When a fire truck slammed into a series of utility poles early Sunday, an Oldham County dispatcher coordinating rescue efforts from a call center in Buckner had no idea her husband would be the firefighter loaded into a helicopter bound for University Hospital in Louisville.

Three North Oldham firefighters were injured as a fire truck crashed about 1:30 a.m. along U.S. 42 in Goshen while headed to Paramont Estates on the report of an alarm sounding.

NOFD Deputy Chief David Stoltz said all three men on board were taken to area hospitals.

At the time of the crash, crews assessed the injuries of firefighter Tom Woosley as the most severe and requested a medical helicopter to airlift him from the scene.

Woosley's wife, Miki, an Oldham County dispatcher, coordinated rescue efforts between EMS and flight personnel from the call center in Buckner long before she

learned her husband had been injured, DIrector Kevin Nuss said.



Nuss said Woosley normally works at the call center during second shift but had volunteered to stay late because OCD was short staffed.

Crews transported the other two men on board, NOFD Chief Rick Albers and Capt. Mitch Slaughter, to Norton Brownsboro Hospital by ambulance.

Nuss, who lives near the crash site and serves as the county's emergency management director, said when he arrived at the scene and learned the names of the injured men, he notified Miki Woosley and relieved her of her duties.

All three men were alert and conscious after the crash, Stoltz said. Albers climbed out of the fire truck through the windshield and personnel quickly extricated the other two men, he said.

NOFD Capt. Charlie Hebel said as of 11 a.m. Sunday, all three men have been released from area hospitals and are home resting with their families.

The cause of the crash is under investigation. Stoltz said he believes one of the vehicle's tires dropped off the edge of the roadway, causing the truck to strike a series of utility poles and roll into a ditch in the 11900 block of West U.S. 42.

It came to rest on the passenger's side about 20 feet from the entrance to an LG&E substation.

The crash left miles of U.S. 42 surrounded by darkness, with the only light visible for miles streaming from emergency lights inside schools on the North Oldham campus.

Nuss said hundreds of LG&E customers from Hillcrest subdivision to Sligo in Henry County lost power. The crash also knocked out lines to traffic signals at the intersection of U.S. 42 and Ky. 1793 and U.S. 42 and Ridgemoor Drive near Goshen Elementary.

The power outage could impact Sunday worship services in the area. Churches without power at the time of the crash include St. John United Methodist Church, Goshen Baptist Church, Shiloh Methodist Church and River Valley Christian Church.

Nuss said when LG&E clears the scene, wrecker services will begin to pull the fire truck from the ditch. As of lunchtime Sunday, dispatchers said a section of U.S. 42 will be closed until 6 p.m.

Traffic is being rerouted from U.S. 42 to Club Drive, following Spring Meadow Lane, Cliffwood and Goshen Lane before returning to U.S. 42.

Stoltz said the truck involved in the crash is NOFD's primary truck from the Skylight station and is known as Quad 1441. Purchased in 2007, it is the department's newest.

Three Oldham firefighters injured after fire truck crash

A North Oldham Fire Department truck hit two utility poles Sunday morning on U.S. 42, shutting down power in the area and causing minor injuries to three firefighters.

The firefighters were responding to a fire alarm in the Paramount Estates Subdivision at 1:19 a.m. when the truck struck the utility poles and overturned on its passenger side, Oldham County Police said

The accident happened at the 11900 block of U.S. 42 and stopped traffic in the area, Lt. Col. Billy Way said in a press release. The accident also cut off electricity in a large area of the U.S. 42 corridor from Oldham to Henry County, Way said.

Fire Chief Rick Albers, the truck's driver, and Capt. Mitch Slaughter were taken to Norton Brownsboro Hospital and firefighter/EMT Thomas Woosley was taken by air ambulance to the University of Louisville Hospital, Way said.

The three injured employees were treated at local hospitals and are doing fine, North Oldham Fire Department Capt. Richard Nugent said Monday.

He said none of the injured firefighters were admitted into a hospital, and all are working or ready to return to work on their normal schedule.

Nugent said he's not sure how badly the fire truck was damaged.

3 Firefighters Injured In Fire Truck Crash

Crash Knocks Out Power To Oldham, Henry Counties

OLDHAM COUNTY, Ky. -- Several firefighters are recovering after crashing their fire truck on the way to an emergency call.

Officials said the crash happened at about 1:19 a.m. Sunday 11900 block of U.S. Highway 42 in Oldham County. The vehicle crashed between Club Drive and Goshen Lane.

Investigators said the North Oldham Fire Department vehicle was heading westbound on the highway en route to a fire at a home in the Paramount Estates subdivision.



Police said the vehicle left the road, struck two utility poles and overturned, landing on the passenger side of the truck.

Chief Rick Albers was driving the fire truck. Medics said he was taken to Norton Brownsboro Hospital. Capt. Mitch Slaughter was also taken to that hospital.

Firefighter Thomas Woosley was flown to the University of Louisville Hospital. Officials said all three only suffered minor injuries and were wearing seat belts at the time of the crash.

The crash caused a power outage to a large portion of the U.S. 42 corridor from Oldham County to Henry County. LG&E crews are working to restore service.

The highway was shut down for the repair and investigation efforts.

MUST FORM LARRY CLARK

I met in Frankfort yesterday morning with Senators Dan Seum and Robert Stivers to discuss the changes that the Chapter 75 fire districts are looking for in the legislator this session. Ellen Call along with Jack Reckner and Ron Wolfe were also there to provide critical information of how the fire service is in dire need to have these changes made as soon as possible. Everyone left the meeting feeling that great headway was made and that we would most likely be down there again next week educating other legislators of our dilemma. I will keep everyone updated on this issue as it progresses through the session.

We finally received our disbursement check from the estate of Ms. Ann Duncan. The total amount was \$49,000 \$25,000 of that money was earmarked for the vehicle rescue equipment and the other \$24,000 was for the PASS Safety System which we just received this week.

The Pass System equipment from FEMA's Homeland Security Regional Grant has finally been received and is currently being inventoried. Our share of the 80/20 split for this safety equipment was \$15,000. Other equipment to complete this system still needs to be purchased.

2 killed, 2 hurt in east Jefferson crash

4 men behind disabled pickup hit by another truck

Two men were killed and two others were hurt, at least one seriously, when they were hit by a pickup on New LaGrange Road early Sunday night.

The four men were standing behind a Ford F-150 pickup in a westbound lane of New LaGrange at Washburn Avenue after that truck had been rear-ended by a Ford Focus, Louisville Metro Police spokeswoman Alicia Smiley said.

The truck had been rear-ended by the Focus as it approached Kentucky Avenue.

After the driver of the Focus moved that vehicle from the roadway into a residential driveway, the men standing behind the truck were struck by a second F-150 that was westbound on New LaGrange, she said.

Two men died at the scene, she said, and the other two were taken to University Hospital. One was in critical condition and the other's injuries were not immediately known, she said.

The incident happened shortly after 6:30 p.m., she said.

The men standing behind the truck were those who had been in that vehicle and people who had come to help after the initial collision, Smiley said. She said police were not sure how many people initially were in the first truck.

The driver of the second truck, who was in his late teens, and the driver of the Focus were not injured, she said.

Santos Lucas, 27, of St. Matthews, told The Courier-Journal he was driving the Focus and had hit the first truck after it appeared to have stopped in the roadway and he could not stop in time.

He said he then called three friends to help, and they were among the four hit by the second truck. He said one of his friends was killed and the other two were hurt.

"I can't believe this happened," Lucas said.

He said the four had been standing behind the truck talking about the accident, and he had been standing behind the first truck himself until he went to move his Focus from the roadway. About two minutes later, he said, the second truck hit the first.

"I'm lucky because if I stayed there, I don't know what would have happened to me," he said.

Of his friends, he said one was 26, one was 40, and the one who was killed was 38. He said one of his friends had children.

"I feel so bad," he kept saying.

Smiley said the incident was under investigation, but there was no indication drugs or alcohol were involved, and police did not anticipate filing charges against anyone. While it was foggy at the time,

she said police did not believe that was a factor.

Witnesses told police all the men were in dark clothing, and Smiley said they may have been obscuring the rear lights of the truck, preventing other drivers from seeing the truck.

Victims identified in double-fatal accident on New LaGrange Road

The two men who killed after being struck by a pickup Sunday evening have been identified.

David J. Meredith, 65, of the 1700 block of Norris Place, and Omar Lopez, of the 500 block of Quails Run, were pronounced dead at the scene on New LaGrange Road about 6:15 p.m., deputy coroner Sam Weakley said. Lopez appeared to be in his late teens or early 20s, he said.

Both men died of multiple blunt-force trauma, he said.

They were struck while standing behind Meredith's Ford F-150 pickup, which had been struck by a Ford Focus. Two other men — Armando Castellano, 42, and Jovany Juarez-Marin, 25 — were also struck as they stook behind the truck and were taken to University Hospital, said Dwight Mitchell, a Louisville Metro Police spokesman.

Castellano was in serious, but stable, condition Monday afternoon and Juarez-Marin was treated and released. Mitchell said.

Police do not believe drugs or alcohol were involved, and no charges are expected to be filed in either accident, Mitchell said.

Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

January 20, 2010

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on January 20, 2010 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, John Volkerding, Jack Monohan, Faye Ellerkamp and Rick Tonini. Also present were Chief Seng, Major Dugan, Chief Monohan, Michael Monohan, Charles McCune, Derrick Miskell, Kent Monohan, George Wiggins, Brendan Montgomery and Jordan Davis.

Minutes

The minutes of the December 9th meeting were reviewed. Rick Tonini motioned that the board approve the minutes, Jack Monohan seconded and the minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report. The district has added 4 new CD's to our current investments which will add 1,000,000.00 to the district's assets. It was noted that the current CD rates in the market are much lower than in recent years.

The board spoke about corrections that need to be made to the financials to include the purchase and loan for the Pierce aerial ladder truck. It was noted that Cotton & Allen will be conducting the district's annual audit the first week of February and these changes will be made at that time.

The board also discussed paying the truck loan in full due to the interest rate on the loan vs. the lower rates that the CD's are acquiring. The discussion was tabled until the February Trustees meeting.

In light of recent events with another suburban fire district Rick Tonini spoke to the Board about being proactive concerning all Fire District funds and speaking to the Trustees Association concerning financial processes for all fire districts.

The board discussed the various accounts that the district operates and maintains and will continue to monitor and review those accounts accordingly and on a regular basis.

Jack Monohan motioned to accept the treasurer's report and Rick Tonini seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

January 19, 2010, Trustee meeting:

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported on the proposed new cell tower equipment. In speaking with Verizon, there would be the possibility of keeping the current lease and renting additional ground space for extra income. The board discussed meeting with T-Mobile to possibly see what the current agreement is between T-Mobile and Verizon.

Rick Tonini moved to table the discussion until the February Trustees meeting, Jack Monohan seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Chief Seng reported that the Chapter 75 tax cap meetings were held recently to help the districts case. He stated that the meeting went well and was encouraging toward the district

Chief Seng stated that the donation from the Duncan estate had been utilized as promised through the purchase of the new rescue equipment for 2659 and the PASS safety devices for all firefighters' turnout gear. Chief discussed the remaining funds from the estate donation could be used to complete the projects by purchasing the corresponding software and add-ons for the equipment.

Chief Seng reported that the EMS dispatching has recently changed again and that he has requested a modified delta dispatching system. This dispatching system will better serve our residents and will only add an additional 5 runs per month, on average. The board opened the discussion to the firefighters and they agreed that there are runs being missed that we need to respond to. The board turned the issue over to Chief Seng as an operational decision.

Jack Monohan motioned that the board approved the listed expenditures, Rick Tonini seconded and the motioned was approved unanimously.

Chief Seng reported that Al Ring has followed up on the history project and he wants to see where the board stands on releasing information to be published on his website.

Chief Seng discussed the possibility of sending letters to the local hospitals to ask for funding. The board discussed that a meeting with the CEO and CFO would be favorable and will try to get an appointment for a meeting in the near future.

New Business

There was no new business.

The next Trustees meeting will be held on February 11, 2010 at 12:00 Noon.

There being no further business, Rick Tonini motioned that the meeting be adjourned, Jack Monohan seconded and the motion passed unanimously at 12:55 P.M.

Metro Council resolution would study merging suburban, Louisville fire departments

A Louisville Metro Council member wants see what it would take to merge Jefferson County's 18 suburban fire districts with the Louisville fire department, so he is proposing a resolution this week to commission a feasibility study.

Dan Johnson, D-21st District, said the request comes on the heels of recent news reports about alleged financial mismanagement by McMahan Fire Chief Paul Barth, who retired last week amid administrative accusations of financial misappropriation, and a recent debate about one of Mayor Jerry Abramson's appointees to the Pleasure Ridge Park fire district board of trustees.

With questions being raised about the way suburban departments function, Johnson said the "time is right" to see whether it would be more cost effective to have one fire department in metro Louisville.

Johnson's resolution, which will get it's first reading Thursday night before it's assigned to a committee, requests that the council support asking the Legislative Resource Commission to conduct a study on merging the 18 suburban fire districts with the city department.

If the resolution was approved, it would still require the state legislature pass the resolution before the study would be done.

Part of the study would include the steps necessary to alter state law to allow the fire districts, which are funded through separate taxing districts, to join with metro government.

