill can be paid after acceptance of the truck. The Kentucky League of Cities has the best rate, which is a 5 year loan at 1.74%.

Jack Monohan moved to approve Resolution # 09-01 to finance the new truck through the Kentucky League of Cities at 1.74% for 5 years. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

The audit for the 2008-2009 fiscal years will need to be completed soon. Chairman Tom Eifler appointed a committee consisting of Rick Tonini, Jim Graven and Chief Seng to make a decision on our next audit.

Chief Seng asked the board to review and approve the contract for the districts exercise program that will run From July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010. The contract was reviewed and jack Monohan moved to approve the contract. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

The next board meeting will be July 16, 2009 at 5:30 p.m.

There being no further business, John Volkerding moved and Rick Tonini seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion passed unanimously at 6:02 pm.

RESOL	UTION NO.	

A RESOLUTION APPROVING A LEASE FOR THE FINANCING OF A PROJECT IN A MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$600,000; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT AND SECURITY OF THE LEASE; CREATING A SINKING FUND; AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF VARIOUS DOCUMENTS RELATED TO SUCH LEASE.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District (the "Lessee") has the power, pursuant to Section 65,940 et seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statutes to enter into lease agreements with or without the option to purchase in order to provide for the use of property for public purposes;

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Lessee (the "Governing Body") has previously determined, and hereby further determines, that the Lessee is in need of the Project, as defined in the Lesse hereinafter described:

WHEREAS, the Governing Body has determined and hereby determines that it is in the best interests of the Lessee that the Lessee and the Kentucky League of Cities Funding Trust (the "Lesser") enter into a Lease Agreement in a principal amount not to exceed \$600,000 (the "Lease") for the leasing by the Lessee from the Lessor of the Project;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF THE ST. MATTHEWS FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals and Authorization. The Lessee hereby approves the Lease Agreement (the "Lease") and all Collateral Documents, as defined in the Lease, each in substantially the form presented to this Governing Body. It is hereby found and determined that the Project identified in the Lease is public property to be used for public purposes. It is further determined that it is necessary and desirable and in the best interests of the Lessee to enter into the Lease for the purposes therein specified, and the execution and delivery of the Lease and all representations, certifications and other matters contained in the Closing Memorandum with respect to the Lease, or as may be required by the Lessor prior to delivery of the Lease, are hereby approved, ratified and confirmed. The Chair, Treasurer and Secretary of the Lessee are hereby authorized to execute the Lease, together with such other agreements or certifications which may be necessary to accomplish the transaction contemplated by the Lease.

Section 2. General Obligation Pledge. Pursuant to the Constitution of the Commonwealth and Chapter 66 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, as amended (the "General Obligation Statutes"), the obligation of the Lessee created by the Lease shall be a full general obligation of the Lessee and, for the prompt payment of the Lease Payments, the full faith, credit and revenue of the Lessee are hereby pledged. During the period the Lease is outstanding, there shall be and there hereby is levied on all the taxable property in the Lessee, in addition to all other taxes, without limitation as to rate, a direct tax annually in an amount sufficient to pay the Lease Payments on the Lease when and as due, it being hereby found and determined that current tax rates are within all applicable limitations. Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the same

officers in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and for the full amount thereof; provided, however, that in each year to the extent that the other taxes of the Lessee are available for the payment of the Lease Payments and are appropriated for such purpose, the amount of such direct tax upon all of the taxable property in the Lessee shall be reduced by the amount of such other taxes so available and appropriated.

There is hereby established with the Lessee a sinking fund (the "Sinking Fund"). The funds derived from said tax levy hereby required or other available taxes shall be placed in the Sinking Fund and, together with interest collected on the same, are irrevocably pledged for the payment of all bonds or obligations issued under the General Obligation Statutes and all Tax Supported Leases, as defined in General Obligation Statutes, including the Lease herein authorized, when and as the same fall due. Amounts shall be transferred from the Sinking Fund to the Lessor at the times and in the amounts required by the Lease.

Section 3. Severability. If any section, paragraph or provision of this Resolution shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Resolution.

Section 4. Sunshine Law. This Governing Body hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the adoption of this Resolution were taken in an open meeting of this Governing Body, and that all deliberations of this governing Body and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with applicable legal requirements.

Section 5. Conflicts. All resolutions, orders or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and the provisions of this Resolution shall prevail and be given effect.

Section 6. Effective Date. This Resolution shall take effect from and after its passage, as provided by law.

BUTLER, WILLIAM SANGER "BILL," 60, died Wednesday, July 8, 2009 after a valiant, sixyear battle with sarcoma.

Bill was born on April 7, 1949, in Louisville. He attended Chenoweth and St. Matthews Elementary schools and graduated in 1967 from Louisville Country Day, where he played varsity basketball and tennis and was a member of Chevalier Literary Society.

Bill majored in French literature and graduated cum laude from Sewanee, the University of the South, where he was a member of Phi Delta Theta, the Black Ribbon Society, the Wellingtons, the Order of the Silver Spoon and the R.L. White Society.

After graduating, he took a position in the publicity department at Churchill Downs. He was working in the press box as Secretariat won the Kentucky Derby in 1973.

Later that year, Bill joined The Courier-Journal's book publishing division, where he helped produce and edit Hugh Haynie: Perspective, a book of Haynie's best editorial cartoons; They're Off, a book about the Kentucky Derby; and Basketball: Dream Game in Kentucky, by Dave Kindred.

In 1974, Bill became an account manager for Dulaney Advertising, then worked for five years at Doe-Anderson advertising agency as an industrial account manager. His clients included the Henry Vogt Machine Company, American Air Filter, Jeffboat/ ACBL, Thomas Industries and Hillerich & Bradsby.

In 1980, Bill founded his own advertising agency, Courier Marketing & Advertising. In 1983, he returned to book publishing, co-founding Harmony House Publishers with Pulitzer-prize winning photographer Bill Strode. Harmony House published over 200 titles, including The Kentucky Governor's Mansion: A Restoration; Keeneland: A Half-Century of Racing; two books by Phyllis George, Kentucky Crafts and Craft in America; Chariots of Iron: Fifty Years of American Armor, Emblems of Southern Valor: The Battle Flags of the Confederacy; and books for over 150 colleges and military academies, through the company's American College Series.

In 1989, Bill and his wife Carol created a new book publishing company called Butler Books, specializing in non-fiction local and regional titles. Over the last 20 years, Butler Books has published hundreds of books and received a number of awards, including the Louisville Historical League's 2009 Founder's Award for publishing books that preserve Louisville history, like Louisville Then and Now and Passing the Torch, by Greater Louisville Inc.; Louisville Landmarks, by Joanne Weeter; The Great Flood of 1937, by Rick Bell; Unearthing the Past: The Archaeology of the Falls of the Ohio River Region, by Don Janzen; Jewish Louisville, by the Jewish Community Federation, as well as commemorative books for dozens of community organizations like the Kentucky Derby Festival, the University of Louisville, the YMCA, the American Printing House for the Blind, Sister Cities International, the Seelbach Hotel, and many schools, churches and clubs. Three Butler Books have won national Independent Publisher Book Awards: Kentucky Houses of Stratton Harmmon (Bronze Medal in Architecture, 2008), Frederick Hart (Silver Medal in Fine Arts, 2008), and Julius Friedman: Images and Ideas (Gold Medal in Fine Arts, 2009).

In addition to serving as publisher and CEO of Butler Books, Bill authored TORNADO: A Look Back at Louisville's Dark Day, and co-authored (with L. Douglas Keeney) Secret Messages, published by Simon & Schuster; Day of Destiny: The Photographs of D-Day and This is Guadalcanal, published by William Morrow; and No Easy Days, Fire in the Sky and Tragedy at Sea, published by Doubleday. He was hired by ReganBooks, a division of Harper Collins, to co-write Business is Combat, by James D. Murphy, and The One Page Proposal, by Pat Riley, and co-wrote Pierre Salinger's John F. Kennedy: Commander in Chief; Chuck Yeager's The Quest for Mach I; and There Once Was a War: The Collected Color Photography of World War III, for Viking Studio Books, a division of Penguin-Putnam. He also helped establish Minerva Books, a publishing partnership with the University of Louisville that is a division of Butler Books.

Bill was beloved and admired by everyone who knew him. He had countless friends, colleagues and authors who were inspired and enriched by his brilliance, his charm and his humor and awed by how much he knew about books, movies, music and history. Everyone who knew Bill will cherish the impact he has had on their lives.

He was also a lifelong athlete. Bill had a passion for motorcycles and raced in enduros and motocross competitions. He played tennis, golf, basketball, baseball and softball. He was a former member and club tennis champion at Harmony Landing Country Club. When his sons were young, he coached their t-ball and soccer teams. Today, he was proud that both have followed him into the book publishing business.

Bill was preceded in death by his parents, Walter Robertson Butt, Jr. and Ruth Sanger Butt. He is survived by his wife Carol, his partner in life and in business; his two sons, Billy (William P.), Vice President of Butler Books, and Eric, a book designer for Harper Collins Publishers in New York; two brothers, Walter R. (Nancy) and Robert B. (Connie) Butler, of Louisville; a stepmother, Lois Jester, of Rancho Palos Verdes, CA; two step-brothers, Lee and Leven (Bethany) Jester, also of CA; two sisters-in-law, Susan Kunk (Jens Kruse), of Wellesley, MA, and Deborah (Jeffrey) Alexander, of Falcon Heights, MN; three nieces, Elizabeth Butler, of Golden, CO, Austin (Alex) Nikolich, of Louisville, and Grace Alexander, of Falcon Heights, MN; four nephews, Jack Butler and Bjorn Kruse, both of Golden, CO; Robert Butler, of Louisville, and Michael Kruse, of St. Petersburg, FL; and five cousins: Patricia Poe, of Ashland, OR; Larry (Suzanne) Amberg, of Austin, TX; Ellen (Kip) Cornett, of Lexington, KY, and Nancy (Mike) Sheehan and Joe (Kathy) Sanger, of Hickman, KY

The Butter family would like to thank all the doctors, nurses and staff members who treated Bill and kept his hope alive at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, TX and at the Brown Cancer Center in Louisville. Special thanks go to Dr. Donald Miller, Bill's first and last oncologist, who always buoyed his spirits and was a good friend, as well as an extraordinary care-giver to Bill throughout his illness.

At his request, Bill will be cremated and buried privately in Cave Hill Cemetery. The Butler family will host a celebration of Bill's life and legacy at The Olmsted, Masonic Home Village, 3701 Frankfort Avenue, Louisville, on Saturday morning, July 25. Visitation will begin at 9 AM, followed by a program at 10 AM.

The District is currently under review by ISO (Insurance Services Office), who is conducting a review of the overall operation of the Fire District. This evaluation process will take about three to four days, with a final report being furnished in about a month. Currently, everything has been going smoothly without any problems. I will copy everyone as soon as the report is released.

√ Unit 2659, the 2009 Peirce Aerial ladder is still about one to two weeks off from being ready to put into service. Most of the equipment has already been purchased and has been mounted on the truck.

Italked with FEMA officials last week during my participation in the Grant Review Process and they advised me that as far as they were concerned they did not care who we sold Unit 2653 to as long as it was not to an emergency service. I then asked if the sale of the truck to an apparatus broker met the scope of the grant and again he said that would not be a problem as long as it was not a fire department or an emergency service.

Currently the only apparatus out of service at this time due to equipment failure is Unit 2631. It is in Lexington at Vehicle Systems having the water tank replaced because of a stress crack that had developed near the top of the tank. The water tank carries a lifetime warranty so this repair will not cost the fire district anything to repair.

✓ Several months back the Board approved an expenditure to purchase a washer and dryer to be used for the washing of uniforms and bed linens instead of having them washed in the large commercial washer where the fire gear is washed. This project is near completion and should be ready in a couple of weeks.

The Alumni Committee is still working on a reunion which has been scheduled for August 8th of this year. Trustee Jack Monohan will be able to give you more details on that event during the meeting. The Fire District has also scheduled to hold an Open House that same day in honor of our 90th anniversary from 3 to 4 pm with the reunion immediately following.

Two firefighters Kent Monohan and Larry Heaphy are out on long term injuries following surgery. Larry Heaphy's surgery was due to an on duty injury which is covered under workman's compensation. Kent Monohan's surgery was elective and is out on sick and vacation time.

The exercise and weight loss program is going great and has been better than expected. Several members have lost over twenty pounds since the program began back in October with a total weight loss for everyone exceeding 200 lbs.

Five members of the department are feeling so fit and in shape they have entered into the 2009 Scott Firefighter Combat Challenge that will be held in Lexington, Kentucky August 14th and 15th. This is a very strenuous course of several different firefighting tasks that is scored on a time basis. If our team does well enough they get to move on in the challenge and hopefully reach the finals. The team members consist of George Wiggins, Joe Bewley, Nick Heilmann, Kevin Moulton, and Michael Monohan. If you get a chance, wish them luck!

Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

July 15, 2009

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on July 15, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, John Volkerding, Rick Tonini, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, Faye Ellerkamp and Jack Monohan. Also present were Chief Seng, Stuart Monohan, Joe Wolfe, Tony Glass, Michael Monohan, Moss Clore, Charles McCune, Patrick Montague and Mike Frantz.

Minutes

The minutes of the June 11, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Rick Tonini moved; Faye Ellerkamp seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Election Results

The Election Committee reported that Sam McCune won the election for firefighter trustee. Chief Seng administered the oath of office to Sam. Tom Eifler congratulated Sam on his election and welcomed him to the Board. Also, Joe Wolfe was thanked for his years of service and presented a Plague.

Rick Tonini moved to keep the same board officers for the 2009-2010 fiscal year. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for June was \$86.77 and we finished the year with \$12,316.83. Overall CRC revenue finished the fiscal year up \$2,316.83 over the budget projection.

The District finished the fiscal year in excellent financial shape. Revenue for the fiscal year was at 97.64% of the budget and expenses were at 96.80% of the budget. The revenue shortfall was primarily from unpaid real property tax and lower than expected interest rates. The largest saving on the expense side was no expenditures were made for apparatus replacement.

The certified PVA numbers have been received. Real property revenue is \$2,996,337.70. This number is \$9,590 below the preliminary PVA estimate.

The audit committee is still completing their work and will report back at the next meeting.

The truck financing with the Kentucky League of Cities was canceled after it was discovered that the attractive interest rate was offset by very high closing costs. After shopping several local banks, it was determined that Commonwealth Bank offered the best rate of 3.65% to finance the balance on the new truck.

The board discussed the financing options and made note to the fact that Chief Seng's wife works for Commonwealth Bank.

Jack Monohan moved to approve financing the new truck with Commonwealth Bank. Sam McCune seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

The FEMA grant money for the new truck has been deposited into the District's accounts.

Jack Monohan moved to approve the treasurer's report. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Tax Rate

Rick Tonini moved to set our tax rate for the 2009-2010 fiscal year at 10 cents per \$100 for all real and personal property and tangible goods. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

The ISO review of the District is in progress. The on-site evaluation process takes about 3-4 days and the full report should be released in about 30 days. We expect to maintain our class 2 rating.

The new truck, 2659, is in the process of having equipment mounted and firefighters are being trained to drive and operate it. We expect to put the truck into service before August 1.

FEMA officials have advised that while 2653 cannot be sold directly to a fire department, it can be sold to a broker.

2631 is at the E-One dealer in Lexington to have its water tank repaired under warranty. The tank has a lifetime warranty.

The SCBA room upgrade, which includes the installation of a washer and dryer for cleaning firefighters bedding and clothing, should be complete by August 1. Captains Kent Monohan and Larry Heaphy are still off work with long-term injuries. Larry's injury was on duty and covered by workers comp. Kent had elective surgery and is using vacation and sick days. Their return to work date is unknown at this time.

The exercise and weight-loss program is going well. District firefighters have lost a total of over 200lbs to date with several losing over 20 lbs each.

Five members of the department are so excited over the new fitness program that they have entered the Scott Firefighter Combat Challenge that will be held in Lexington on August 14 & 15. The members of our team are George Wiggins, Joe Bewely, Nick Heilmann, Kevin Moulton and Michael Monohan.

Metro Safe is now open using the old radio system and still has a target date of September 11 to have the new radios up and running. At this time, no radios have been installed in the fire service so it may be a long shot to meet the target date.

Papa Johns filmed a commercial at Station 1 recently. The firefighters on duty enjoyed the process, which was completed in less than two hours.

The Station 2 commercial lawn mowers are very old and need to be replaced. Money has been budgeted for the new year for their replacement. A committee is being formed to make a recommendation for what type of mowers to purchase at the August board meeting.

Chief Seng requested the following expenditures for July 2009.

Tee shirts and hats for firefighters	\$ 689.75
Vehicle charger for thermal imaging camera	\$ 550.00
Public relations supplies	\$ 973.50
Exhaust hose & drop replacement for 2659	\$1,500.00

Rick Tonini moved to approve all expenses. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Old Business

Jack Monohan reported that the Reunion Committee has finalized all their plans for the reunion on August 8. The Fire District will have an open house from 3pm to 4pm the same day.

New Business

Chief Seng reported that Metro EMS has created a new Delta response plan for fire districts to be dispatched on first responder runs using the Echo response. Metro EMS believes that under the Echo response plan there are runs where the District is needed and not dispatched. They have promised the new plan will cut back on all the unnecessary runs the fire districts were dispatched on in the past. They have asked each district to try the new plan for 30 days. Because Metro Safe has a 30 day freeze on changes in response, the district cannot begin the trial period until late August. Chief Seng and the board discussed the pros and cons of the plan. Chief Seng is going to research how the new plan is working with several other departments that have begun their trial period and report back at the August meeting with a recommendation.

Chairman Tom Eifler reviewed and distributed to the board information on Kentucky's Open Record Laws and Open Meeting Laws and how it relates to board activities and also information on Managing Government Records.

Chief Seng explained the change in the CERS law. Under the change, fire district's and cities have the option to enroll new employees in the hazardous or non-hazardous retirement plans.

Jack Monohan moved to pass a resolution to enroll all firefighters in the hazardous duty retirement plan as in the past. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Executive Session

Rick Tonini moved to go into executive session for a Personnel matter at 6:40 p.m. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

The board returned from executive session at 6:45 p.m.

Tom Eifler reported that the board decided to take no action as a result of the Executive Session.