Mike Schmidt, chief of the Fern Creek Fire District and president of the Jefferson County Fire Chiefs Association, said no one had approached the suburban fire chiefs to discuss a study. But Schmidt said the chiefs would welcome it, since they believe suburban districts are cheaper.

"It would be cost prohibitive for 18 districts to merge with the city of Louisville," Schmidt said.

Each suburban district is a separate taxing entity that is overseen by a board of trustees, which is comprised of elected members, fire department personnel and mayoral appointees.

Since the city-county merger in 2003, several fire districts have merged, including Okolona, which took over the former Black Mudd and Edgewood districts.

But several of the fire chiefs say that changes in the fire service have driven up costs, including a shift in many departments to paid, career staffers instead of volunteers.

Because of the rising costs, several districts have been putting together a proposal for this legislative session that would lift a cap on what they are allowed to charge in taxes. Currently, districts are not allowed to exceed a 10-cents per \$100 of assessed home value tax for fire protection.

Heads of the suburban districts would like to get permission from the legislature to lift the 10-cent cap and then have residents in their districts vote on whether to pay more in taxes. No official proposal has been filed with the legislature.

Chad Carlton, a spokesman for Abramson, said the administration has not sought to merge the fire departments, saying that the mayor has not heard from constituents in those fire districts that merger

is something they want.

"It is best initiated by citizens in those districts," Carlton said.

If the council, which represents those citizens, determines that a study is needed, Carlton said the mayor would support such a study.

But he said Abramson also supports the fire districts in their efforts to address their financial needs through Frankfort.

Metro Council member Doug Hawkins, R-25th District, opposes Johnson's resolution, saying it "is the first step in the wrong direction."

Hawkins said suburban districts are better managed and more efficient than the city department.

While Hawkins said that there may be some individual departments that have room for improvement, overall, the districts function well and "can sustain themselves very well."

"I don't think we're better served with a study," Hawkins said. "It's far better that we have these separate fire districts."

McMahan names Johnson as new fire chief

Acting McMahan Fire District chief Joe Johnson was named to the position permanently Thursday night.

His appointment by the district's board of trustees follows the resignation last month of former chief Paul Barth, who had announced he was retiring in the midst of allegations he misused department funds.

The appointment is the fulfillment of a life-long dream for Johnson, whose father founded a fire department in Henry County in the 1960s.

"My dad was a fire chief, and I want to be a fire chief," Johnson said.

The board voted on the hiring after going into executive session at Thursday night's board meeting, giving Johnson a \$75,000 salary.

Johnson takes over at a time when McMahan has been besieged by scandal. Barth's resignation came days before he was scheduled to go before the board of trustees on administrative charges that he misappropriated department money, including making personal purchases on the department's credit card.

Credit-card records show that Barth made personal charges on the district card assigned to him, including more than \$15,000 in property taxes for a Florida condominium, about \$10,800 in taxes on his personal vehicles, and for Florida vacation expenses.

He was also accused of asking on-duty personnel to perform errands for him, issuing himself extra paychecks and using money earmarked for the Crusade for Children to pay off credit card bills.

Investigators with the U.S. Secret Service are looking into the allegations against Barth but have refused to comment.

Johnson, 47, said his primary goal as chief will be to restore public trust in the McMahan department, which he knows has suffered because of the allegations.

He said he will also focus on getting volunteers more involved with the department.

Johnson has been with the department for 24 years.

The February meeting for the St. Matthews Fire District Trustees meeting is this Thursday February 11th at 12:00 noon. Please contact me if you are unable to attend the meeting.

√ The main roof over the second floor area of Station 1 is in really bad shape. We literally have about twenty buckets trying to catch leaking water that is dripping from the ceiling. We are in contact with the roofing contractor who is authorized to do the warranty repairs but the leaks are developing faster than they can make the repairs. I will be able to give you more information about the repairs and the warranty at the meeting on Thursday. Comm Mt. 2-16-10 to Period

The training house also has several leaks that have developed over time; however the repair of this roof falls under the protection of our insurance policy. Our insurance policy has approved the replacement of the entire roof on the training house as soon as possible. We are currently waiting on several bids to be received before starting the work.

The only truck repair that is currently taking place is a hydraulic cylinder that goes to one of the stabilizing arms on 2658. This should be just a one day repair that will start on Monday morning of this week and should be back in service later that same afternoon.

The 2002 Chevy Tahoe that is used for inspections is in bad shape and is in need of several major repairs. We have held off on making any of these repairs because it is due to be replaced this year. It was listed in the 2009-2010 budget as a capital expenditure item that was to be replaced this year when needed. I would like to bring this up for board approval next month if there are no objections. The budgeted amount for the vehicle replacement is \$35,000.

√ The 2008-2009 financial audit by Cotton & Allen is currently taking place. The accountants were at Station 1 last week gathering information needed to complete the audit. I will keep everyone up to date on the status and when it is due to be completed.

Enclosed are several EA requests that should be self explanatory. If you have any questions on any of the requests please do not hesitate to call me.

✓ Also enclosed is a thank you letter received from Hagan Properties. This was received last week after one of the large buildings at the Shelbyville Road Plaza filled up with natural gas. They were very happy with the service we provided during their time of need.

Fire chiefs seek to raise old tax cap

Growth outpaced 1944 rate

With expenses outstripping revenue, fire chiefs from Louisville's 18 suburban fire districts are lobbying the state legislature to lift a tax cap that has been in place since 1944.

All 18 of the suburban districts have reached the cap — charging the maximum 10 cents per \$100 of assessed property value — and because they're increasingly relying on paid firefighters, fire chiefs say they need more money than the cap allows.

They support a bill that would allow districts to raise the tax rate by 2 cents every other year, up to a maximum 20 c ents per \$100. The Legislative Research Commission is revising a draft proposal, which the fire chiefs hope will soon have a sponsor and make it to the legislature for discussion.

Any bill related to revenue must clear the House before it can be discussed in the Senate.

"It's crucial to keep things from getting stagnant and putting departments in financial harm," said Fern Creek Chief Mike S chmidt, who also is president of the Jefferson County Fire Chiefs Association.

The past efforts

But fire officials have tried for several years

to get similar legislation passed to no avail. Last year a similar bill was passed by the House but died in the Senate.

Schmidt said it's hard to get support for the idea because the issue doesn't resonate in every part of the state and some fire districts in smaller areas don't need to increase their tax bases.

Under a proposal drafted by the fire chiefs, the board of trustees in a fire district would have to approve each increase by resolution and then present them to the Metro Council for final approval.

The early draft of the bill does not provide for any vote by the residents of a fire district, though boards typically hold public comment before their votes.

Volunteer to career

Many chiefs say raising the tax rate is necessary because the departments have shifted from mostly volunteer firefighters to career staff, which has raised the amount needed to pay for salary, pension and

benefits.

Also, they say, the cost of equipment and fire trucks has risen considerably in the past two decades, making replacements harder to fund in budgets.

"The pace of our expenses increasing has far outstripped our income," said Harrods Creek Chief Chris Aponte.

He said he projects his budget five years ahead, trying to save for major expenses such as renovation of one of his stations so the department can increase staffing for more round-the-clock coverage.

Based on those projections, Aponte said he would start to see a deficit in the 2013-14 fiscal year.

If the tax rate stays the same, he said he'd have to start cutting from the money allocated for building improvements and new equipment. He said that he already has deferred the purchase of three command vehicles from 2000 and 2002 that were scheduled to be replaced over the past two years.

Tax cap outdated

When the tax cap was set up in 1944, the departments were more rural and used volunteers to respond to fires.

"In 1944, they didn't envision the services we'd have to provide in these areas," Aponte said.

But over the years, as the areas grew and people had less flexibility in their work

schedules, it became necessary for some fire houses to have firefighters available 24 hours a day.

And that meant hiring career staff and paying salary, health insurance and p ension benefits for those firefighters, the chiefs say.

Some want mergers

Most departments operate with at least 70 percent of their budgets paying for staffing costs.

In Okolona, about a quarter of the nearly \$4.5 million budget goes just toward pensions and health-care costs, Okolona Chief Rich Carlson said.

And because of that, the department hasn't been able to buy a new truck or engine for five years, and is still repaying a loan it got to buy its last two trucks, he said.

"It's been definitely a strain," Carlson said.

Mayor Jerry Abramson has said he

supports the fire chiefs' efforts, saying it should be up to the people who run the districts to determine whether they need more money for their fire service.

But some, including Metro Council member Dan Johnson, D-21st District, have proposed looking at whether it is time to consider merging the suburban districts with the urban fire service, Louisville Fire & Rescue.

He has proposed urging legislators to commission a study on the issue.

Fire chiefs say a study will show that suburban fire district residents pay far less for fire service than residents of the urban area.

"I don't think (residents) realize what a bargain they're getting," Jeffersontown Chief Randy Lawson said. "Our districts do a pretty good job."

Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

February 11, 2010

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on February 11, 2010 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, John Volkerding, Faye Ellerkamp, Jack Monohan and Rick Tonini. Also present were Chief Seng, Chief Monohan, Major Dugan, Charles McCune, Mike Richardson, Nick Clark, Joe Bewley, Dan Doyle, Frank Flynn and Jordan Davis.

Minutes

The minutes of the January 20, 2010 Trustees meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved and Faye Ellerkamp seconded to approve the minutes. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Jim stated that we are currently in good shape financially. We recently made a \$200,000.00 payment on the bank loan for 2659.

Included in the financials are the four most recent CD's purchased. Jim noted that the district is staying within our budget on most expenses.

Rick Tonini moved to approve the treasurer's report. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief Seng introduced Mr. Dan Bowling from Geoghegan Roofing to the Board. Mr. Bowling attended the meeting to report on the recurring roofing problems at Station 1.

While the roof at Station 1 is currently under a 20 year warranty through Honeywell to repair all leaks, the second level roof of the Station is leaking badly. Mr. Bowling explained that Geoghegan is currently honoring the warranty; however they will not replace the damaged roof. A suggestion was made by Mr. Bowling to replace the old leaking roof with a "built up" type material that would be longer lasting and withstand years of UV Rays, Hail and inclement weather.

February 11, 2010, Trustee meeting:

Mr. Bowling explained that Honeywell would be willing to give the Fire District an allowance toward rebuilding the Station 1 roof. The district's final cost would be estimated to be around \$20,000 to \$23,000.

Chairman Eifler suggested that the Board form a committee to decide the best outcome for the Station 1 roof replacement. The committee will meet on February 16th to determine how to move forward with the issue.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

The district has recently started responding to a modified delta dispatch system. Since it has begun we have responded to one run that we would have not made with the former system. Chief will keep everyone up to date on the progress of the system.

Regarding the cell tower equipment, Chief Seng has been working with Jennifer Sturgeon on different issues concerning the project. T-Mobile is seeking to void the current lease that they have with the district and begin a new one. This decision would possibly result in an increased rent income from Verizon each month. As spoke about in prior meetings, the district needs a copy of the agreement between Verizon and T-Mobile to move forward.

The Board decided to table the discussion on the cell tower until the March Trustees meeting.

Chief Seng reported that the training house roof is being replaced under our insurance policy due to leaks.

Chief reported that the districts 2008/2009 financial audit report will be complete at the March Trustees meeting. Travis Frick from Cotton & Allen will be attending the meeting.

Chief reported that an unfortunate accident happened with 2691 where the snow plow hit a parked car door. The estimate is \$2,100.00 to repair the damaged vehicle.

The district is currently maintaining an ISO rating of 2 verified by recent reports that were received by the district.

On February 16th the pre-trial meetings will begin for the arson case for Campbell's Gourmet Cottage.

Evidence entered against woman accused of arson in business fire

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) - Susan Lukjan, the woman accused of burning down her business was in court Tuesday for a pre-trial conference as prosecutors submitted evidence against her.

After nearly three months of compiling evidence, prosecutors handed over a disk with crucial details for Susan Lukjan's case.

"There's a lot of financial records, it involves some personal information," said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Leland Hulbert.

The Discovery material fills 28 binders, and Hulbert said it took a lot of work to pull it all together.

"We had to scan every single page in we have to number every page," said Hulbert.

The information was obtained through local and federal investigations into Lukjan's business - Campbell's Gourmet Cottage - after she was accused of burning it down for insurance money so she could relocate. The allegations date back to August 2006 when the business was located on Sherrin Avenue, near Trinity High School.

"This is a big load of discovery that's been dumped on us today," Clay said. "And we'll have to try to sort through it and find out where we stand. It's going to be a slow process and I'm hoping we can get it done by the time the case is set for trial in May."

Another pretrial conference was scheduled for April 13.





Fire Protection District gets federal grant to help pay for lighter, safer helmets

The St. Matthews Fire Protection District won a federal grant in January to help pay for 50 new helmets.

The \$8,100 matching grant from the U.S. Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG) program enabled the district to replace helmets more than 10 years old. The new helmets are lighter and meet national fire safety equipment standards.

The aim of the AFG program is to meet the firefighting and emergency-response needs of U.S. fire departments and emergency medical service organizations.

Since 2001, AFG has helped first responders obtain critically needed equipment, protective gear, emergency vehicles, training and other resources needed to protect



the public and emergency personnel from fire and related hazards.

In 2009 the district received a \$346,500 AFG grant to help pay for a new 100-foot ladder truck that replaced one that was 23 years old.