The next board meeting will be August 13, 2009 at 5:30 p.m.

There being no further business, Rick Tonini moved and John Volkerding seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion passed unanimously at 6:46 p.m.

Resolution

Resolution of Agency Transferring From Non-Hazardous to Hazardous Coverage As Defined by KRS 61.592 (1) (b)

WHEREAS, St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees is requesting that the KRS Board of Trustees approve hazardous duty coverage for positions in the St. Matthews Fire Protection District department(s) for employees who begin participating in the County Employees Retirement System on or after September 1, 2008.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees as follows:

- (A) That effective 12-1-2009 all employees working under hazardous duty positions of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District department(s) will transfer from the existing nonhazardous coverage in the County Employees Retirement System to hazardous duty coverage within the same County Employees Retirement System.
- (B) Contributions to be paid are as follows:
 - 32.97% (current rate) of employee's gross wages to be paid by the employer (may be changed by the Board of Trustees of the Kentucky Retirement Systems).
 - 2) 9% (current rate) of employee' gross wages to be paid by the employee who has a participation date on or after September 1, 2008 (may be changed by the Kentucky General Assembly).

FURTHUR BE IT RESOLVED, that the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees will comply with all the statutory requirements to make the County Employees Retirement System hazardous duty coverage available for all eligible employees who are working under approved positions within the St. Matthews Fire Protection District department(s).

Light Duty

In cases of employee illness or injury not covered by workmen's compensation that require long term recovery, the Fire District shall offer the hazardous duty employee a light duty assignment once all of the following conditions are met.

- The employee has exhausted all of their accumulated sick leave and vacation time.
- The Fire Districts Occupationa Physician, having knowledge of NFPA 1582 Medical Requirements For Firefighters - 1992, has certified that the condition is temporary and that he/she has a reasonable expectation that the employee will be able to return to full duty within one year.
- The Fire Districts Occupational Physician, having been provided in writing a
 description of the light duty assignment, has provided a written release to the light
 duty assignment.

Light duty jobs may include any duty from clerical to apparatus maintenance depending upon the departments needs and tailored to the employees' abilities. The work schedule shall be Monday - Friday 8AM to 5PM. No fire ground duties shall at any time be associated with light duty assignments.

Light duty assignments shall not exceed six (6) months in duration and total time off of full duty shall not exceed one (1) year. This benefit is only available to hazardous duty employees, civilian & part time employees are excluded.

The St. Matthews Fire Protection District has a new \$860,000 fire truck that was paid for with help from a \$346,500 federal grant.

The new "tractor-drawn" truck, whose rear wheels are steered by a separate driver, arrived about a month ago and is still being readied for use, St. Matthews Fire Chief Bill Seng said. It has a 100-foot long aerial ladder that could be used at Norton Suburan and Baptist East hospitals and the Professional Towers building at 4010 DuPont Circle.

The new truck will replace a 22-year-old one that likely will be sold on eBay, possibly to a collector, he said. Federal restrictions prohibit sales of old trucks to other emergency operations, to prevent them from applying for replacement grants, Seng said.

The new truck will be on display when past and present members of the St. Matthews fire department, whose main station is at 240 Sears Ave., celebrate the department's 90th anniversary Aug. 8.

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on August 13, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, John Volkerding, Rick Tonini, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, Faye Ellerkamp and Jack Monohan. Also present were Chief Seng, Stuart Monohan, Dave Dugan, Mike Frantz, Michael Monohan, Greg Crabb, Dan Doyle, Louis Stoke, Mike Richardson and Nick Clark.

Tom Eifler congratulated Mike Richardson for being named as the Kiwanis Club St. Matthews Firefighter of the Year.

Minutes

The minutes of the July 15, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved; Faye Ellerkamp seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for July was \$1,976.26.

The District ended July, the first month of the fiscal year, in good shape with total expenses of 7.97% of the budget. The only area of the budget out of line on expenses was overtime. Chief Seng told the board that the cause for the overtime spike was a combination of 3 firefighters off on medical issues and the summer vacation period.

The District cashed in CD's with Wilson & Muir and First Capital Bank to meet current expenses. These CD's had the lowest interest rates.

Chief Seng reported that the final numbers from the PVA estimate that our tangible goods income will be below our budgeted amount. The board discussed the issue and will make adjustment to the budget later if necessary.

Al Ring appointed the Districts Official Historian.

The audit committee reported that they had 5 proposals to do the 2009-2010 audit.

Chief Seng thanks the firefighters for all of their hard work preparing the station for the open house. It has never looked better. Jack Monohan reported that the Alumni Association was very happy with the turnout and would be meeting soon to discuss future plans.

The new truck 2659 is now in service. 2653 can be declared surplus and sold. The board discussed the options on selling 2653, including selling it on EBay. There were several questions about just what FEMA would allow us to do with the truck. Chief Seng will check with FEMA and report back at the September meeting. The matter was tabled.

Kent Monohan, Larry Heaphy, and Ron Renner remain off duty for medical issues. Kent Monohan may be able to return to work in late August. Charles McCune and Dave Dugan are still filling in for them on their shifts.

Major Dugan and Chief Seng will be attending the IAFC Conference in Dallas, Texas August 24th thru August 29th. Assistant Chief Monohan will be in charge of day to day operations during that period.

Because of the recent rash of medical issues, that may or may not be related to the District's workout program, Chief Seng has asked the trainers to adjust the

program more for cardio and endurance work and less muscle building through weight lifting. The trainers expect to begin the new program next week.

The Station Two commercial lawn mowers are very old and need to be replaced. Captain Dan Doyle headed up a committee from Station Two to make a recommendation on what mowers they felt would do the job best. Chief Seng told the board that because of safety concerns, he has ruled out any type of riding mowers. The committee reported that they decided on 2-48" commercial self-propelled mowers and had received 2 proposals.

The board discussed the need to have a member of the staff assist Al Ring in his work.

Chief Seng pointed out that firefighter Brendan Montgomery manages the districts official web site and had worked with AI in the past.

Rick Tonini moved to appoint AL Ring as the District's official historian and Brandon Montgomery as assistant historian. Jim Graven seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Jack Monohan told the board that the Trustees Association was in the process of hiring a lobbyist for the 2010 legislative session in Frankfort. The board discussed its options, including looking for a different lobbyist who may be more effective. The board agreed that the need in 2010 is too great not to have a lobbyist, but tabled the matter to research options other than Bob Benson.

Tom Eifler polled the board on moving the meeting to 12:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month. There were no objections, so the board agreed to try the new meeting time in September.



This Flow Meter would be used for both Training and Maintenance functions. From a training standpoint, it would allow us to develop and demonstrate appropriate flow rates for all of the St Matthew's apparatus and equipment. From a maintenance standpoint, it would allow us to confirm if flow rates are appropriate from apparatus, equipment, hydrants and fire suppression systems. St Matthews does not currently own any type of similar Flow Meter. In the past we have had to "make due" using smaller flow meters, or by "guestimating" flows using rough calculations. The recent introduction of 2659 has shown the need for equipment like this so that we can accurately calculate appropriate flows for the new apparatus and equipment.

INSIGHT Portable Flow Testers

Use the INSIGHT Portable FlowTester to determine the flow and pressure capabilities of a suppression system, flow test automatic nozzles, pumpers, or hydrants, calibrate equipment, test hydrant systems, or teach hydraulics in real situations.

The INSIGHT **Portable FlowTester** is an instrument that will measure flow rate directly without using charts or doing calculations. The tester is designed around the FRC INSIGHT digital flowmeter and a paddlewheel type flow sensor mounted in a flow tube.

Five St. Matthews firefighters competed in the relay portion of a recent regional Firefighter Combat Challenge in Lexington, where each individual performed a simulated firefighting task in rapid succession.

This competition involves competitors wearing 70 pounds of bunker gear as they simulate the physical demands of real-life firefighting. They perform a linked series of five tasks, including climbing a five-story tower with a 42-pound high-rise pack; hoisting a 42-pound hose bundle to the top of the five-story tower; then descending five stories to use a mallet to drive a 160-pound steel beam 5 feet.

Then competitors negotiate a 140-foot slalom course, to grab a charged hose and pull it 75 feet to blast a target. Finally, the firefighters must lift a 175-pound mannequin and drag it 100 feet.

The total time it takes the relay team to complete these events is recorded and teams race against themselves, their opponent and the clock.

The St. Matthews Relay team ran the course three times, advancing to the Sweet 16. Its qualifying time of 1 minute, 41 seconds made it a championship finalist, meaning the team members are eligible for the World competition in Las Vegas.

St. Matthews Fire District team members committed themselves to the rigorous physical demands of their career by beginning a strength and conditioning program implemented by Inferno Fitness several months ago.

The competition starts at the base of the tower. The hose pack cannot be touched before the start. The 3" (7.62cm) hose load and cover (42 lb.; 19kg) may be carried in any manner and must be deposited into the container on the top floor with no part of the pack touching the deck. Both feet must be on the top deck before dropping the high-rise pack. A 2-second penalty will be assessed for either infraction. If a competitor misses the box, s/he may correct the position, but only before starting the next evolution. The high-rise pack may not be used as a step. A 10-second penalty will be imposed for this infraction. The hose load must stay on the top platform. The competitor is disqualified if the high-rise pack falls off the top of the tower. The handrails may be used in climbing the tower. Steps may be taken in multiples on the way

EVENT 2 Hose Hoist

A 42-lb. (19kg) donut roll of large diameter hose and 5/8" (16mm) kernmantle rope is used for this event. The competitor is not allowed to stand on anything other than the top platform while hoisting. The evolution is complete when the roll clears the railing at the top of the tower and is placed in the container on the top floor. The donut roll must ascend; loss of control (i.e., slippage of more than one balcony) will result in disqualification. Proper placement is on, or in the container with no part of the donut touching the deck. A 2-second penalty will be assessed for this infraction. The donut roll must stay on the top platform. Disqualification results with any loss of control of the donut roll, including it falling off the tower, rolling down the stairs or interfering with the adjacent competitor. If the competitor trips on the hoisting rope, s/he is responsible for any additional penalties. This task must be completed before 3 minutes has elapsed or a disqualification will result. A fallen donut roll may not be retrieved. Descending the tower, every step must be contacted and the handrail grasped. Failure to touch each step on the descent will result in a 2-second penalty per in-

fraction.

EVENT 3 Forcible Entry

The forcible entry evolution utilizes the Keiser Force Machine (a chopping simulator). Using the 9-lb. (4kg) shot mallet provided, and with both feet on the diamond plate surface, the competitor must drive the sled; a 160-lb. (72.5kg) steel beam a horizontal distance of 5-ft. (1.5m) Pushing, raking or hooking the beam is not allowed; only the head of the mallet is allowed to strike the beam. The handle must not come in contact with the beam at any time. The upper edge of the beam will be covered with pressure sensitive material, making infractions visible by a mark on the top edge of the beam. A 5-second penalty is assessed for each infraction after the first handle strike. Both hands must be above the tape mark on the handle (12-in. [30.5cm] from the top [head] end) at the point of impact. A 2-second penalty is assessed for every inch (2.5cm) or fraction thereof that the sled is short of the end of the tray. Any part of the hammer must be placed on the designated 3-ft.x4-ft. (84cmx121cm) mat. Contacting the mat is defined as the hammer being in contact with the imaginary plane that extends vertically from the border of the mat. A 2-second penalty is assessed for this infraction.





EVENT 4 Hose Advance

The competitor must negotiate the 140' (42.6m) slalom course without missing or knocking over any delineator (including the target); doing so will result in a 5-second penalty for each infraction. The competitor must pick up the nozzle end of the 1 3/4"; (4.45cm) charged hose line, forward of the taped stripe 6' (1.8m) from the nozzle and drag it a distance of 75-ft (22.8m). Once the nozzle penetrates the swinging doors (i.e., crosses the threshold 75-ft. distant), the competitor opens the nozzle, hits the target with the water stream, shuts down the nozzle and places the nozzle on the pavement. A failure to advance the hose a distance of 75-ft. will result in a 10-second penalty. The nozzle must not be opened before engaging the swinging doors. A 2-second penalty will be assessed for this violation. Failure to drop the target will result in a 10-second penalty. If the nozzle is not shut before it is placed down, the competitor must go back and close it. If the Course Staff is required to shut off the nozzle, a 2-second penalty will be assessed. If the nozzle opens after hitting the ground, there is no penalty and the competitor can continue to the victim rescue evolution.

EVENT 5 Victim Rescue

A 175-lb. (79.4kg) Simulaids, Inc., Rescue Randy® mannequin must be lifted and dragged backwards a distance of 100-ft (30.5m). Carrying the dummy is not permitted. If any competitor crosses the course center delineator (i.e., goes out of lane), a 5- second penalty will be assessed for each infraction. Any contact with the opposing competitor will result in disqualification. The mannequin must not be grasped by its clothing or appendages. Time stops when the competitor and victim completely cross the finish line. The Course Marshal, at his sole discretion, may stop any competitor who in the official's opinion creates or is in a dangerous, unsafe or stressful condition. Spiking the dummy at anytime will result in disqualification. Spiking is defined as any elbow movement other than extension while releasing the dummy.

Please inform us if this is acceptable and what type of agreements you would need.



October 8, 2009

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on October 8, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, John Volkerding, Rick Tonini, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, Faye Ellerkamp and Jack Monohan. Also present were Chief Seng, Stuart Monohan and Dave Dugan.

Minutes

The minutes of the September 9, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved; Sam McCune seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for September was \$1,530.91. The three-month total is \$3,838.35 and on track to exceed our budget estimate.

The District ended September, the third month of the fiscal year, in excellent shape with total expenses of 23.67% of the budget. Overtime expenses are still over budget, but have been reduced.

A CD with Commonwealth Bank was cashed in to meet current expenses.

Jack Monohan moved to approve the treasurer's report. Faye Ellerkamp seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

Captain Larry Heaphy is expected to return to duty after six months of being offduty for a worker's comp medical issue.

If Administrative expenses and taxes are less than \$32,500, the remaining amount of the \$32,500 will be donated with Metro Fire Department receiving 50% for Engine 21; and the other 50% being divided with St. Matthews receiving Fire District receiving 55% and North Oldham Fire District receiving 45% so that they may purchase gear for firefighters;
- Remainder in estate shall be split among the persons listed in the handwritten memorandum as previously proferred to Court;
- The hearing scheduled at 2:01 PM on October 28, 2009, is hereby remanded and the
 objections of Mr. Treitz are withdrawn (regarding distributions to the persons listed in the

Fire drill enthralls, educates families at waterfront

For the mostly pre-kindergarten set and their parents, the Great Louis-ville Fire Drill at Waterfront Park on Sunday offered free hot dogs and homemade chili, balloons, entertainment and instruction on safety fundamentals designed to prevent fire injuries and deaths.

Eyes glowing with excitement, J.D. Wiegand, 3, of Jeffersontown, led his mother and grandmother first on a tour of antique, restored firetrucks parked on the Ohio River wharf.

An inflatable firetruck nearby, complete with two slides, was next on his list.

"This is fantastic," Debbie Wiegand, the boy's grandmother, remarked as he explored the rear cab of a fire engine and fingered equipment inside.

"Boys never outgrow it," she added. "Then they grow up to be big boys fighter costume, the same one that he will wear for and want to go into it."

Her description fit Jack Monohan, 73, retired assistant chief of the St. Matthews Fire Department.

Monohan kept a watchful eye over his restored, Ford Model A Fire Chief sedan parked nearby, attended by fellow firetruck enthusiasts from the Derby City chapter of the Fire Apparatus Association.

A firefighter in St. Matthews from 1951 to 1993, Monohan spoke fondly of the camaderie he enjoys with others who scrounge for, restore, and lovingly display restored firetrucks at events like the 25th Annual Great Louisville Fire Drill on Sunday.

Firefighting "was a vocation for me," Monohan said.

The event is a highlight of regional fire-prevention events in October, said Sgt. Salvador Melendez, the spokesman for Louisville Fire & Rescue.

So far this year fires have caused 16 deaths in Jefferson County, compared to five in 2008. He said major contributors of fire deaths are lack of a working smoke detector or an escape plan from the home. The more deaths this year were in part a result of fires that took place in homes with many family members, he said.

Many homes in the Louisville area lack working smoke detectors, he added, because batteries in the units die or residents disable the units because of alarms caused by cooking smoke and other minor incidents.

"Every time we make a run to a home, we do a home inspection, and make sure a fire alarm is in a place where it needs to be," Melendez said. "We install one for them at no cost to them."

According to the National Fire Prevention Association, nearly two-thirds of fire deaths from 2003 through 2006 took place in homes with no smoke alarm, or a nonfunctional smoke alarm.

Smoking accounts for most home fire deaths, the association reported in a press release, followed by fires sparked by cooking equipment, heating equipment, electrical wiring or lighting products. The coming months of December, January and February are when one third of home fires and fire deaths take place, the association added.

Besides family fun, perhaps the most important feature of the event was a fire safety trailer where children and their parents were instructed on how fires start in the kitchen and the bedroom and what to do.

"The thing that I want the kids to see is the fire safety trailer," Melendez said.



The following is background information for you to have knowledge of to be able to answer questions, but not necessary to give copies to the Board members.

AL RING

I was an active member of the department for 26 years, from 1964 to 1990.

I have been collecting the history of the STMFD department since the mid 1970's. Jack Monohan has been a tremendous help in this process.

Published the St. Matthews Firefighters, 84 Years of Firefighting in St. Matthews, Kentucky, in 2004.

Started a web site where I share the STMFD history with the public in 2007.

I try and organize all history in chronological order starting with 1919. Now because of the size, I create 1 year at a time, so nothing goes up on the site before a complete year is finished.

Because of the way I put this together it is much better for me to add things "daily" as they occur rather then say in November have to go back to February of that year and add items, which throws the spacing of everything off. I literally work on this history daily if there is something to add.

At present the chronological history (which include Board minutes) on the site only goes to 1989.

A separate section with Board Minutes goes to February 1999. (Many copies missing)

A separate section with Board Documents goes to 1992.

There are and will be special events (reunions, tributes, special fires, etc.) that go up to 2009.

The only financials I use are a few sheets from the yearly audit, and if that is not available I try and use the end of year (June). The latest copy on the site now is up to 1989. I use no check or credit card runs, monthly statements, nor do I want to.