The St. Matthews District operates two stations manned by both full-time and volunteer firefighters. It protects the part of St. Matthews north of the Watterson Expressway and 11 neighboring small cities. It is one of 19 fire districts in metro Louisville.

Worthington Fire chief removed

Worthington Fire Department Chief Gary Yurt has been removed from his position, a member of the fire department's board of trustees said Thursday night.

Robert W. McKinley confirmed Thursday night Yurt was removed, but declined to give any additional information, saying only that a press release would be issued Friday morning.

Yurt did not return a call for comment Thursday night.

He has been chief at Worthington since 2002, when he became the department's first full-time chief after 18 years with the Buechel Fire District, where he eventually rose to assistant chief.

Yurt replaced former chief Bert Croghan, who resigned and sued the fire department saying it ignored state law by allowing a former coworker to libel and slander him at a public meeting.

At the time of his hire, Yurt told The Courier-Journal: "I expect to be here for 20 years."

Yurt managed 78 paid and volunteer firefighters, according to the department's Web site.

The Worthington Fire Department covers 19 square miles of northeast Jefferson

County, including six-and-a-half miles of Interstate 71 and five miles of Interstate 265, according to the department's Web site.

The department is made up of career and volunteer firefighters and responds to more than 1,800 fire and medical emergencies each year, according to the Web site.

- ✓ Enclosed you will find the latest Legislative Report of what is going on in Frankfort as it relates to legislation that could potentially affect the fire service. The status of HB 535 which would allow the Jefferson County fire districts the ability to provide transportation services has been grounded. As it stands now there will not be any legislation that will allow the fire districts to increase their revenue. I will be able to give you more detailed information during the Trustee meeting.
- ✓ Last Sunday evening we had a working fire located at 4022 St. Germaine Court. The fire was contained to a detached garage which was totally destroyed. Also destroyed in the fire were two cars and one Harley Davidson motorcycle. The fire was started when the home owner lit his gas grill in the garage and left it unattended for a period of time. The estimated dollar lost on this fire was about \$100,000.00 No one was injured and everyone did an excellent job extinguishing the blaze.
- The main roof over the second floor still has major leak problems. The Trustees last month put together a committee to study our options as it relates to the repair or replacement of our leaky roof. A detailed report will be presented during the Trustees meeting on Thursday.
- VThe training house roof is currently being reroofed. It should be completed by next week if the weather holds out.

The 2002 Tahoe which has approximately 116,000 miles, is in bad need to be replaced. We have held off on doing any major work to the car since it was due to be replaced this year. The 2009-2010 Budget included the replacement of this vehicle under its Capital Expenditure List for \$35,000. The Kentucky State contract price for the 2010 Tahoe is \$31,816. Please see the enclosed EA for details.

March 11, 2010

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on March 11, 2010 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Minutes

The minutes of the February 11, 2010 meeting were reviewed. Rick Tonini moved; Jack Monohan seconded that the minutes be approved. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report.

Our CRC revenue for February was \$707.93.

The District ended February the 8th month of the fiscal year in excellent shape with total expenses of 73.83% of the budget.

A \$200,000 principal payment was made to Commonwealth Bank on the loan for the new truck 2659.

Roy Hill & Travis Frick with Cotton and Allen reviewed with the board the draft our 2008-2009 audit. They found no major problems and the final audit should be completed by next months meeting.

Roofing Committee

Rick Tonini moved to approve \$28,000 to replace the main roof at station one using the recommended 4 ply fiberglass felt in Permamop asphalt with flood coat & gravel surface. Jack Monohan seconded, the motion passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items:

The new EMS dispatching response level appeared to add about 7 extra runs for February. He will keep a close eye on the longer term changes and report back to the board.

Verizon Wireless still wants to co locate on the cell tower at station 2. The dept has a tentative agreement to lease them ground space for \$1000 per month. They are in the process of working out a contract for tower space with T-Mobile. The dept will receive 50% of this amount per our contract with T-Mobile. Once the deal is complete the district will need to review and approve the final contracts.

Rick Tonini moved to leave approval of final agreement in the hands of Jim Graven, Tom Eifler and Chief Seng. Jack Monohan seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Chief Seng requested the following expenditures for March 2010.

- The regular scheduled Trustees meeting for April is this Thursday at 12 noon.
- The two new driver seats for 2633 and 2634 that were approved last month have been installed and are working great.
- The new 2010 Chevy Tahoe was ordered several weeks ago and should be delivered somewhere around the end of April. The District will need to declare the 2000 Chevy Tahoe surplus at our next meeting so we can sell it on E-Bay as soon as the new vehicle arrives.
- Last Friday evening we had a small house fire in the 200 block of South Hubbard's Lane. The fire was contained to the dryer, but it caused heavy smoke damage throughout the home. Everything went really well and most importantly, nobody was hurt.
- Susan Lukjan, the owner of the Campbell's Gourmet Cottage is scheduled for a pre-trial hearing on Tuesday April 13th. I am not really sure what goes on in these pre-trial hearings but as soon as I hear anything I will report back to you. I think the hearings involve each side exchanging information and evidence that has been discovered during the course of their investigations.

- The training house roof replacement has been completed and we are still waiting on the roof replacement of the main firehouse to start any week. Since the original winter freeze that started the whole mess on the second floor we have not experienced any more leaking even after a light rain. Geoghegan roofing has stated that they should be out within the next several weeks to start the project, which should take about one full week to complete.
- Treasurer Jim Graven and I have been working on a draft budget for the upcoming new fiscal year but we will not be able to provide anything definite until the PVA provides us with our preliminary property tax numbers. The latest word from the PVA is that they may be available around the middle of April.
- √ The St. Matthews Fire District is now on its own group policy as it relates to health care insurance for our full time firefighters. As of April 1st we left the Jefferson County Firefighters group plan to go out on our own after realizing that there was going to be a \$100,000 savings in premiums for the year. Hopefully Major Dugan and I will educate our employees enough so that they will be good users of the plan as it relates to hospital and doctor office visits. By making these changes over the year, when it is time for next year's renewal we should see just a small increase in our premium payments.

Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

April 8, 2010

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on April 8, 2010 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Tom Eifler, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, John Volkerding, Jack Monohan and Rick Tonini. Also present were Chief Seng, Mike Richardson, Michael Monohan, Patrick Montague, Mike Willinger, Mike Frantz, Joe Wolfe, Moss Clore, Walter Sales and Jordan Davis.

Minutes

The minutes of the March 11, 2010 meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved to approve the minutes, Rick Tonini seconded, and the minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report. He stated that our investments are not earning as much interest as he would like and he is looking into moving the lower interest CD's to higher earning investments.

Chief Seng and Mr. Graven are looking at the 2010-2011 budget and will have numbers to present by the May Trustees meeting.

Chief Seng mentioned that the PVA numbers will be ready soon and this will help in preparing the budget.

Hard copies of the 2008-2009 financial audit, prepared by Cotton & Allen, were distributed to each Trustee.

Robin Stilger, a private CPA has been asked to help out with some financial reporting oversight during Jordan's maternity leave. Chief Seng will be in contact with Robin to discuss how she can best help the Fire District during this time.

Jack Monohan moved to approve the Treasurer's report as given, John Volkerding seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Walter Sales from Stoll, Keenon, Ogden gave an update on the property tax matter that has been ongoing for some time now. Walter gave a summary of the past years events leading up to where we are now.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported that negotiations on the cell tower equipment are ongoing and we are still in contact with Verizon on how to move forward. Chief Seng will report any changes at the next Trustees meeting.

Station 1 is currently having its new roof installed. The district's insurance will cover the painting, carpet and cleaning of all water damaged areas of the firehouse.

The replacement vehicle for the 2001 Tahoe will be in by the end of April. Jack Monohan made a motion to declare the 2001 Tahoe as surplus, Rick Tonini seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Chief Seng reported that the Campbell's Gourmet Cottage court case is scheduled to be heard on May 11th and several members of the department may be asked to testify at the trial. Chief Seng will keep everyone updated as the trial begins.

There were no expenditure requests for April.

Old Business

Chief Seng reported that the district has switched health insurance carriers effective April 1st. This change was necessary due to a drastic increase in rates with our current carrier at the time. Because of the change, the district was able to save close to 100,000.00 per year in Health Insurance costs. Chief Seng and Major Dugan conducted health insurance meetings at the end of March to teach our members how to better utilize their insurance. The broker for our new plan is Sterling G. Thompson Co. and on March 26th they held an Insurance meeting at Station 1 to explain our new benefits and offer any assistance the district might need during this transition.

The district received a letter from the Jefferson County Health Insurance Program stating that we will be responsible for any run-out health claims from April 1st through June 30 for our prior insurance. The district agreed to have Med-Ben administer the payment of these claims and has made a payment to cover the administration costs.

New Business

Jim Graven's appointment by Mayor Abramson will be due for renewal on June 30th. Jack Monohan made a motion to send a renewal letter to the state requesting another term, Rick Tonini seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

April 8, 2010, Trustee meeting:

Chairman Eifler recently met with Crusade President Dawn Gee to speak about Crusade efforts. The board posed a question to the firefighters requesting that they give feedback on the Crusade collection process. Sam McCune spoke to all of the district's firefighters to gather opinions on collecting money, etc. The overall opinion of the firefighters was that they would still like to collect money and help the Crusade like we have in the past.

John Volkerding spoke about the changes that were made to last year's Crusade efforts and everyone agreed that last year's schedule was much improved. The district utilized community volunteers and helpers to participate with door to door collections and fewer and less lengthy road blocks to reduce the workload on our firefighters.


Chief Seng requested that the district hire a summer intern this year as we have in the past. The district has had one applicant, a current volunteer named Ty Unthank.

Metro Council encourages fire district to post records online

The Louisville Metro Council passed a resolution Thursday night urging the county's 18 suburban fire protection districts to put records of their annual budgets, financial expenditures and receipts online.

At the meeting, council members say they intend to post on the metro government Web site several reports that each fire district is required by law to file with state government.

Council member Kevin Kramer, R-11th District, said that at a minimum and within two or three months, each suburban department's yearly audit and its annual report, a year-end synopsis of its activities and business, will be posted on the metro Web site, www.louisvilleky.gov.

City finance officials get a copy of those two required reports that are filed with the state, Kramer said.

He said that other reports and documents — such as the minutes of fire district trustee meetings — also can be posted on the city Web site, as long as there is sufficient capacity. The council members said they didn't believe it would be very costly or time-consuming for the metro technology staff to post the suburban fire data.

Kramer and fellow council member Dan Johnson, D-21st, were the primary sponsors of the resolution. Johnson said only a handful of suburban departments don't have their own Web sites, but that many of the others that do post financial and other information on their own Web sites have been doing so somewhat haphazardly.

Johnson said it is becoming increasingly important for the public to have access to information on the suburban fire departments as they come under increasing financial pressure, mainly because of a tax-rate cap.

In other business, the council:

* Passed an ordinance creating a ninemember Commission on Public Art that will oversee a fund that can be used chiefly by

non-profit groups to help pursue public art projects.

The new commission is to maintain the city's inventory of public art and acquire new artwork.

- * Approved a change from EZ Enterprise Zoning to M-3 Industrial zoning in the 7200 block of Grade Lane for a scrapmetal-processing operation.
- * Authorized the city to apply to the state for a \$500,000 economic-development bond grant as a financial incentive for Signature HealthCARE, which recently announced that it plans to move its headquarters from Florida to Louisville.
- * Introduced a resolution proposing support for the Metro Department of Public Health and Wellness' planned educational campaign on the dangers of the consumption of trans fats.

Suburban fire districts say financing may force cuts

Shackled by tax caps and rising employee costs, Jefferson County's suburban fire districts say they may be forced to make major service cuts this summer, including foregoing some medical runs or leaving stations temporarily unstaffed.

"We're at a crisis point," said Fern Creek Fire Chief Mike Schmidt, who serves as president of the association of 18 suburban fire chiefs. "People are starting to get reduced services in some districts. If we wait until every district is at a crisis point, we're beyond a crisis — we're at an emergency."

Suburban fire chiefs say their budgets can't keep up with rising health-care and suburban districts assess the maximum tax rate of 10 cents per \$100 of home value.

But the news got worse last week, when the Jefferson County PVA notified 12 districts that they will likely see less property tax revenue next year because property assessment values have dropped.

"This adds more stress to an already difficult situation," said Lyndon Fire Chief Russ Rakestraw, who estimates that the new assessments will mean \$32,000 less revenue for 2010 in his district alone.

The resulting budget crunch has prompted Rakestraw to warn residents that they can expect service cuts as soon as July.

Lyndon Fire sent letters saying it will cut services, which

Rakestraw said will likely mean instituting rolling brownouts at fire stations.

That would mean leaving one of the district's two stations unstaffed on some days. That could start as early as July, when a new fiscal year and budget take effect. He said he, his command staff and the district's fire board are working out budget details, but cuts are imminent.

"We want to be all things to all people, but we can't do that anymore," Rakestraw said. "We feel a strong sense of urgency."

Chiefs from two other departments, Fairdale and Middletown, said they also are anticipating reductions in their upcoming budgets, which take effect in July.

Fairdale Chief Don Wittry said an increase in health insurance and pension costs has left his department with an \$85,000 deficit for the rest of this fiscal year. To make up the difference, the department will use part of its \$250,000 reserve fund that was going to be used to buy a new fire truck.

"We can do that once, maybe twice," Wittry said

Now Wittry said he must find ways to make cuts that will provide more long-term savings.