Privacy Issue: If I have been appointed to a position of historian I don't believe this should be an issue.

Here are the Board minutes I am still missing and need to find, but do not want the financials with them.

As per our telephone conversation here are some thoughts on the position of "Historian" and my web site.

First let me thank you and the Board for appointing me as one of the historians of the department. I appreciate this and take this very seriously.

Because I don't think I or the Board fully understand what this position entails, I have included some thoughts on this position.

I feel my role in this capacity should be to collect, maintain and make available to anyone interested the chronological history of the department from the beginning to the present. To constantly look for additional information, sources, etc. effecting the department from 1919 to present. To keep track of its most important asset, its members.

Let's discuss the sensitive area of the history now. The Board I believe feels it does not want the Board minutes or financials recorded on the web site as they occur. I happen to agree with this, and note that at the present time the Board minutes only go to February 1999. As far as financials I only use a few pages from the annual audit or the end of year (June), and they only cover at the present time to 1989. I do not use check or credit card runs, or monthly financial reports.

What I would like to suggest for all chorological history, Board minutes, Board documents, etc. is that we agree on a five year holding period before placing them on the site or releasing them to anyone. However this would not include special events such as reunions, tributes, special fires, etc. I am not referring here to any legal requirements the department has to comply with. That is none of my business and is not in discussion here.

I want to be sure we understand how this would work. I would receive all the information needed as it occurs and place them where they belong and keep track of them but would not place them on a web site or release them to anyone for a period of five years after the event.

Lets discuss what I need in order to carry out the above.

Correspondence to the Board for the monthly meetings, approved minutes, items of interest that effect the department. Generally speaking the items sent in the packet to Board members before each meeting.

Access to the internal part of the department web site so I have access to the department SOP's, duty rosters, and things that give me background and help me keep track of who and where people are going. Such as promotions, leaving the department, hiring new people, etc. etc. New equipment, and so on.

Chief memo's that may be sent out to the firefighters.

Photos taken of various events and fires. This proves to be one of the hardest for me to gather. Stuart Monohan, Brandon Montgomery, Joe Wolfe try and get some of these to me, but we need to develop a way so they are timely, as well as the event identified. I have many photos from the last 15 years but don't know the year, the event, the names of people.

Should various articles on the department from magazines, newspapers, etc. be available, I should have access to them.

My personal future goal: I would like at some future point to transfer all the STMFD history on my web site to a spot on the District site so should something happen to me the District has all the history that I and all the people that have helped me have collected.

Finally: STMFD has a tremendous reputation in the fire and public community as a leader in the fire service. Keeping in mind that we were one of the first departments to use two-way radio equipment, the first department in the state to use self contained breathing apparatus, created a sound financial footing and have maintained it, as well as made training a mainstay of the department and stayed ahead of the community in growth. With all this we have one of the greatest histories in the fire service there is. We should be proud of it and we should want to collect it, keep it and share it with the community and be a leader in the preservation of our history.

I would like to update you all on the progress of the Firefighter Combat Challenge team. I first want to express how grateful we are to have all of your support. Since the inception of this team, we have made great strides toward our goal of competing on a national level and have received local media attention. With that in mind, we, as a team have a long way to go to truly compete at this level. For this reason we have opted not to compete in the national competition this year. To be fiscally responsible to our families and this department we feel that further training and preparation is needed to compete on a national or even global level.

We will continue in our pursuit of outside funding for the team, first and foremost for training equipment. Currently our needs are as follows: lighter fire gear designed for racing which is roughly \$1000/person, a Keiser force machine sled which is \$2800. Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

November 12, 2009

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on November 12, 2009 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, Faye Ellerkamp, Jack Monohan and Rick Tonini. Also present were Chief Seng, Chief Monohan, Major Dugan, Jordan Davis, Kevin Moulton, Matt Board, Derrick Miskell, Mike Frantz, Patrick Montague, Mike Willinger, Moss Clore, Joe Wolfe and Mike Richardson.

Minutes

The minutes of the October 8, 2009 meeting were reviewed. Rick Tonini moved; Jack Monohan seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

We expect to receive our first Sherriff's Real Estate Tax disbursement around December 14th which will be close to 1,000,000.00.

We received a check from the Louisville Water Co. in the amount of \$6,750.00 for servicing 675 Hydrants in the Fire District.

We received \$4.13 from CRC revenue in the month of October.

Jack Monohan moved to approve the treasurer's report. Rick Tonini seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

Regarding the cell tower, Verizon Wireless has contacted the Fire District concerning co-locating some equipment on our current tower. There is possibility of receiving \$1500.00 a month in revenue from this additional equipment. However, Verizon mentioned that there is not enough space currently for the equipment that they are

trying to add to the tower. Additionally, T-Mobile has expressed interest in buying out the current contract that we have in place.

Chief Seng reported that we have not received any funds from the Anne Duncan estate. The Fire District is expecting to receive around \$49,000.00. Chief Seng also mentioned that he would like to contact Chief Rick Albers with North Oldham Fire District and see if they would be willing to off-set some of our legal costs associated with receiving the money.

As a result of a Papa John's commercial that some Firefighter's participated in back in July, Papa John's would like to reimburse those individuals that participated with a \$500.00 check. The Board was aware of the Papa John's commercial being filmed at Station 1, they discussed this and saw no problem with letting those individuals receive the compensation. Rick Tonini motioned to accept the stipend from Papa John's; Jack Monohan seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Chief Seng requested the following expenditures for November:

Old Business

Following up from the last Trustees meeting, Chief Seng compiled and distributed to the Board an overtime cost analysis sheet, which broke down cost of hiring a 40 Hour Day Staff Firefighter versus using a 24/48 Firefighter on OT. If the Fire District chose to hire a 40 hour day staff Firefighter instead of using OT to fill the spots then this would possibly create a savings of \$6,800.00 annually. If the Fire District offered this Firefighter individual Health Insurance then the savings would decrease to \$2,690.00.

The Chief and Board discussed the possibility of applying for a SAFER Grant(Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response) which would allow up to 5 Firefighter positions to be paid for through Federal funds. The Board discussed and agreed that they would like to move forward to apply for the SAFER Grant. Chief Seng will investigate the requirements and report back to the Board at the December meeting.

Chief Seng reported that the Summer Intern position ended for Firefighter Adam Hanrahan on October 30th because of CERS requirements on part-time positions. Firefighter Rickie Tapp is continuing to work 1 day per week and will not be affected by this requirement. Chief Seng will report back on the Intern status and the December Trustees meeting.

Tom Eifler distributed a letter to the Board from The City of Windy Hills concerning the proposed sign at Station 2. The City of Windy Hills is still very interested in having the sign at the corner of Hubbard's and Brownsboro Road and would be willing to add the wording St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station No.2. After much discussion regarding the potential Windy Hills Sign and since this issue had been discussed at the October meeting, Jim Graven made a motion to take no further action; Jack Monohan seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

New Business

Firefighter Kevin Moulton reported on the Firefighter Combat Challenge Team. Kevin said that the team is working on gathering outside funding for new equipment. He received correspondence from Papa John's that they are looking at next year's budget to help with the equipment. After discussion concerning the much needed equipment and since the equipment can be used by each of the Firefighters for training, Jim Graven motioned that the Fire District purchase up to \$5,000.00 for the equipment needed, Rick Tonini seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Rick Tonini handed information the Board concerning Al Ring and his desire to be the Fire District's Historian. Al Ring's goal is to develop a functioning website with all of the Fire District's History over time. He would like to someday give this website to the Fire District to update and add information for the future. The Board discussed the ability to monitor what information is added to the website. Chief Seng will contact Al Ring to discuss potential for the website.

Jim Graven mentioned that the Fire District should begin seeking additional funding from the hospitals in the district. The issue was raised that the majority of our Fire Runs are to the hospitals. Tom Eifler mentioned that we should have a meeting with Baptist East CEO, Sue Tamme to move forward. The Board talked about the possibility of assessing a user's fee to the hospitals each time services are rendered.

Tom Eifler moved to go into Executive Session at 1:04PM. The Board took no action and the meeting resumed at 1:15PM.

The next board meeting will be on December 10th at 12:00PM.

There being no further business, Rick Tonini motioned and Jack Monohan seconded to adjourn the meeting. The motion passed unanimously at 1:15PM.

Please find enclosed a copy of a letter I have sent to Metro Mayor Jerry Abramson regarding the recently-announced settlement of the firefighter overtime lawsuit. In brief, my concern is that county residents are being asked to foot a portion of the bill for this settlement when they never received fire protection services from the city in the first place.

Your fire district, like the 17 other fire protection districts in the county, is authorized under KRS Chapter 75 as a special taxing district to support the delivery of fire protection services to residents living within the boundaries of the service district. The citizens of your fire district pay for the services you provide. As county residents, they never received city fire services, but now, since countywide taxes are to be used to pay the settlement, they are being asked to foot the bill. I do not believe that is what we intended when we passed merger legislation back in 2000.

Dear Mayor Abramson,

I am pleased to learn of the impending settlement with the firefighters regarding overtime pay. While that news is welcome for the deserving firefighters, I see a problem relating to the settlement that strikes at the very heart of what we were trying to accomplish for citizens in the county when we undertook merged government.

As a primary legislative sponsor of merger in 2000 (HB 647) and 2002 (HB 659), I recall that many of us were concerned about several issues related to services and taxes: maintaining existing services without increasing the tax burden, having our citizens pay only for those services they were actually receiving, and giving the new merged government the ability to create special taxing districts to allow access to services that citizens in certain geographic areas of the county were willing to pay for, without imposing the burden of paying for those services on the entire county. Merger legislation addressed these concerns:

The territory of a consolidated local government may, as permitted by Section 172A of the Constitution of Kentucky, be divided into service districts. Each service district shall constitute a separate tax district within which the consolidated local government may, upon receipt of a petition signed by a majority of the registered voters in the district as of the last general election, levy and collect taxes in accordance with the kind, type, and character of the services provided by the consolidated local government in each of these service districts. . . .

KRS 67C.145

The best example of the practical effect of this provision is the Urban Services District, comprising essentially the old City boundaries, within which citizens pay higher taxes to receive a heightened level of service - including fire protection.

Page 2 November 13, 2009

Unfortunately, it appears that the impending firefighters' settlement will result in countywide tax revenues being used to pay the firefighters when the labor hours forming the basis of the debt owed to them were worked before the two governments ever merged. How do we ask 720,000 county residents to pay a debt the city owes when the county residents never received the services in the first place, and when county fire services are supported by taxes assessed to residents living in 18 separate fire protection districts authorized under KRS Chapter 75?

I would appreciate your sharing your thoughts on this question. It is certainly important to the constituents I represent. Thanks for your time and attention.

Dear Chairman Martin,

I am contacting you regarding the recent Estate settlement for Ms. Anne Stewart Duncan.

Both the St. Matthews Fire Protection District and the North Oldham Fire Protection District were contacted approximately six months ago informing us each that the estate of Ms. Anne Stewart Duncan was going to make a cash contribution to each fire district. The original amount offered by the estate was approximately \$15,000 for the St. Matthews Fire District and approximately \$10,000 for the North Oldham Fire District.

While reading several different articles in the local newspaper on how the estate was to be settled, these amounts offered were far less than what the St. Matthews Fire District originally understood it was going to receive. The Board of Trustees for the St. Matthews Fire District requested the assistance of its legal counsel to contact the attorney representing the estate of Ms. Duncan so that they could get a better understanding of why the dollar amount of the disbursement was so low.

After several lengthy discussions and meetings, an agreement was reached that the North Oldham Fire District would receive approximately \$35,000 for station renovations and approximately \$49,000 for the St. Matthews Fire District for new equipment.

Therefore the purpose of my letter is to ask the Board of Trustees of the North Oldham Fire District to consider helping offset the legal expense (copy of the invoice is enclosed) that was incurred when negotiating these higher dollar amounts.

If necessary I would be happy to sit down with you and the Board to discuss all of the events that took place to finally get us where we are today.

Sorry for this late of an update but our main printer and copying machine have been down since last week. Repairs were made late yesterday and everything is now back to normal.

The December Trustees meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, December 8th at 12 noon.

- If you haven't heard the latest news, Asst. Chief Monohan fell at home on Tuesday morning and has broken his ankle. Early reports are that he will be in a half leg cast for approximately six weeks. I will keep everyone posted on his progress.
- Unit 2634 has been retrofitted with the new style mirrors that were approved at last month's Trustees meeting. Every apparatus now has the same type of mirrors that provide a better view of both sides of the truck while backing and driving.
- Unit 2631 has been returned from Lexington after having a crack repaired in its water tank. These tanks come with a lifetime warranty however it's a hassle removing all of the fire hose to get to the tank so that the repair can be made. Let's hope it doesn't happen again.
- Asst. Chief Monohan and I met with a representative from Verizon Wireless last week about locating communication equipment on the cell tower at Station 2. Verizon however needs a space larger than what is currently available inside the fenced in area. We worked together and decided what would be a good course for action for them to

take. They are currently drawing these plans up and will make a proposal to the district soon.

MetroSafe still is planning to start distributing all of the new radio equipment to all of the fire districts sometime in early January. After the distribution of the new equipment is made a timetable will be made as to when all of the mobile radios will be programmed and installed in all of our vehicles. The installation of all the radios will be done by MetroSafe.

The equipment for the regional grant that was funded months ago for a county wide PASS (Personal Alert Safety System) has finally arrived and is ready for distribution. Sometime in the first part of January our equipment will be issued to us and we will have about a month of training with them before we put them in service. Our cost on this project is about \$23,000.

We are still waiting for a check to arrive from the estate of Ms. Ann Duncan. The settlement, which was about \$50,000, should arrive at anytime. \$23,000 of this was to fund the PASS safety system mentioned above and the other \$27,000 was to fund new hydraulic rescue equipment for Quint 2658.

Travis Frick with Cotton and Allen contacted us this week to let us know that they will be starting on our 2008-2009 audit after the first of the year. The final audit is not due to be submitted to the appropriate agencies until May.

Finally, after several months of discussion a contract was signed yesterday with Ellen Call and her partners to represent the Jefferson County Fire Service in this next legislative session. Their main focus will be on the changing of the tax cap in KRS Chapter 75.

Don't forget that the annual awards dinner at the firehouse will be held next Tuesday. Chef Sam will be cooking several of his favorite dishes including his famous, mouth watering Prime Rib. Awards will start at 6:45pm with dinner to immediately follow. Please give Jordan a call and let her know if you can make it or not.

fees, Jack Monohan seconded and the motion passed. Chairman Eifler did not vote on the motion.



Christmas house fire leaves 2 children dead

Grandparents Irving, Cathy Bailey hospitalized

By Diane Heilenman and Sheryl Edelen

A Christmas Day fire claimed the lives of two grandsons of a prominent Louisville couple as the family and firefighters joined to try to save the victims.

Flames already were shooting through the roof in the rear of the Glenview home of Cathy and Irving W. Bailey II and through the front entryway when firefighters arrived shortly after 4:30 a.m. Friday, alerted by an alarm system.

Chief Chris Aponte of the Harrods Creek Fire Department said the adults at the house were outside when firefighters arrived and were attempting a rescue, and fire crews joined in.

"Whenever there are lives involved, it changes the dynamic" at a fire scene, Aponte said. "The guys worked hard to do what they could. We had some experienced firefighters on the scene and they couldn't make headway in it."

The cause of the fire is under investigation, said Maj. Henry Ott of the Louisville Metro Arson Squad. The victims, whose names were not released, were ages 10 and 12, he said.

The Baileys were injured, as were three firefighters, and the couple's home was mostly destroyed.

Aponte said two of the injured firefighters had minor burns and a third had an ankle injury.

In a statement released on behalf of the family, the Baileys said their injuries were serious but not lifethreatening and that they were in a hospital. It did not identify the hospital.

"Two children were killed in this tragedy," said the statement, provided by Scott Jennings, a family spokesman. The family requested privacy "at this time of great loss."

Cathy Bailey, a former ambassador to Latvia under President George W. Bush, is a major Republican fundraiser and is considering a run for the U.S. Senate next year. Irv Bailey is former chairman and chief executive of Providian Corp., guiding the company through a decade of growth to its merger with the Dutch firm Aegon in 1997.

The Bailey property sits on a winding, narrow street, Longview Lane, that runs off River Road in eastern Jefferson County. The street splits into a dead-end just past the property and a cul-de-sac that contains six large houses with spacious yards.

By late afternoon Friday, what remained of the Bailey house had collapsed into the basement, Ott said.

He said five adults were in the house when the fire started — four on the first floor and one in the basement. The boys were on the second floor, he said.

Aponte said 45 firefighters from four departments fought the blaze — Lyndon, Worthington and St. Matthews, in addition to Harrods Creek.

He said the two victims were around the ages of two of his children, and many of the firefighters on the scene had children of their own at home.

"My family and I all had a big hug together" when he finally arrived home, he said. "But the images that we added to the photo album in our minds today will be something we won't ever forget."

Two Vermont boys visiting family in Glenview have been identified as the victims of a Christmas morning fire that gutted much of the house they were staying in. The cause of the fire remained under investigation Saturday as officials awaited the arrival of heavy excavation equipment that was needed to remove roof and flooring that collapsed into the center of the house, where investigators believe the fire reported shortly after 4:30 a.m. Friday began.

Solon L. Bailey, 12, and his brother, William T. "Liam" Bailey, 10, both of Barre, Vt., died at the scene, according to Jefferson County Deputy Coroner Rita Taylor. Preliminary autopsy results show they died of causes consistent with smoke inhalation, with the final determination awaiting results from toxicology tests, Taylor said.

The boys were visiting their grandfather, Irving W. Bailey II, and his wife, Cathy Bailey, at their home on Longview Lane off River Road. Irving and Cathy Bailey were released Saturday from University Hospital, where they were treated for injuries from the fire.

The boys were the sons of Chris and Deanna Bailey of Barre. Their parents escaped the fire without serious injury, according to Maj. Henry Ott of the Louisville Metro Arson Squad. Chris Bailey is Irving Bailey's son.

Ott said the probe into the cause of the blaze likely will continue at least into Monday. "It's too early to eliminate anything, but we don't suspect anything criminal," Ott said Saturday.