To start, he said Fairdale firefighters will only go to the most crucial medical runs, such as cardiac arrests. The department currently goes to a wider variety of runs, including some that are not considered life-threatening.

Wittry estimates the district could save \$18,000 to \$20,000 by cutting back on medical runs. Last year, Fairdale Fire answered more than 1,200 medical calls for service, according to statistics from the dispatch system.

Middletown Fire Chief Jeffrey Riddle said his board is trying to determine where it can cut back. Because the district's revenues dropped as much as 6 percent in 2008 and 1.9 percent in 2009, it will need to make changes, he said. This year the department had revenue of about \$5.25 million.

Although nothing is definite, he said the board is considering changes that would affect hydrant testing, fire inspections of businesses, public education projects, and filling overtime, which could mean closing a station if staffing falls below a certain level because of sickness or vacation.

Fern Creek's Schmidt said that suburban districts were further stressed when they learnedin February that their health-care program would be raising its rates by 49 percent. By raising out-of-pocket expenses for firefighters, the districts reduced the increase to 26 percent, Schmidt said.

Chiefs said they are struggling to come up with strategies to combat the increase.

Rakestraw said Lyndon officials discussed the possibility of starting an ambulance service, which would allow the district to collect additional tax revenue.

The district filed a letter of intent to apply for the service in December, but withdrew

it in January after it became clear that Louisville Mayor Jerry Abramson would not support the effort, which is required.


"To splinter the EMS comprehensive coverage is a mistake," Abramson said in an interview. "I do not see an unmet need."

Wittry agrees that adding an ambulance doesn't solve the long-term problem because it adds another layer of costs.

Still, something will have to change, he said.

"This is something we're going to be dealing with for a long time," Wittry said. "I don't see a shining knight coming in to save us."

Fire damages several apartments off Hikes Lane

At least two apartment units were left uninhabitable and several others were damaged after a fire in an apartment building off Hikes Lane on Wednesday night, said McMahan Fire Protection District Chief Joe Johnson.

Four fire companies responded after the fire was reported at the Nottingham Court Apartments in the 3200 block of Orchard Manor Circle shortly before 7 p.m., Johnson said.

When crews arrived on the scene, fire was pouring from windows of an apartment on the second floor and lapping up to the unit on the top floor above it, Johnson said.

No injuries were reported. The person who lived in the apartment where the fire started had removed a smoke detector a month earlier, but was awoken by neighbors knocking on his door and escorted to safety, Johnson said.

It took 25 firefighters about 20 minutes to bring the fire under control. Johnson said

Besides McMahan, crews from the Jeffersontown, Buechel and St. Matthews fire protection districts also responded, Johnson said.

The unit where the fire began and the one directly above it were uninhabitable because of the damage, Johnson said. The rest of the building, which includes 12 units, has smoke damage and some water damage. Nine of those units were occupied and all the residents were being advised by the Red Cross about where to stay, Johnson said.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. -- A teenager and a stranger ran inside a burning building to save several people, including four young children, at the Nottingham Court Apartments in the 3200 block of Orchard Manor Circle in Hikes Point.

Around 7 p.m. Wednesday, 15-yearold Nadine Blihar noticed one of the units in her Hikes Point apartment building was on fire.

"There were flames bursting out of the windows," Blihar said. "And I screamed because I got so scared just knowing that my nephew was in there."

Blihar was babysitting her nieces and nephews -- ages 8, 3, 2 and 4 months.

"There was a young girl screaming there was kids inside," said Dennis Scott, a neighbor. "So I guess my adrenaline just kicked in and we ran in and started kicking doors."

Scott said one of the doors he kicked open was to the apartment on the second floor, where a man was asleep on the couch inside.

"We kicked the first door where the fire was at and he came running out with the smoke," Scott said. "It was cloudy and the smoke was kind of thick. But once we kicked on the door where the fire was, it really poured out. It really got thick."

With smoke filling the building, Scott said he helped Blihar rescue her 4month-old nephew.

"It just seemed like a flash," Blihar said. "I don't even remember running through the house. I just remember seeing smoke and getting him and handing him off and running back up to the other kids."

"She ran in with me," Scott said. "And she picked him up and I grabbed him from her and we both ran out."

Everyone made it out of the burning building safely.

A short time later, about 25 firefighters from four companies arrived on the scene, put out the fire and began sifting through rubble, trying to figure out how it started.

"There's a total of 12 units," said McMahan Fire District Chief Joe Johnson. "Two of them are damaged."

"I'm 21 and I just had my son," Scott said. "And I guess I thought about him and if it was my child, and I ran in."

"I would do it all over again," Blihar said. "I just want to see everyone safe."

Firefighters from the McMahan Fire District, Jeffersontown, Beuchel and St. Matthews responded to the scene.

Johnson said smoke alarms were going off in the hallways of the building.

No one was injured.

New Crusade policies tighten fire-fighter fund-raising

Firefighters collecting for the WHAS Crusade for Children campaign will face tighter controls on their fundraising in the wake of allegations that former McMahan Fire Chief Paul Barth embezzled at least \$189,000 meant for the organization over the past several years.

The Crusade unveiled new guidelines Thursday that mandate that any Crusade-related account set up by fire departments require two department signatures and not be used to collect donations, even temporarily. The accounts can hold enough money to pay expenses for events sponsored to benefit the Crusade, such at golf scrambles or fishing tournaments.

The new policies, which are effective immediately, also require that at least two people, who aren't related, count collections and make bank deposits to the Crusade. The organization also wants all donation checks made out to the Crusade to be marked as deposit-only and brought to the Crusade office for processing —not

deposited in a department account.

"Our hope is that (the changes) reassure the public that when they give a dollar, it's going to where they intended," said Dawn Lee, president of the Crusade, who has expressed concern over whether public giving for this year's Crusade — which wraps up with June 6 — will be affected by the scandal.

The new policies come after allegations that Barth, former chairman for the Crusade's board of directors, took money meant for the Crusade and funneled it through an account he set up through the McMahan fire district. Barth was the only signer on the account, which was not part of the Crusade's accounting system.

Barth was indicted in federal court on April 5 on 16 charges, including mail fraud, wire fraud and money laundering.

The federal indictment alleges that Barth used at least \$189,000 to pay himself additional salary, make cash withdrawals for himself, pay a district credit card that contained personal expenses and make other personal payments.

The allegations prompted the Crusade

board, where Barth served as chairman until he was removed in January, to rethink its policies, Lee said.

"In that aftermath, we thought we needed to strengthen our procedures," she said.

Other changes require that all outside fund-raising events be approved by the Crusade and mandate that all budget accounting from those events be submitted to the Crusade within 30 days to ensure they were handled properly, according to a letter sent to fire chiefs Thursday.

The guidelines also advise districts that any account they set up in connection with the Crusade should be included in the district's audit process, and the findings shared with the Crusade

New McMahan Fire Chief Joe Johnson said it has been embarrassing for his department to be connected with a Crusade scandal, and he understands that stricter guidelines were necessary. He said his department will no longer be using a separate account for the Crusade.

While the district considered foregoing fund-raising for this year's Crusade, he said members felt strongly that they should continue to be involved. The district has formed a committee to oversee the process, Johnson said.

"We're going to pull our bootstraps up and get out there and do it," Johnson said. "We know we're going to take some punches. But one person does not make the whole organization."

Firefighters serve a critical role in collecting for the Crusade, taking donations at street corners, holding fundraisers and sending out mail solicitations to their residents. Some make door-to-door visits to residents seeking donations and take other donations throughout the year.

In 2009, fire departments were responsible for collecting 59 percent, or \$3,118,951, of the Crusade's donations, which totaled \$5,289,841. This year's Crusade weekend is June 5 6.

Since it began 56 years ago, the Crusade has raised more than \$133 million to provide grants to organizations that assist children with special needs throughout Kentucky and Southern Indiana.

New McMahan Fire Chief Joe Johnson said it Jeff Riddle, chief of Middletown Fire, said has been embarrassing for his department to be connected with a Crusade scandal.

"I don't see any problems with what they're

doing," Riddle said. "They have to safeguard against what's happened. Anything to try to reassure the public is good."

While he understands the guidelines needed to be tightened, Fairdale Chief Don Wittry said it will have an effect on collections this year.

Already, the Fairdale department cancelled a fishing tournament it has held the past 1 0 years because department officials weren't sure whether they could use donations made to the Crusade to provide prizes for the tournament. Wittry said the tournament has raised as much as \$7,000 in past years.

Wittry said he was already scaling back his department's fundraising efforts as they face a budget shortfall. Instead of collecting for seven days this year, they will collect for three in limited areas.

Still, he said he understands the need for tighter regulations.

"It clarifies the issues for us," he said. "It's more important that we do what we're supposed to do than anything else."

Mike Schmidt, the chief in Fern Creek, which raised \$231,580 for the Crusade last year, said the new policies will require some adjustments in his department. Fern Creek has a department account for the Crusade and has used it to hold checks sent in during non-Crusade months.

But regardless of the changes, Schmidt says his department remains committed to raising money for the charity.

"It's probably not going to be a big deal," he said.

Video shows car of arson suspect leaving scene just before fire

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) – Surveillance video from Trinity High School may help the prosecution's case against Susan Lukjan. A fire at her business on August 19, 2006, has been ruled arson, and she is charged with setting it. The video appears to show her leaving Campbell's Gourmet Cottage 13 minutes before there was noticeable smoke.

The video appears to show Lukjan's red SUV near the business the evening of the fire. At 5:06 p.m., the video shows the car passing Trinity High School on Sherrin Avenue. At 5:19 p.m., the auditorium camera shows smoke coming from the building, just 13 minutes after Lukjan's car drives away.

Fire reports state the first fire started in the basement, but then there was a second on the first floor.

"There are so many twists and turns in this case that are going to come out in trial," said defense attorney Thomas Clay. "There are three other people who saw a different vehicle close to where this fire originated as a fire was coming out of the building literally."

The discovery shows a history between Lukjan and Trinity High School. In 2002, Lukjan refused money to move her business. Trinity bought the building and property in 2003. Lukjan filed a lawsuit against Trinity in 2005 because there weren't enough parking spots. It was settled a month later. In March 2006, both Trinity and Lukjan agreed to terminate her lease, just months before the fire.

"Trinity, as the landlord, had upped its insurance coverage on this property a few months before the fire," said Clay. "So the only business, really, who had an interest in seeing this building compromised or destroyed - well I'll leave that for you to fill in the blank."

The prosecution declined to comment on the pending case, but we expect they will argue that Lukjan set the fire because she needed the money.

"She was not in financial straits," Clay said. "In fact her business is ongoing right now. She had no incentive whatsoever to set this fire because she was basically occupying these premises rent free until she was due to vacate and move to a new location."

The discovery also has an interview from a witness who saw Lukjan storing "piles" of business "material" days before the fire.

"Ms. Lukjan stocks up on her holiday merchandise in the off-season," said Clay. "So she had all of this stuff shipped into her business, but she didn't have space to store it in the cottage so she took it home."

Judge denies request from Lukjan's attorney for access to emails

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) - A woman accused of burning down her business for insurance money was set to go on trial in mid-May, and her attorney's request for access to email evidence was denied Tuesday.

Susan Lukjan, the owner of Campbell's Gourmet Cottage on Sherrin Avenue near Trinity High School, was in court May 5. During that pretrial hearing, Thomas Clay, Lukjan's attorney, requested to see emails between fire investigators.

"These emails are statements by witnesses that relate to the subject matter and testimony, I believe," Clay said. "Now, I don't have a crystal ball that allows me to peer into these emails and magically fathom what's in there."

The judge decided those emails do not have to be handed over.

Lukjan became a suspect in the arson just a few days after the fire that destroyed her building in August of 2006. If convicted of all the charges, she could face a maximum of 30 years behind bars.

Fire damages home off Lime Kiln Lane

A house fire off Lime Kiln Lane in northeast Jefferson County on Sunday night sent smoke billowing into the sky that was visible from the Watterson Expressway, prompting several calls to authorities and sending firefighters on a quest to find its source.

No one was home at the scene of the fire at 6414 Lime Ridge Place, and before learning the address of the residence, all firefighters had to go on were reports of fire in the vicinity of Holiday Manor shopping center.

"We were driving up and down the street, following smoke signals," said Jamey Schwab, assistant chief of the Harrods Creek Fire Protection District.

Forty firefighters from the Harrods Creek, Worthington and Lyndon fire protection districts responded as neighborhood onlookers watched them battle the fire, which Schwab said primarily damaged the kitchen and garage of the two-story colonial-style home.

Firefighters arrived on scene at 8:38 pm, five minutes after being dispatched, and in 31 minutes had the blaze under control. No one was injured.

Schwab said the cause of the fire is under investigation, and that it was put out before the couple who lived in the home could be

notified.



The kitchen was really going as you can tell in the after photos. As we got a handle on the kitchen, I had my other firefighter, Nick Heilmann, do a primary search of the first floor behind us because at this point we still did not know if the house was occupied or not. Enclosed you will find a copy of a draft budget that will be proposed at this Thursday's meeting! There are some notes made on the draft copy to include some of the changes. Please give me a call before the meeting if you have any questions.

The new 2010 Chevy Tahoe has been delivered and is currently being outfitted with communication and emergency warning equipment. Unit 2631's hydraulic generator broke down last week because of a part failure. The new replacement part was just received this week and should be placed back into service by the end of the week. The cost of the replacement part was around 3,000. We will be performing the labor to repair it ourselves.