The family had been using candles the night before, Ott said. But because of the severity of the blaze, it would be difficult to determine if the candles were involved in the cause, he said.

Bailey family spokesman Scott Jennings issued a statement Saturday thanking "the firefighters, medical personnel, emergency workers, neighbors and friends who assisted them during this tragedy."

The statement continued: "Irv and Cathy especially want to thank the staff at University Hospital who treated the family and the firefighters who were injured on the scene. The Bailey family is grateful for the outpouring of support they have received from the Louisville community and from their friends around the world. The offers of help, support, and prayers mean a tremendous amount to this grieving family."

Forty-five firefighters from the Harrods Creek, Lyndon, St. Matthews and Worthington fire departments fought the blaze.

Cathy Bailey, a former ambassador to Latvia under President George W. Bush, is a major Republican fundraiser who has been considering a run for the U.S. Senate next year. Irv Bailey is former chairman and chief executive of Providian Corp., guiding the company through a decade of growth to its merger with the Dutch firm Aegon in 1997.

A memorial service for the boys is scheduled for Tuesday at 11 a.m. at St. Francis in the Fields Episcopal Church at 6710 Wolf Pen Branch Road in Harrods Creek. Immediately following the service, a visitation will be held at the church in Graves Hall. Funeral services for the boys will be held later this week in Vermont.

Barre Town brothers killed in Kentucky fire

BARRE TOWN — A Christmas Day fire has claimed the lives of two well-known Barre Town boys who were visiting grandparents in Louisville, Ky.

Solon L. Bailey, 12, and his brother, William T. Bailey, 10, both of Morgan Lane in Barre Town, died at the scene of the blaze, according to Jefferson County (Ky.) Deputy Coroner Rita Taylor.

Preliminary autopsy results show they died of causes consistent with smoke inhalation. The boys, whose parents are Deanna and Chris Bailey, attended Barre Town Middle and Elementary School. According to Principal Timothy Crowley, both boys were a "huge part of the Barre Town family." William, or "Liam" as he was known at school, was in the fourth grade; Solon was in the seventh grade.

"This is very challenging, very sad," Crowley said Saturday afternoon. "We have had tragedies in the past, but we have never lost two students at one time."

Both boys were remembered for their kindness, responsibility and academic acumen. "This is a tragedy beyond comprehension," said Tamara Cooley, Liam Bailey's fourth-grade teacher. "We'll all get through it eventually."

Crowley said school faculty and staff had been notified, and he expected many of the boys' classmates likely already had heard about the tragedy. He said counselors would be made available to Barre Town students.

Funeral services for the two boys will be held later this week. No other information was available. However, a memorial service will be held on Tuesday, Dec. 29, at 11 a.m. for the brothers at St. Francis in the Fields Episcopal Church in Harrods Creek, Ky.

The boys were visiting their grandparents, Irving W. Bailey II and Cathy Bailey, at the couple's home on Longview Lane in Louisville. Chris Bailey is the son of Irving and Cathy Bailey.

According to Maj. Henry Ott of the Louisville Metro Arson Squad, the investigation into the cause of the blaze likely will continue at least into Monday as they await heavy excavation equipment to help remove debris from the large house.

"There is a lot to move," he said during a brief interview Saturday. "It's too early to eliminate anything." Ott said there is no reason to believe any criminal activity occurred. Arson is not suspected, but no ruling has been made, Ott said on Saturday evening.

He added that the investigation was focused on what had been three rooms on the first floor. Ott said each of the rooms had had Christmas trees, and the home was decorated for the holiday.

Ott said the decorations included both artificial and real trees.

According to the Louisville Courier-Journal, flames already were shooting through the roof in the rear of the Bailey home and through the front entryway when firefighters arrived shortly after 4:30 a.m. Friday, alerted by an alarm system.

Fire Chief Chris Aponte of the Harrods Creek Fire Department said the adults at the house were

The brothers

The Bailey brothers were remembered Saturday as thoughtful, energetic boys, who loved the outdoors, their family and friends. They were rarely idle, everyone seemed to agree.

At home, the boys, who were described as "inseparable," lovingly cared for pets, including cats and a guinea pig. In fact, at one point in the last year, the boys insisted they start an egg business with the chickens the family had raised at their home on Morgan Lane.

The boys loved to be outside, playing in the yard and countryside near their rural home. Both boys were athletic, enjoying soccer and other outdoor sports. And the family loved to downhill ski. Several friends noted that the Baileys often spent time together downhill skiing at Sugarbush.

"They are a great family," said Jane Connolly, Solon Bailey's teacher. "They are very close." Teachers and friends said both boys were very empathetic, which endeared them to fellow classmates and adults alike. They both volunteered often for projects and community service. Their sensitivity toward others stood out to Crowley.

Chris and Deanna Bailey moved to the region after dairy farming for years in the Champlain Valley, according to friends and family. The boys, the Baileys' only children, were home-schooled for a few years, but often attended classes at Barre Town Elementary in part for education and part for socialization. Deanna Bailey went on to work at the school as the science and math coordinator and then as a paraeducator. (She now teaches science in Morrisville.) Chris Bailey is the manager of The Farmers Daughter LLC, a smokehouse in South Barre; he was involved with the Farmers Diner in Barre, which opened in 2002 and closed a few years later after moving to Quechee.

"(Deanna) was very much part of the school here," Crowley said of Deanna Bailey's time at Barre Town. "The boys more or less grew up here."

Then they started taking classes at the school. Solon Bailey started out shy but soon became one of the students who "everyone wanted to work with," according to several of his teachers. Liam Bailey, who also was described as an "engaged," "thoughtful student."

Neither boy ever dodged an academic challenge. Crowley described them as "top-notch." Solon played keyboard, just days ago, Dec. 16, at the school Christmas concert, where he performed two solos, including the famous "Linus and Lucy" from Charlie Brown fame; Liam played French horn. Solon Bailey also played in the school's senior jazz band.

"He was a very hard-working young man," said Brent White, the school's instrumental music teacher. "He took great pride in his work."

White said Solon Bailey was very responsible about practicing, schedules, and regularly sought feedback and advice from White about his playing.

"He wanted to do his best," White said. "I was very proud of him as a musician. ... He was not a know-it-all. He always wanted to learn."

William Bailey, too, had great potential as a musician, White said. "You could see it in him." Solon Bailey was learning Spanish, and was both a good writer and math/science student. Both boys were described as having "very pleasant dispositions" and good sense of humor. (Liam Bailey was considered the bigger ham of the two; Solon's sense of humor was called "dry.")

Cooley, Liam Bailey's fourth-grade teacher, said both boys always were surrounded by legions of friends.

"They were very bright kids," she said. In fact, Liam was one of three of 20 students she teaches who knew his multiplication tables through the 12s without error.

Cooley also was a neighbor who regularly babysat the boys after they moved to the area. "They were always up to something," she said. "Always at it."

Ralf Bullock, Scoutmaster for Troop 714 in Barre, said Solon Bailey's love for outdoors and challenges translated into a determination to attain higher ranks in Scouting. He was Second Class trying to earn the First Class designation.

"He loved summer camp and being outdoors," Bullock said. "He seemed to get along with everybody."

Mark Lembke, who was Solon Bailey's math teacher, described his student as a "problem-solver." Cooley, who got word about the boys' deaths directly from Deanna Bailey by phone call, said she remains stunned by the tragedy.

"It is unbelievable," she said. "I don't know what it's going to be like when we go back into that classroom."

White, the music teacher, agreed it will be difficult when school resumes in a few weeks. He said it will be a "balance" between consoling students and faculty and feeling the loss himself.

"They feel like our own kids, too," he said.

Through a family representative, Deanna and Chris Bailey were said to be unavailable for comment.

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Family mourns children killed in Christmas fire

The community is still reeling over a Christmas morning house fire. Two children who died were visiting from out of state.

The victims were Solon and William Bailey. They were in town visiting grandparents for the holidays when they died in the fire.

The home on Longview Lane in Glenview belongs to Irv and Cathy Bailey.

"Cathy and Irv Bailey were released from University Hospital today," said Scott Jennings, family friend.

Jennings is a family friend and says the Baileys suffered only minor injuries in the fire, but they are heartbroken over the deaths of their grandsons.

"The children were ages 10 and 12. They were the sons of Irv Bailey's son and they reside in Barre, Vermont," said Jennings.

The victims were 12-year-old Solon and 10-year-old William Bailey.

"And it was obvious that they had made attempts to go back in," said Capt. Stephen Hanson, Harrods Creek Fire.

Several adults who made it out of the burning house went back inside but couldn't find the boys.

"They tried to do what they could. I don't blame 'em for trying," said Capt. Hanson.

More than 24 hours after the fire, investigators are still here on the scene. They believe the fire may have started in the basement, but the cause is still unknown.

"What we've heard the fire investigators say and what they've told people is that is its highly unlikely that it was criminal or arson," said Jennings.

"This is the worst one that I've experienced here with Harrods Creek, where we have two fatalities and especially children on a Christmas morning. That's pretty tough to take," said Capt. Hanson.

Capt. Hanson with the Harrods Creek fire department says three firefighters were also injured in the fire.

"The two firefighters that were making their way up the staircase sustained some first and second degree burns on their legs and knees," said Capt. Hanson.

A third firefighter twisted his ankle.

Family members are focused on a memorial service for the boys and also learning what caused the fire.

"I think everyone is curious and anxious to know what happened," said Jennings.

Family members will hold a memorial service for the children Tuesday at 11 a.m. at St. Francis in the Fields Episcopal Church, located at 6710 Wolf Pen Branch Road, Harrods Creek, Kentucky, 40027. Immediately following the memorial service, a visitation will be held at the church in Graves Hall. Funeral services for the two boys will be held later this week in Vermont.

In lieu of flowers the family has set up a memorial fund in honor of the boys.

Two children killed in Christmas morning blaze

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) - Two young boys were killed in a house fire early Christmas morning, and at least eight other people were hospitalized, including three firefighters.

The coroner has not confirmed the ages of the two boys, but they are believed to be 10 and 12 years old.

The Harrods Creek Fire Department responded to a fire alarm around 5:30 a.m. at 6410 Longview Lane near River Road. When firefighters arrived minutes later, the two-story home was already engulfed in flames and thick smoke and family members were still trapped inside.

"On arrival, there was fire through the roof of the structure," said Harrods Creek Fire Chief Chris Aponte.

The first firefighters to enter the home were forced to retreat when part of it collapsed. Although six family members managed to escape, firefighters were unable to rescue the two boys.

"We had two crews that attempted to get in," Aponte said. "They were pushed back by extreme heavy fire. Then we had a floor collapse and evacuated our firefighters out for safety."

Both children were found on the second floor.

It took about 30 minutes for firefighters to gain control of the blaze.

Owsley Brown, a neighbor who witnessed the fire, was in shock.

"We've seen an unbelievably horrible thing - a house completely burned," Brown said. "And some incredible tragedy that has happened around the whole thing."

The condition of the other victims wasn't immediately available.

Scott Jennings, a spokesman for the family who owned the home, released the following statement late Friday afternoon:

A fire destroyed the home of Irv and Cathy Bailey early this morning. Irv and Cathy are in the hospital with serious but non-life threatening injuries. Two children were killed in this tragedy, and the Bailey family is requesting privacy at this time of great loss.

Fire officials say there were smoke detectors in the home and they did go off. Investigators were working to determine the cause of the blaze.

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Deanna Bailey wrapped her arms around Harrods Creek Fire Chief Chris Aponte - and then oneby-one hugged each of the firefighters who came to St. Francis in the Fields Episcopal Church Tuesday to honor the two sons she lost in a house fire on Christmas day.

Christmas house fire leaves 2 children dead

On Tuesday morning, family and friends, including some who'd traveled from out of town, gathered in the St. Francis sanctuary to honor the Bailey boys, who were remembered as bright, fun-loving children who enjoyed hiking, biking and skiing.

The roughly 250 mourners included many of those from the Harrods Creek, St. Matthews, Lyndon and Worthington fire departments who battled the fire on Longview Lane but could not get to the boys who were in a second-story bedroom. It took 45 firefighters to put out the blaze.

"Our guys are hurting," said Aponte, who described the Longview fire fight as one of the worst experiences of his life. He said he and the other firefighters attended the funeral to show their support for the family - and he was moved by the hug from Deanna Bailey.

"It was a true, powerful embrace, and it was a loving one," Aponte said.

During the service, family members spoke of Solon Bailey as a budding pianist who had fallen in love with the instrument at age 6. His Vermont piano teacher came to the service to play some of his favorite songs, including one he had composed.

Residential fires kill 20 this year in Jefferson County

Twenty people have died in house and apartment fires this year in Jefferson County — more than the previous three years combined.

The deaths of three children in house fires in the past week, coupled with a July 4 fire that killed six people, have pushed the number of fire-related fatalities to metro Louisville's highest levels in recent memory, said Maj. Henry Ott, head of the arson squad for Louisville Fire and Rescue.

"We haven't had anything like this," Ott said.

The causes of the two most recent fatal fires haven't been determined. But a variety of causes have been cited in the others — careless smoking, children playing with lit objects, even spontaneous combustion.

Officials say they are a stark reminder of the need to take extra precautions in the home, especially at a time of year when residents are trying to keep warm.

"It is upsetting to see people lose their lives and families lose their homes," said Maj. Edward Hammack, assistant fire marshal and chief of fire prevention for Louisville Fire & Rescue.

Records from the Louisville Fire arson squad show that there were eight fires in the city limits that killed 14 people in 2009. Another five fires — in Harrods Creek, Fern Creek, Highview, Pleasure Ridge Park and Okolona —left six people dead.

This December has been especially bad month for residential fires, officials said.

As of Tuesday morning, Hammack said his department had responded to 46 residential fires this month — higher than normal.

While the number of suburban fire department runs wasn't unavailable Tuesday, Fairdale Fire Chief Don Wittry said his department has had to respond to about six major residential fires this month, also more than usual.

On Monday, Louisville firefighters battled three fires— one at a vacant house on West Muhammad Ali Boulevard, another in a kitchen of a home on Falmouth Court, and one at an apartment on Barret Avenue. No injuries were reported in any of those fires.

But last week, two separate house fires last week killed 10-year-old Delanie Woodward and brothers Solon L. Bailey, 12, and William T. "Liam" Bailey, 10.

The Bailey boys died of smoke inhalation after a fire broke out in their grandparents' Glenview home about 4:30 a.m. Christmas Day. The boys had come from Barre, Vt., for the holiday.

Delanie died from smoke inhalation at Kosair Children's Hospital Dec. 22 after being pulled with her mother from her Burkley Avenue home in South Louisville. Her mother also suffered severe smoke inhalation and was admitted to University Hospital, where she remains, Hammack said.

Several calls to the family seeking comment were not returned Tuesday.

Another child, 11-year-old Angel Chambers was badly burned on her face, hands and upper body in a fire Dec. 21 on Bolling Avenue. She is still recovering in the hospital, according to her mother, Mary Chambers.

"She's getting better," Mary Chambers said. "But it's going to be a long road ahead."

A fund has been created for the Chambers family through Chase Bank.

Hammack said many fires this time of year are caused by residents misusing space heaters or plugging in extension cords where they shouldn't.

Space heaters aren't intended to heat an entire home and should not be left on while people are asleep, he said. He said that while the fire department does what it can to inform people about using heating appliances properly, "but try to convince people of that who are cold."

Wittry said residents should use common sense when using space heaters. Fires are caused more times than not because people "just aren't thinking things through."

Richard Peddicord, assistant director for Kentucky's division of fire prevention, said the winter months typically see an uptick in the number of fires around the state. December, January and February are Kentucky's peak months for serious residential fires, he said.

"People stay inside trying to keep warm and they close up a little tighter," failing to properly vent their homes, he said.

Additional Facts

Safety tips

When using a generator:

- *Don't use them indoors or inside attached garages, keep them at least 10 feet away from the home
- *Make sure the engine is stopped when refueling
- *Use the recommended type of fuel
- *Allow generators to cool down for at least 15 minutes before refueling, 30 minutes after prolonged use
- *Do not exceed the output capacity
- *Do not hard-wire the generator directly to the home
- *Use the approved type of extension cord (heavy gauge wire)

When using space heaters:

- *Make sure it meets industry testing standards
- *Make sure it has built-in safety features, such as automatic shut-off when it tips over or overheats, or a built-in timer
- *Do not use if the electrical cord is damaged
- *Keep the heater at least 3 feet from combustibles such as upholstery, draperies or furniture.
- *Unplug the heater whenever you leave the room, the home and when you go to bed

When using a fireplace:

- *Make sure it has been serviced by a certified technician
- *Make sure the flue is in working condition
- *Use a screen to keep embers and sparks inside the fire place\

Investigators have narrowed the start of a Christmas Day fire in Glenview that killed two boys to two rooms, one of which had a furnace in it and was across the hall from where the boys were sleeping.

Maj. Henry Ott of the Louisville Metro Arson Squad said investigators recovered a furnace Wednesday that was heavily damaged and was reportedly in an attic area used for storage on the second floor of the house in the 6400 block of Longview Drive off River Road. Arson investigators are routinely involved in fire investigations.

The boys' bodies were reportedly found in the doorway to their room, not far from the attic area where the furnace was located, Ott said.

Investigators will be focusing on that storage area and the dining room that was directly below it on the first floor to try to determine where the fire began. But because of the massive amount of damage the home sustained, Ott cautioned a cause may never be determined.

"We should be able to narrow it down to an area ... but I'm not exactly sure if we'll ever have a finite cause for what happened," said Ott, addressing the media Wednesday afternoon at the end of the driveway to the gutted home.

Ott said he expected investigators to wrap up their work on the scene by the end of Thursday, and would meet that day with representatives from ADT Security Services to check how alarms in the home responded during the fire.

The fire started shortly after 4:30 a.m. Christmas morning. Solon L. Bailey, 12, and his brother, William T. "Liam" Bailey, 10, of Barre, Vt., were killed.


Preliminary autopsy results show they died from smoke inhalation, said Jefferson County Deputy Coroner Rita Taylor.

The boys were visiting their grandfather, Irving W. Bailey II, and his wife, Cathy Bailey with their parents. The grandparents were injured in the fire and released from University Hospital on Saturday.

The boys' parents, Deanna and Chris Bailey, and uncle, John Receveur, got out of the house unharmed.