The roof project for Station 1 was completed several weeks ago. We are still evaluating to see if it will need any of the roof drains installed to help in the drainage process. The entire second floor was damaged by this roof failure. The districts liability insurance picked up the cost of replacing all of the ceiling tiles and the painting of the entire second floor. The insurance damage alone was around \$21,000.

Tomorrow morning will be the start of Ms. Susan Lukjan's arson case at the Hall of Justice in downtown Louisville. The case is expected to last two or three days. Please give me a call if you are interested in attending.

2006 high-profile arson case moves to trial

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) – The woman accused of burning down her own business for insurance money is one step closer to a jury trial.

Susan Lukjan is facing arson charges for allegedly setting a fire at her business, Campbell's Gourmet Cottage, in August of 2006.

On May 11, a pre-trial hearing for the case was held which lasted about two hours. The prosecution and defense then had the opportunity to button up any last-minute issues. For the defense, that meant nailing down some e-mails from arson investigators.

After the pre-trial came to a mutual agreement between the two parties and the judge, jury selection began. That could take a couple of hours to a couple of days.

Video recently made available shows Lukjan allegedly her leaving Campbell's Gourmet Cottage 13 minutes before there was noticeable smoke.

The video appears to show Lukjan's red SUV near the business the evening of the fire. At 5:06 p.m., the video shows the car passing Trinity High School on Sherrin Avenue. At 5:19 p.m., the auditorium camera shows smoke coming from the building, just 13 minutes after Lukjan's car drives away.

Fire reports state the first fire started in the basement, but then there was a second on the first floor.

"There are so many twists and turns in this case that are going to come out in trial," said defense attorney Thomas Clay. "There are three other people who saw a different vehicle close to where this fire originated as a fire was coming out of the building literally."

The discovery shows a history between Lukjan and Trinity High School. In 2002, Lukjan refused money to move her business. Trinity bought the building and property in 2003. Lukjan filed a lawsuit against Trinity in 2005 because there weren't enough parking spots. It was settled a month later. In March 2006, both Trinity and Lukjan agreed to terminate her lease, just months before the fire.

"Trinity, as the landlord, had upped its insurance coverage on this property a few months before the fire," said Clay. "So the only business, really, who had an interest in seeing this building compromised or destroyed - well I'll leave that for you to fill in the blank."

The prosecution declined to comment on the pending case, but we expect they will argue that Lukjan set the fire because she needed the money.

"She was not in financial straits," Clay said. "In fact her business is ongoing right now. She had no incentive whatsoever to set this fire because she was basically occupying these premises rent free until she was due to vacate and move to a new location."

The discovery also has an interview from a witness who saw Lukjan storing "piles" of business "material" days before the fire.

"Ms. Lukjan stocks up on her holiday merchandise in the off-season," said Clay. "So she had all of this stuff shipped into her business, but she didn't have space to store it in the cottage so she took it home."

As soon as a jury is selected, the trial will begin. It is expected the trial could take up to two weeks.

Lukjan had previously been in a legal battle with the Trinity High School Foundation, which owned the property her business sat on.

Fire investigators said she set the store on fire to collect money from the insurance company so the store could move to a new location.

According to Clay, the business already had a lease agreement for a new property when it went up in flames.

According to that lease, the landlord would give the business an allowance of \$175,000 and any unused money could go toward rent.

The business burned down less than a year before the new location was set to open.

Her store has since reopened and Lukjan said she hopes after trial, she can begin to rebuild her life as well.

WLKY News tried speaking to the prosecutor, but he said as a matter of policy the Commonwealth's attorney's office does not comment when trials are under way.

The trial is expected to go at least a week or two. If convicted, Lukjan faces up to 30 years in prison.

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) - The prosecution in the case against Susan Lukjan wasted no time trying to make her look like an arsonist in their opening statements.

During the May 12 proceedings, prosecutors used every brush available to try to paint her as the person responsible for the fire in the building that housed her St. Matthews area business.



The prosecution says it has mounting evidence against Lukjan, which it presented a substantial part of in its 30 minutes of opening statements Wednesday.

Among other things, the prosecution claims Lukjan increased her insurance on the items inside her business – Campbell's Gourmet Cottage – by about \$100,000 just a few months before the fire.

The prosecution says she let her employee go home early the day of the fire – August 16, 2006. Prosecutors also took issue with what Lukjan was doing the afternoon of the fire. She told investigators that she had to take her daughter to a school dance that afternoon, but prosecutors say it turns out there wasn't a dance that day.

Fire investigators also say they found boxes and packing supplies littered throughout the basement of the building, with the basement door ajar. The fire started along the basement floor, investigators say, and the materials there - along with the open basement door - allowed oxygen to basically add fuel the fire.

Another issue centers around surveillance cameras. Prosecutors say Lukjan asked neighboring Trinity High School if its cameras taped her property – claiming that she was concerned about crime in the area.

School officials told her that their cameras did not videotape her property. Lukjan's business went up in flames eight days later.

This, along with a handful of witnesses, is a sampling of what the prosecution is using in their case to make a jury believe that Lukjan set fire to the building.

What the defense has to say in response to clear her name remains to be seen. The defense attorney voluntarily opted to not make opening statements after the prosecution - an unusual tactic.

With no opening statements immediately coming from the defense, the prosecution began calling witnesses.

If convicted of arson and fraud, Lukjan could face up to 30 years behind bars. Her trial is expected to take about two weeks.





Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

May 27, 2010

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on May 27, 2010 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Chairman Eifler, Jim Graven, John Volkerding, Sam McCune, Jack Monohan and Rick Tonini. Also present were Chief Seng, Dave Dugan, Chief Monohan, Nick Clark, Frank Flynn, Joe Bewley, Ty Unthank, Mike Richardson, Kevin Moulton, Charles McCune and Jordan Davis.

Minutes

The minutes of the April 8, 2010 meeting were reviewed. Jack Monohan moved that April minutes be approved, Rick Tonini seconded and the minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Jim Graven gave the treasurer's report. The First Capital Bank CD was recently cashed and applied toward our monthly expenses in the Commonwealth Checking account. The next CD the district should look at moving would be the Stock Yards account which is only receiving a 1% return.

Chief Seng commented on the next fiscal year 2010-2011budget. Chief Seng explained that for every 1% raise in employee salary it creates a \$20,000 increase in expenses. There was discussion concerning the exercise program and the possibility of decreasing that budget by half to help offset the cost of raises. Mr. Graven mentioned that we could look into what it would cost for the employees to be reimbursed for individual club memberships. The point was made that the exercise program is so beneficial because of it being in house and convenient for the on-duty staff.

The district's overtime budget for the year is steadily taking away from our budget every year. This is something that will have to be closely monitored presently and in years to come.

In looking at the Capital Expenditure list, Chairman Eifler mentioned that the district could save money by leasing a new copier instead of buying a new one. This was noted by Chief Seng and he will look into this further.

The Health Insurance category included an increase in the Benovation HRA fees which has not seen an increase in two years. This increase would allow each participant to apply an extra \$500.00 per year to their health reimbursement cards.

The board discussed paying down the truck loan in the future. Rick Tonini suggested that we still try to meet with the local hospitals to ask for help on the remaining balance. The issue was tabled and it was decided to wait until the June meeting to discuss the issue further.

The board approved a 2% pay increase to Career and Volunteer personnel.

John Volkerding moved to approve the budget as presented, Sam McCune seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

A motion was made by Rick Tonini to adopt a 10% tax rate; the motion was seconded by Jack Monohan and passed unanimously.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported the following items. Sergeant Tony Glass will be out on personal injury until mid July. The new 2010 Tahoe was purchased and the equipment will be added accordingly. The new paging system and radio equipment will be installed soon and on June 15th at 8 AM the switch-over will take place. The hydraulic generator on 2631 was recently replaced. The roof replacement project has been completed and the district will have an additional expense of \$2,600.00 to cover some un-expected addons. Chief Seng will follow-up on the expense of the roofing project to include a report of the expenses vs. the receipts on the project.

Chief Seng reported that the Campbell's Gourmet Cottage Trial has ended. Chief Seng attended the Trial each day. Susan Lukjan was convicted of the charges brought against her.

Chief Seng mentioned that the district would like to have a Summer Party again this year. Chief is looking into the venue and activities for the kids.

Chief Seng mentioned that there are several old Fire Helmets in the Station 1 basement now due to the district receiving new helmets through a grant. There was discussion among the board and it was agreed that the district declare the old fire helmets as surplus and give the old helmets to the individuals who wore them.

Chief Seng requested one EA for this meeting, which was for \$1,025.00 to FedEx for the purchase of Fire Prevention Door Hangers. Rick Tonini motioned to approve the purchase of the door hanger, John Volkerding seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Old Business

Eco-Tech is the new waste service for Station 1 & 2. Their services were considerably lower in cost than our prior service, Anytime Waste Systems. With this new change Anytime Waste Systems has threatened to take litigation because of a supposed contract the district signed to keep service for 5 years. Chief Seng will follow-up if anything new comes of this situation.

Treasurer Graven will be leaving the board after the June meeting. There was much said about his time spent on the board and all of the progress that he made for the firefighters while he served off and on for 14 years.

Chairman Eifler mentioned that we should have a committee to look at new applicants for board membership. Also, with Faye Ellerkamp's extended absence there may be a possibility of her position becoming available as well. Chairman Eifler also mentioned that the two positions would benefit from Human Resources and Accounting backgrounds.

New Business

The next Trustees meeting will be changed from June 10th to June 17th.

A motion was made to adjourn the meeting by Rick Tonini, John Volkerding seconded and the motion passed unanimously at 12:55PM.

Citing state law, the judge refused to let him testify.

Then there was to be a final defense witness, but he was not allowed to testify, because he had been sitting in the courtroom during parts of the trial, listening to the other witnesses and as he told the judge, watching WLKY News reports over the course of the trial.

After both witnesses were barred, the defense rested.

The judge issued instructions to the jury and closing arguments began.

Cambell's Gourmet Cottage owner Susan Lukjan found guilty of 2006 arson

A Jefferson Circuit Court jury found Susan Kay Lukjan guilty of burning down her own business, Cambell's Gourmet Cottage, four years ago in hopes of collecting an insurance settlement.

The jury, which deliberated about two hours, convicted Lukjan Friday of second-degree arson, burning personal property to defraud an insurer and fraudulent insurance acts over \$300.

The jury recommended a sentence of 12 years, and her sentencing was scheduled for July 23.

Lukjan did not react to the verdict, but members of her family cried and shook their heads.

During closing arguments, prosecutors told the jury that because of mounting financial problems, Lukjan had a "fire sale" in 2006, s etting fire to her store to collect an insurance settlement and open in a new location.

"She put lives at risk because she could not pay her bills," Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Leland Hulbert said.

But Tom Clay, Lukjan's attorney, said investigators rushed to judgment, misstated Lukjan's financial situation at the

time and have no proof the fire at the store on Sherrin Avenue across from Trinity High School was arson.

"The fact is, her business was doing better," Clay told jurors, noting that Lukjan remains in business at a different location. "The fact is her income was going up."

Hulbert told jurors that Lukjan was losing money, behind on her bills and could no longer afford the necessary inventory, yet was purchasing more and more insurance and increasing her insurance payments while her rent went unpaid the month of the fire.

"Why would you do that?" he asked jurors. "Because she was planning to cash in."

On Aug. 19, 2006, firefighters arriving at the store found heavy smoke pouring from the building. The fire destroyed inventory and much of the structure, which was later razed. The building, at 127 N. Sherrin Ave., was owned by the Trinity High School Foundation.

Hulbert told jurors Lukjan let employees leave early the day of the fire and was captured on a video camera driving away from her business 13 minutes before the fire began.

"She knew exactly what she was going to do that day and she got caught," he said.

And Hulbert said that before Lukjan hired an attorney, she admitted to investigators that her business was struggling.

Lukjan, who reopened her store weeks later in the Woodlawn Shopping Center on North Hubbards Lane in St. Matthews, has been charged with second-degree arson, burning personal property to defraud an insurer and fraudulent insurance acts over \$300.

In his closing argument, Clay criticized the investigation, calling Maj. G. Henry Ott of Louisville Fire & Rescue's arson bureau, the most "biased witness I've ever run into. He couldn't agree with me that yesterday was Thursday."

Clay told jurors that investigators didn't have proof it was arson. He said they never found an accelerant, any physical evidence or a source for the fire.

"There is an absence of evidence," he said.
"...This fire should have been classified
undetermined."

And Clay said the U.S. attorney's office turned down the case because "they didn't think they could make it."

Hulbert defended the investigation, noting the investigators interviewed more than 50 people and took over a year and a half.

In a Sept. 1, 2006, Courier-Journal story, Lukjan said she had been planning to move her business to the Westport Village shopping center before the fire.

In November 2005, Lukjan sued Trinity in Jefferson Circuit Court, asking that the school provide her "unfettered access" to 23 parking spaces around her building.

The lawsuit said that the store had used those spaces for more than 20 years but that Trinity faculty, staff, parents, students and others were using at least 16 of them.

Both Lukjan and the school have said the suit was settled amicably out of court.

Firefighters hope Crusade for Children donors set aside Paul Barth scandal

Mary-Dee Wilson had no problem dropping \$5 into a firefighter's Crusade for Children bucket Wednesday morning -- despite the allegations that former McMahan Fire Chief Paul Barth misused money meant for the charity.

"(Barth) made them guilty by association, and I think that's a shame," she said after her donation at a McMahan collection site at Hikes and Breckenridge lanes. "As long as they have a bucket, I'll have something."

Fire fighters across Jefferson County and Southern Indiana hope others feel the same as they hold out their fire boots to collect change and checks at intersections to fund the annual Crusade, which helps children with special needs.

They say Barth's arrest on federal charges of embezzling at least \$189,000 meant for the Crusade -- as well as the budget cuts in their departments and the financial strains facing families--will make their fundraising efforts tougher.

The Crusade's big push comes this weekend, with the telethon airing on Saturday and Sunday. And the fire stations play a large role part in that effort.

Last year, fire departments collected about 59 percent of the Crusade's \$5.3 million in

donations -- roughly \$3.1 million.

Crusade President Dawn Lee said she has been concerned about the public's response to firefighters' efforts this year, but she has been encouraged by early indications that the public is still willing to give generously.

"That is the great thing about our community, that they step up," she said.

Lee said she understands that this year represents several challenges for fire departments, including internal budget troubles that have caused some to cut back on Crusade efforts.

In Jeffersontown, for example, the department did not send out the usual mailing to residents and firefighters won't go door to door seeking donations.

"Those are things we just can't afford," Chief Randy Lawson said, citing the fuel costs and wear and tear on equipment those efforts entail.

Lawson said his firefighters will still set up road blocks starting Thursday and pick up donations from a resident's home if requested.

But he's counting on people to continue being generous.

"Givers are givers," he said, "especially when it comes to children."

So far, firefighters say the public has responded.

Joe Johnson, McMahan's new fire chief, said that while firefighters have heard some negative comments, most people are being supportive -- and giving what they can. .

"It hasn't been bad," said Johnson, whose crews have been collecting at roadblocks since May 20. "We were a little apprehensive the first Saturday we went out."

Even so, he expects that the charges against Barth will cause donations to his department department to decline this year. McMahan set a goal of collecting \$100,000 this year after raising \$164,000 last year.

As of Wednesday, the department had collected about \$62,000, Johnson said.

Crusade officials have tried to help bolster public confidence by instituting new rules for collecting donations in the wake of the charges against Barth. In April, they put in place policies that tightened the collection process, mandating fire departments not to use separate accounts to collect donations, even temporarily. The new policies also require that at least two people who are not related count collections and make bank deposits directly to the Crusade.

The changes stem from the allegations that Barth funneled money meant for the Crusade through a McMahan bank account on which he was the only authorized signer. He is accused of using that money to pay himself additional salary, make cash withdrawals, pay a district credit card that contained personal expenses and make other personal payments.

Ronnie Bishop, a McMahan division commander who was collecting Wednesday morning, said the department may have a black eye, but community support is still present.

"A lot of people are supporting us," he said.

Ruth Cobb, who said she gives somewhere between \$50 and \$75 to the Crusade each year, was one of them Wednesday. "There are good guys out there," she said.

Highview Fire Chief Dave Goldsmith said he instructed his crews, which began collecting Tuesday, to be polite in the face of any criticism. He said they also will have donation envelopes to hand out in case potential donors would rather send money directly to the Crusade offices.

But Goldsmith said he expects the generosity of the community to win out.

We still see that people are pulling out their wallets and still donating to the cause," he said.

Dittmer said he enjoys participating in the fundraiser each year not only because he's collecting money for a good cause, but also because it allows him to "go out and meet the people we serve."

Lots of organizations have been raising money for the Crusade over the past few m onths, but the big push is this weekend, with the telethon airing through Sunday on WHAS11.

Fire stations play a large role part in that effort. Last year, fire departments collected about 59 percent of the Crusade's \$5.3 million in donations -- roughly \$3.1 million.

Hayden said he didn't let the Barth scandal hinder his donation this year.

"I think a few people might be skeptical, but I think most will still donate," he said. "It's such a good charity and you never know when someone you know might need their help."

Joyce Borgman of Middletown was one of

several people who donated at the intersection of Hurstbourne Parkway and Shelbyville Road.

"We collect extra pocket change and money all year long and keep it in a jar and when Crusade weekend comes, we keep the jar in the truck and each time we see the firefighters out there, we give them money," she said. "We've probably been through about 10 different intersections today and each time, we donate money."

2010 Crusade for Children trying to determine 'Barth effect'

WHAS Crusade for Children officials were still trying late Sunday morning to get a handle on whether a financial scandal involving former McMahan Fire Chief Paul Barth has hurt their efforts to raise money for children with special needs.

"It's been hard to get a good idea," said Dawn Lee, the Crusade's president and C EO. "We're kind of seeing a seesaw effect; some groups have been up and others have been down. No trend has been established at this point."

Barth faces federal charges for allegedly embezzling at least \$189,000 meant for the Crusade.

Lee said the economy, as well as the Barth situation, has given rise to concern about the charity's ability to raise money. Last year, the telethon raised \$5.3 million.

But in Lake Dreamland, Capt. Zion Meiman said the Barth indictment hasn't harmed his fire department's efforts.

The department brought in \$25,767.59 -- about \$500 more than last year.

Crusade for Children collects more than \$5.3 million, most since 2005

Donors come through despite Barth scandal

Firefighters and many others in Kentucky and Southern Indiana collected more than \$5.3million this year for the WHAS Crusade for Children -- the most since 2005 -- despite a sluggish economy and an embezzlement scandal involving a former fire chief.

The 57th annual fundraiser for specialneeds children in the area amassed \$5,301,182, up from last year's \$5,289,841, to help pay for nearly 220 requests for aid totaling \$12million, said Dawn Lee, the Crusade's president and CEO.

"People told me when I came here it's a miracle that happens every June," Lee, who took the position last year, said after the final tally. "It's just the magic of the Crusade."

"It's just overwhelming," said John Blim, the Crusade's vice president and marketing director. "The people of Kentuckiana never cease to amaze us. It's among the most giving communities in the country."

Crusade officials said they weren't sure what effect, if any, the federal charges against former McMahan Fire Chief Paul Barth had on fundraising. Barth is accused of embezzling at least \$189,000 in

contributions intended for the Crusade. He has pleaded not guilty.

And Lee said that while the economy has affected all nonprofit groups, "the wonderful thing is this community is so supportive of the Crusade."

The largest fire department contribution came from the Pleasure Ridge Park department, which collected nearly \$298,000 in donations. The largest non-fire department contributor was the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Louisville, which brought in \$216,000.

Firefighters, volunteers, donors and others weaved in and out of the WHAS-TV station on Chestnut Street on Sunday during a telethon that capped off the weekend's big push for the Crusade.

Stories show need

"With the medical community, we see it every day," he added.

Bob Holt stood near the filming area and waited to carry heavy loads of cash donations into a secure room.

"We're pack mules," he said proudly and with a smile. It's a volunteer role he's had f or 27 years, since he was 15, Holt said.

"You see one kid that it helps, and that's enough," said Holt, who lives near Iroquois Park. "You figure every nickel they get today is a nickel they didn't have yesterday."

Near Holt stood Rhonda Young, a volunteer dressed as a clown with a heart-covered apron, bright yellow shoes and a bubble-gum-pink nose. In the guise of Etheal the Clown, Young painted designs on the cheeks of children visiting the station throughout the day.

"It's always exciting to be down here," she said. "It's a family."

Diana Yung of Okolona said she handed her 6-year-old son, Matthew Schaffer, a dollar bill or some change to toss in a bucket each time they went through an intersection near their home where firefighters were collecting money.

"He likes to drop the change in a boot or bucket," said Yung, adding that they went to the TV station on Sunday to support the community and firefighters. The McMahan Fire Department exceeded its fundraising goal for this year but still fell more than \$20,000 short of what it raised last year, before the embezzlement scandal rocked the department and forced the charity to tighten its procedures in dealing with fire departments and the money they raise.

New Chief Joe Johnson said the department set a goal of \$100,000 for this year, which he said was reasonable given the current economy and the charges against the former chief.

'A new beginning'

He said the department surpassed that goal on Friday and continued until it raised \$ 133,000. It brought in more than \$154,000 last year.

"This is a new beginning for us," he said.
"This was a chance for us to start all over."

Johnson said some people mentioned the scandal in refusing to contribute, but even

more gave words of encouragement to the firefighters and other volunteers who manned roadblocks and knocked on doors. He said one woman drove from Jeffersonville, Ind., with a \$200 check, because, she told him, "I support you guys."

He said he believes it was more the economy than the Barth charges that caused McMahan to raise less money.

While on the air, neither Johnson nor the WHAS-TV and WHAS radio personalities explicitly mentioned the Barth scandal.

WHAS radio host Terry Meiners, however, patted Johnson on his shoulder while on the air and thanked him and the department for carrying on the tradition of helping the Crusade during tough times.

"These folks have endured so much over the last several months," Johnson said.

Lee said it was difficult to tell what effect the McMahan case had on fundraising. Smaller departments seemed to have raised more money this year, while the larger departments were reporting donations were down.

"We're kind of seeing a seesaw effect; some groups have been up and others have been down," she said.

Former Crusade director Bud Harbsmeier, who is on the board of directors at the Highview Fire Department, said he didn't believe the Barth case harmed that department's ability to raise money. Some

people probably were able to overlook the scandal considering the Crusade's reputation, he said.

The Rigs of Zip 40207

Louisville, Kentucky was founded in 1778 by George Rogers Clark and is named after King Louis XVI of France. While not the state capitol of Kentucky it is the largest city in Kentucky.

Because of being situated on the Ohio River, Louisville was an important internal shipping port in the 19th century. Today though, Louisville is probably best known for the Kentucky Derby, the first race of the Triple Crown of Thoroughbred Racing. The first Kentucky Derby was held on May 17. 1875, at the Louisville Jockey Club track (later renamed Churchill Downs). The Derby was originally shepherded by Meriwether Lewis Clark, Jr.. He was the grandson of William Clark of the Lewis and Clark Expedition and grandnephew of the city's founder George Rogers Clark. That is also where the Louisville's nickname, Derby City comes from as well.

The Derby City Chapter of SPAAMFAA is based in Louisville, but has members in several counties in Kentucky and southern Indiana too. There are 34 zip codes for "Metro Louisville" (Louisville is in Jefferson County, Jefferson and several counties surrounding it are now known as "Metro Louisville), but we are covering the eight Derby City and SPAAMFAA members and their 20 rigs in zip code 40207. Zip Code 40207 is located east of downtown Louisville. The northern border is the Ohio River and southern border is 1-64. The border to the east is 1-264.


My fire service began in 1951 when I joined the St. Matthews Fire Department (St. Matthews is in zip 40207). Shortly after, I started collecting fire related items such as nozzles, fittings, helmets & etc. In 1957 I decided to get out of the collecting game sold everything, only to start again in 1962, but in a more limited collecting mode.

In 1969 and through 1974 I had several pieces of antique motor fire apparatus, but again sold them off.

In 1984, the collecting bug bit again and after 20 years of no fire trucks in my garage I started looking. I located a pumper in an Indiana cornfield. The rig was pretty much a derelict and had been out of service for years. Rusting bodywork, what paint there was, was all peeling off and the brightwork had all disappeared. It was sad to such a custom pumper abandoned and rusting after years of faithful service.

Each of my rigs came with a story, which I added to and became a part of. In most cases the stories continue, but in a few sad cases the story ends with a scrap-yard crusher or a cutting torch. Deep down I wanted to save each one. What stories all of them could tell if they could only talk.

In 2004 with the help of many dedicated friends and members of the Derby City Chapter, restoration began on my ninth piece of apparatus a 1921 Stutz City Service ladder Truck. In 2005 restoration began on my tenth rig, a 1930 Model A Ford to serve as my Assistant Chief's car. In 2009 restoration began on my eleventh rig, a 1929 GMC/Boyer Hose, Chemical and Turret Wagon. 2010 is going to be another busy year for restoration as I have just purchased my twelfth piece of apparatus, a 1925 Nott number.





Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

June 17, 2010

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on June 17, 2010 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Chairman Eifler, Jim Graven, Sam McCune, John Volkerding, Jack Monohan and Rick Tonini. Also present were Chief Seng, Chief Monohan, Major Dugan, Frank Flynn, Joe Bewley, Kevin Moulton, Charles McCune, Mike Richardson and Jordan Davis.

Minutes

<u>Rick Tonini</u> moved to approve the minutes of the May meeting, Jack Monohan seconded and the minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

<u>Jim Graven</u> gave the Treasurer's report. He advised that the district has 2.2 million in investments as of the end of May. The district is roughly using around 225,000.00 per month for the operating budget.

Chief Seng reported on the 2010-2011 budget. The district was able to keep the current exercise program and the 2% salary increase was off-set by the savings from the decreased Health Insurance rates. The apparatus reserve is still in place for \$100,000.00. The revised budget was presented before the board for adoption. Jim Graven made a motion to approve the revised budget as presented by Chief Seng, John Volkerding seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Jim Graven was thanked for his 12 cumulative years on the Board, as this was his last Treasurer's report for the St. Matthews Fire District. There were several examples given of his accomplishments for the Fire District. The Trustees wished Jim well and thanked him for his years of dedicated service.

Chief's Report

Chief Seng reported that the new Metro-Safe paging system is now in place and being used by the Fire District. The 2010 Tahoe has been placed in service and is now being used by Chief Seng. The 2000 Tahoe formerly used for inspections will be stripped and listed on E-Bay for sale. The older equipment will be sold with the car as the district has no use for it any longer.

2010

June 17, 2010, Trustee meeting:

Chief Seng reported that Crusade went well this year with good participation from volunteers and Career Staff. The collections were down a little from last year, however overall the week went well.

John Volkerding reported that the district had fewer roadblocks and instead utilized the door hangers that were provided by the crusade to solicit for donations. The district's overall expense was limited to the cost of fuel, water and soft drinks for the volunteers and T-Shirts.

Chief Seng reported that 2631 was recently in the shop for repair on the Air Conditioning and is now back in service. The surplus fire helmets were offered to the original firefighters and it seems most individuals would like their old helmets.

Chief Seng reported that the business office copier was recently replaced with a leased copier. There was discussion concerning categorizing the copier cost under the office supplies expense account. Sgt. Glass remains off-duty due to a non-work related knee injury that required surgery. He is expected to make a full recovery and return to work by mid to late July.

The St. Matthews Fire District Summer Party will be held at the Knights of Columbus pool area on River Rd. on August 22nd from 2:00-5:00PM. All Trustees, Firefighters and their families are encouraged to attend.

Chief Seng reported that he recently spoke to a T-Mobile representative who stated that we should have the original lease in hand within a few more weeks.

The district recently received a letter from the Duncan Estate stating there may be an additional \$1000.00 owed to the fire district.

Chief Seng reported that Anytime Waste has threatened to bring litigation to the fire district over a supposed early termination contract. The district has consulted our attorney at Stoll, Keenon, Ogden on the matter and since there was no contract there should not be a case.

Chief Seng has been asked to serve on another Grant Review committee in Maryland and will be leaving on June 20th fulfill that request.

Old Business

The Trustee committee will meet June 22nd to establish its wishes for a new member on the Board.

New Business

The annual audit agreement from Cotton & Allen was received and has been reviewed. The motion was made by Jack Monohan to approve the agreement as presented, the motion was seconded by Rick Tonini and the motion passed unanimously.

No Executive Session was needed.

The next Trustees meeting will be held on July 8th at 12:00 Noon.

The change in net assets reported for governmental activities in the combined statement of activities is different because:

Governmental funds report capital outlays as expenditures. However, in the combined statement of activities the cost of those assets is allocated over their estimated useful lives and reported as depreciation expense. This is the amount by which depreciation (\$274.433) exceeded capital outlays (\$193.468) in the current period.

In the statement of activities, only the loss on the diposal of capital assets (\$29,557) is reported, whereas governmental funds reports proceeds from the disposal (\$9,500) increase financial resources. Therefore, the change in nets assets differs from the change in fund balance by the cost of the capital asset disposed.

Proceeds from a note payable are reflected as other financing sources in the governmental fund financial statements. In the combined statement of net assets, these funds are reflected as an increase in liabilities.

In governmental funds, notes payable are considered a source and use of financing, but in the combined statement of net assets, obligations are reported as a liability. Therefore, principal payments on obligations are not considered an expense in the combined statement of activities.

Good afternoon all,

It is good to report that I am home from Baptist East. The past four days have been incredible on many levels not the least of which has been the TREMENDOUS outpouring of support from the Lyndon Fire family as well as friends. Both Vivian and I deeply appreciate all of those who have visited, called and e-mailed their support. We can never repay your kindness.

The Reader's Digest version of the story is that the pacemaker install went well but my body reacted to the anesthetic causing nausea. Shortly after returning home from the hospital I vomited and, in doing so, tore my esophagus (a fairly common occurrence I've learned) and with the Plavix I take due to the stent, I began to bleed fairly heavily internally. Having no knowledge of the preceding I went merrily to bed to sleep off the effects of a sleepless night at Jewish Hospital. Around 2:00 AM I awoke to nature's call and, although feeling a bit dizzy, headed for the bathroom. I made it to the vicinity of the commode before passing out. In passing out I did a quick one-rounder with my left forehead and the commode. (Commode won without breaking a sweat!) Vivian heard the commotion and ran to find me trying (quite unsuccessfully) to stand. As a matter of fact, I could not even kneel. My thoughts ran to Damn! The new pacemaker must not be working while Viv's thoughts wisely ran to 911. The MetroSafe and metro EMS system worked flawlessly and soon an ambulance and 2658 arrived. (I have purposely skipped the part about demanding that Viv help me drag myself out of the bathroom to avoid that cliché!) We decided to go to Baptist East and, upon arrival, received excellent attention and care. The focus of attention was my heart because of symptoms and the new pacemaker. Only problem with that was the monitor showing sinus rhythm. (Medics hate it when the monitors don't confirm their diagnosis!) After some radiology of my head (negative) it was deemed I should be admitted. As I was being admitted to a nice room on the 4th floor, I asked a couple of times for anti-nausea medicine and was told that we needed to be admitted first. (Those with weak stomachs might want to skip the next couple of sentences.) My by- now blood engorged stomach was on a timetable of its own and I gave the most graphic demonstration of projectile vomiting of about a liter of blood and clots seen recently in these parts. My blood pressure tanked and a code was called. If you've never seen a code in a hospital it is an awesome thing. To be honest I was really scared and when that happens, and I can't run, my sense of humor kicks in and I said; damn, I didn't know this many people worked here! (There were at least a dozen people tending to me.) They put me on a gurney and rushed me to the ICU where fluid administration began. As they rolled me out of the room I looked at Vivian and she said, in a broken voice; I love you. I figured out then that things were a might serious and that I ought to fight harder not to pass out. With enough fluids to make me look like a cross between the Pillsbury Doughboy and the dog from the Little Rascals (remember the incident with the commode.) My BP stabilized and we awaited the arrival of the gastroenterologist. He arrived with three large carts of equipment and two assistants and, after anesthetizing me, scoped my esophagus and repaired the tear. I awoke to his smiling face telling me that I was going to be fine. I stayed in ICU for two sleepless nights, in TCU (semi-private room) for about three hours until I was moved to a cardiovascular unit where an angel named Robin who understood my sleep deprivation as well as my medical needs guided me through a full night of sleep and I awoke feeling somewhat more human. After more tests (my arms resemble pincushions) and consults I was released about 4:00 PM today. I am very weak but definitely on the mend.

This experience has taught me many important things. A few of them are; I have the greatest wife and family in the world, I have the greatest co-workers in the world in the world, I have the greatest co-workers in the world in the world

Minutes of Meeting of Trustees of St. Matthews Fire Protection District

July 8, 2010

The meeting of the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Board of Trustees was held on July 8, 2010 at the St. Matthews Fire Protection District Station 1, 240 Sears Avenue. Chairman Tom Eifler called the meeting to order at 12:00 P.M.

Trustees present were Chairman Eifler, Sam McCune, John Volkerding, Jack Monohan and Rick Tonini. Also present were Chief Seng, Chief Monohan, Major Dugan, Frank Flynn, Joe Bewley, Kevin Moulton, Charles McCune, Mike Richardson, Nick Clark, Greg Crabb, Derrick Miskell, Ty Unthank and Jordan Davis.

Minutes

Treasurer's Report

City gets bequest for Louisville Fire & Rescue museum

A \$48,750 bequest from the estate of Mockingbird Valley resident Anne Stuart Duncan, who had an affinity for local firefighters, will cover most of the cost of converting the historic abandoned fire station near Sixth and York streets into a Louisville Fire & Rescue museum.

Firefighters intend to move the small Louisville Fire History & Learning Center, which has been housed in cramped quarters since 1998 in a station at 34th Street and River Park Drive, to the Sixth Street site by next spring, said Mike Day, the Louisville Fire & Rescue facilities engineer.

Days said there is no budget or firm cost estimate for moving the museum displays, which include three classic fire vehicles, but he said the bequest from Duncan should cover most of the cost, with any remaining expense to be scraped together from other sources.

Day said the Sixth Street location needs tuckpointing on some exterior brick, upgrading of the heating and air conditioning systems and wholesale painting.

"It needs sprucing up. Structurally, it is OK," he said of the Sixth Street station, which was closed in a cost-saving move in January 2008. Now empty, the site was most recently used by the Louisville Free Public Library for storage of items after the August 2009 flash flooding damaged the Main Library.

The Sixth Street station dates to 1858 and is believed to be one of the oldest surviving fire structures in the Southeast.

The Louisville Metro Council will introduce a resolution Thursday evening authorizing the city to accept the bequest from Duncan's estate. The resolution says that the Duncan will "was subject to various interpretations and the beneficiaries agreed to a mediation of the issues" by a judge, who decided that the city should get a base amount of \$83,750 from the estate.

Of that, \$48,750 will go to the planned fire museum, \$25,000 to Metro Animal Services for a "catadoption room" at the new pet-adoption center nearing completion on Newburg Road and \$10,000 to Louisville Fire & Rescue's Engine Co. 21 to purchase heat-imaging equipment.

Day said the existing museum is a bit off the beaten path. The new site will be centrally located and offer more than twice the space -- about 7,400 square feet.

The existing museum is free but can be seen only by appointment. The new museum will operate on a similar basis.

The existing museum features a hose cart dating to 1840, a water tower wagon dating to the 1890s and a ladder cart believed to date before the Civil War, Day said. Statues of firefighters are dressed in fire regalia, reflecting different eras. Among the items on display are old fire helmets, a red fire phone box, alarms, equipment and photos.

Although the existing items will make up the bulk of the exhibits at the Sixth Street location, Day said retired firefighters plan to donate other items.

Louisville Fire Chief Greg Frederick said the department plans to set up a non-profit group to oversee the museum, which also will be a center for promoting fire prevention and safety. He said the group will also be available to raise funds to support the museum and fire-safety center as well as for fire department programs and activities.

July 14, 2010, The Courier-Journal:

Duncan, who died at the age of 95 in 2006, was an honorary member of Engine Co. 21, and asked that memorial gifts go to metro firefighters. And substantial proceeds from the sale of her 10-acre estate in Mockingbird Valley in 2007 went to Louisville Fire & Rescue and also to fire districts in St. Matthews and North Oldham County.

According to a Courier-Journal article in 2007, Duncan developed an admiration for firefighters as a young girl when she saw them respond to a neighbor's house fire.

As an adult, Duncan, who was a dedicated preservationist, had a sign by her driveway that read "Fire Dept. Lane." She would visit nearby fire stations regularly, frequently taking firefighters a ham. She would send crates of fruit to stations at Christmas and, on one occasion, gave a station two television sets to replace ones that had been stolen, according to the article. Duncan monitored fire runs with a home scanner.

Firefighters stationed in and around Crescent Hill took a reciprocal interest in her, treating her as family and often "checking on her to make sure everything was OK," Day said.

Campbell's Gourmet Cottage owner sentenced to 12 years in prison for 2006 arson

Citing her lack of remorse and the seriousness of the offense, a Jefferson Circuit Court judge on Friday denied probation for Susan Kay Lukjan and sentenced her to 12 years in prison for burning down her own business, Campbell's Gourmet Cottage, four years ago in hopes of collecting an insurance settlement.

Judge Audra Eckerle followed the May recommendation of a jury, which found Lukjan guilty of second-degree arson, burning personal property to defraud an insurer and fraudulent insurance acts over \$300.

Tom Clay, Lukjan's attorney, said he would file an appeal and also try to get Lukjan released on an appeals bond.

Clay criticized Eckerle's handling of the case, saying the judge had shown a consistent 'bias' against Lukjan, did not properly follow the law and denied Lukjan a fair trial.

"I didn't expect any kind of favorable consideration from this court," he said of his request that Lukjan be given probation, arguing that Lukjan had no criminal history and strong family and community support.

In an interview, Clay said Eckerle ruled

inconsistently on objections, giving favorable treatment to prosecutors, did not properly review the qualifications of prosecution witnesses, failed to ensure the commonwealth turned over exculpatory evidence and did not allow a key defense expert to testify because he wasn't properly licensed, which Clay claimed was an error.

"There was a bias in this case that arose, for some reason that I can't fathom, before the trial that continued to this day," he said.

But Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Leland Hulbert said the judge was fair and that Clay was trying to "bully the court, and the court would not be bullied."

Hulbert also said the outcome could have been much different, as prosecutors were willing to negotiate a plea deal before the trial calling for probation if Lukjan would admit her guilt, but that Clay would not discuss a settlement.

"She does not want to take responsibility for anything that happened that day," Hulbert told Eckerle.

Clay said Lukjan has not admitted guilt and shown remorse because she has maintained her innocence from the beginning.

"People who are innocent do not express remorse," he said.

Lukjan's family and friends hugged and consoled each other outside the courtroom after the sentencing, with several venting their frustrations to reporters.

Several were upset that during the sentencing Eckerle had cited Lukjan's "callous nature" for putting out a brochure with flames on it when opening her business in a new location after the fire.

But Linda Bayens, who still works for Lukjan at the Gourmet Cottage, said the brochure was created by a printing company and had nothing to do with the fire, with the flames representing "hot news" that the business was opening. Lukjan, she said, had nothing to do with the brochure.

During the trial, prosecutors told the jury that because of mounting financial problems, Lukjan had a "fire sale" in 2006, setting fire to her store to collect an insurance settlement and open in a new location.

Clay, however, said investigators rushed to judgment, misstated Lukjan's financial situation at the time and have no proof the

fire at the store on Sherrin Avenue across from Trinity High School was arson. The building, at 127 N. Sherrin Ave., was owned by the Trinity High School Foundation.

Hulbert told jurors that Lukjan let employees leave early the day of the fire and was captured on a video camera driving away from her business 13 minutes before the fire began.

Lukjan reopened her kitchenware store weeks later in the Woodlawn Shopping Center on North Hubbards Lane in St. Matthews.

Her daughter, Tara Lukjan, told reporters: "We hold fast that she is innocent and we will get her out."

Fire at Lyndon apartment building sends three firefighters to hospital

One firefighter suffered second- and thirddegree burns to his hands and had to jump from a second-floor balcony while fighting a two-alarm blaze at a Lyndon apartment building Friday evening.

The fire at the Partridge Meadows
Apartments & Townhomes off LaGrange
Road gutted the top floor of one of the
apartment buildings, destroying four
apartments.

No occupants of the apartments were injured. Four other apartments suffered smoke and water damage.

Jackie Cobb said she was asleep in her first floor apartment when a neighbor beat on the door and shouted that the building was on fire. It wasn't until she was helped outside that she saw flames burning on the floor above her apartment.

"It was a horrific fire," Cobb said. "But I'm blessed. I'm alive."

The firefighter who jumped from the balcony might have injured his ankle and two other firefighters were taken to the hospital as a precaution, said Rick Tonini, spokesman for the St. Matthews Fire Protection District. All the injured firefighters were from the Lyndon Fire Protection District.

It took 35 firefighters from five departments a little more than an hour to bring the fire under control, said Lyndon Fire Protection District Chief Russ Rakestraw.

All the residents were outside the building when firefighters arrived on the scene, Tonini said.

The fire was reported at 5:45 p.m. at one of the complex's buildings at 8102 Pelican Way. When firefighters arrived minutes later, flames were already burning through the roof, Tonini said.

The firefighter who suffered burns was one of the first on the scene. He rushed into the building looking for anyone who might be inside, but the fire moved quickly and trapped him, forcing him to jump from the balcony, Tonini said.

Because the fire was so large, crews decided not to send anyone else inside and instead fought the fire defensively, spraying it with water from the outside. Tonini said.

Crews remained on the scene after the fire was controlled, spraying the building to prevent hot spots from flaring. Smoke lingered as neighbors surveyed the damage.

The apartment building, part of a large multi-building complex, has two floors with 16 apartments, divided in half by a brick firewall. All four apartments on the second floor in the northeast half of the building were destroyed and the roof over them collapsed.

The cause is unknown but it appears the fire started in one of those four apartments, Tonini said.

Greg Belviy said he and his wife had lived in one of the destroyed apartments for almost a year and a half. He was returning home from work, expecting to meet his wife, when he saw flames shooting 10 feet over the roof and dense smoke rising from his building.

"I had no idea what was going on or where she was or anything," Belviy said.

Belviy ran to the building to go inside and look for his wife but fire crews wouldn't let him get close, he said. He was talking with a firefighter when he turned around and saw his wife standing outside.

"Everything else can be replaced," Belviy said.

Matt Piliere, who lives in a townhouse near the building, said the fire moved quickly.

Flames first rose over one end of the building and six minutes later the roof collapsed, he said.

Kelly Kiang, who lived in a first floor apartment, said a neighbor banged on her door, urging her to get out. Kiang grabbed her laptop and hard drive and ran. Flames were across the roof of the building, she said.

"I was trying to get my cats out but they were having no part in that," Kiang said.

Luckily, firefighters found all four cats unharmed after bringing the blaze under control. Aside from being upset, they were all right, she said.

Partridge Meadows is owned by the Brown Noltemeyer Company. Residents who didn't have other arrangements were to be put up in other Partridge Meadows apartments or other properties owned by the company, said Darlene Allgeier, director of operations for Brown Noltemeyer.

It was not immediately clear how many people lived in the damaged and destroyed apartments, but all were occupied, Allgeier said.

Crews from the Lyndon, Middletown, St. Matthews, Anchorage and McMahan fire protection districts responded to the fire.

3 firefighters injured fighting fire at Partridge Meadows apt. complex in Lyndon

(WHAS11) Flames shot through a roof at the Partridge Meadows apartment complex in Lyndon and firefighters said it spread quickly; several fire departments fought the flames for hours.

During the fight to put the fire out, three Lyndon firefighters were hurt; one had to jump off a second story balcony when flames got out of control. Other firefighters were treated at the scene by EMS workers.

Four apartments in the Partridge Meadows complex were destroyed and several others have severe smoke and water damage; luckily all of the people living in the building got out with no injuries reported.

Kelly Kiang lives in one of the damaged apartments; she got out, but said she had to leave her cats behind. Another resident, Jackie Cobb, didn't want her face on camera but said she was asleep when the fire spread to her unit; she said she could hear the roof caving in.

Two-alarm apartment fire in Lyndon leaves several homeless

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) – Firefighters from several departments fought a two alarm fire September 3 at the Partridge Meadows Apartments in the Lyndon area that damaged several units and left some residents homeless.

According to MetroSafe Communications, the initial alarm came in from 8102 Pelican Way at 5:45 p.m. Crews arrived four minutes later and a second alarm was called soon after.

Video from Air 3 shows flames through the roof of a building in the complex. Eight units suffered heavy fire and water damage. The flames were so intense that firefighters had to back off an interior attack of the blaze and got into a defensive mode.

Resident Matt Piliere captured the fire on his cell phone right after it started.

"When I got over here," he told WAVE 3, "The whole roof line was still attacked, it was crazy."

Kelly Kiang's apartment was damaged and she told us what she remembered about the first few minutes of the fire.

"Somebody came and it was 'bam bam' on the door," said Kiang, who couldn't believe her neighbor's apartment was going up in flames. "I came out and all that was going on and I was sitting right there and didn't even know."

Kiang ran back into her first floor apartment to get her four cats out, but she said they were so scared from all the noise they hid. After surviving Hurricane Katrina, Kiang wasn't worried about any belongings, just her animals. But as we were talking to her, the firefighters brought something good out of something bad, walking up with one of her cats.

As a firefighter put one cat in her arms, he asked Kiang where the others might be. She guessed they were hiding under the bed. A few minutes later, the local heroes bring out her last three pals. It was a reunion that brought some of her neighbors to tears.

Three firefighters battling the blaze were injured. One firefighter who had to jump off a balcony suffered back, neck and ankle injuries and plus 2nd and 3nd degree burns to his hands. That firefighter was taken to University Hospital. Another firefighter was taken to the hospital after suffering chest pains. The third firefighter was treated at the scene for a sprained ankle.

There is no word on the exact cause of the fire. Those out of their homes tell us their neighbors and the apartment complex manager are helping them find places to stay.

Fire Destroys Several Units In Lyndon Apartment Building

LOUISVILLE, Ky. -- Two firefighters were injured and several residents were left homeless after an apartment building caught fire in Lyndon.

It happened around 5:45 p.m. at the Partridge Meadows apartments.

While the apartment building burned, you could see the smoke from several blocks away.

But Greg Belviy came face to face with the fire as it burned through the eight-unit apartment building. "The flames were running about 10 feet off the roof, and there was just smoke everywhere. It was just like the densest fog you could ever imagine," Belviy said.

Belviy got home from work just in time to see the fire engulf his apartment. His wife was at home at the time. So while firefighters were met with a wall of heat, Belviy was hit with a wall of despair.

"Sheer panic. My wife has a medical condition, and I was really worried," Belviy said. "I came running, looking for her, then tried to get into the apartment."

Belviy's wife and their dog, Angel, escaped without injuries. In fact, all of the residents inside got out OK. The same could not be said for the firefighters. Two Lyndon firefighters were taken to a hospital -- one for chest pain, the other for burns.

"One firefighter had to jump off a second-story balcony with second- and third-degree burns to his hands, and from the fall, he has a possible ankle injury," said Rick Tonini, the public information officer for the St. Matthews Fire District.

Tonini said the second floor of the building is a total loss, and the first floor is heavily damaged.

"She's going through the, 'My dad's antique this,' and, 'My great-aunt's that,' and I'm like, 'Yeah, it's probably all gone,'" Belviy said.

But the irreplaceable stuff is safe and accounted for.

"I just thank God that my wife is OK, and like I said, everything else is secondary," Belviy said.

Five different fire departments responded to the scene.

Tonini said it's too early to speculate on a cause for the fire. Fire investigators were at the scene on Friday night trying to sift through the debris and find evidence.

An update on the conditions of the two injured firefighters was not available on Friday night.

Lyndon FPD had an apartment fire on Friday September 3rd. Dispatched was at 5:45 pm. Units from Lyndon, Middletown 9951, St. Matthews 2658 and 2659 were dispatched on the first alarm. Shortly after arriving on scene Lyndon command called for a Second Alarm. St. Matthews 2633 and Middletown units were dispatched. 1602, 5501, 2602 and 2603 were also on the scene. Command also asked for two additional units and 5551 from McMahan and 2031 from Anchorage responded.

The building involved was a 16 unit building with a fire wall separating the 8 unit sections. When the fire department arrived the fire was through the roof in the portion of the building on the right. First arriving units tried and interior attack and did primary searches of the apartment units. When the fire spread through the whole attic of the between the fire walls Chief Rakestraw (command) called for defensive exterior attack with elevated streams to knock the fire down so crews could go back in with their hand lines. During this time one Lyndon firefighter was caught on a balcony with heavy fire. He was forced to jump to the ground to avoid being badly burned. He suffered 2nd and 3rd degree burns on his hands and suffered an ankle injury in his fall. He was transported to the hospital. Two other Lyndon firefighters were taken to the hospital for chest pains and the other heat related issues. I understand all firefighters who were transported were released that evening. (according to Anchorage EMS).

The top four units were completely destroyed by fire contents and structure. The four lower units were severely damaged by water. All 8 families from those units were displaced. The apartment complex provided housing for the displaced families.

It has been very hot and humid here but the weather last night was comfortable. My opinion, fire units did a very nice job on this fire. An investigator was called but I do not believe a cause has been determined.

Firefighter injured in apartment fire blames department's budget constraints

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (WHAS11) -- Lyndon firefighters injured in an apartment fire last week blame their injuries on the department's budget problems. One of the firefighters says the second degree burns to his hands could of been prevented. Last Friday, everyone at the station was called to an apartment fire in which three firefighters were injured fighting the blaze. The problem, they say, is they were three men short due to budget constraints.

Hot tar covers Lyndon firefighter Rich Bliven's hat and jacket that came down when the roof collapsed. Captain Bliven was going up the stairs last Friday at Partridge Meadows Apartments while flames shoot out of the roof. Bliven's hands were burned and blisters now cover them.

For months, Lyndon's fire chief, Russ Rakestraw, has been very public, even sending letters to everyone in the community, saying the department doesn't have enough money in the budget to run at full staff all the time. "We were behind the 8 ball when we got started," Blivens says.

Last Friday, because some firefighters were on vacation, they were three men short and Lyndon firefighters say there is no money to pay people the overtime to fill in. Captain Blevins believes his burns, and two other firefighters' injuries were caused trying to make up for the lack in manpower.

Chief Rakestraw says there are two solutions to their money problems. The options are to lobby to get a tax cap increased that was set back in 1944, or add an ambulance service that would be run by the fire department.

The problem for the Lyndon Fire Department is that neither of these options have received the approval necessary to move forward. So, for now, the fire department will have to scale back its firefighters on certain days.

Sorry for the long delay on the Board Packets but there was a delay on getting the financial information together since both Jordan and Robin were on leave and vacation last week.

✓ We had two large fires during the month of August, both of which were located in the City of Indian Hills Winding Falls Section. One fire was started by improperly installed electrical wiring and the other fire was caused by a lightning strike. Both fires caused significant damage to both homes. I will give a more detailed report of both incidents at Thursday's Trustees Meeting.

Cotton and Allen should have the audited completed by Thursday's meeting and have a final draft for our review.

In your packet you will find an SOP on Travel Expense Reimbursement that I would like to replace our current version with. The only change from the old SOP to the new one is deleting the standard \$50 a day spending limit on meals to the standard Federal Per Diem City Guidelines. The reason for this request is that many of the cities that our firefighters travel to for training dramatically exceed a \$50 a day spending limit.

The Fire District would like to host an Open House on Saturday, October 16th between the hours of 10am to 2pm to coincide with Fire Prevention Month. The target audience would be the residents of our district, emphasizing on the families of the district. The purpose of the open house is to educate the citizens of the district concerning what we do and educate them on home fire safety. See the enclosed EA for further information on the Open House.

Both Asst. Chief Monohan and I attended the Fire Rescue International Conference in Chicago last month. The conference offered executive development programs for fire service leaders in all aspects of fire department operations both administrative and suppression.

Last month Capt. Willinger and his crew responded to a report of a resident stuck in a residential elevator off Massie Avenue. The rescue went great and the crew had little problem helping the elderly gentleman get out of the elevator. The gentleman was so appreciative of our efforts that he stopped by the firehouse the next day and donated a \$500 check to show how much he appreciated our efforts. I would like to use this \$500 to help offset the purchase of a new TV for the rec-room at Station One. The current television needs to be replaced due to age and use. Please see enclosed EA for further information.

I have been asked by FEMA to review Assistance to Firefighter Grants again in Baltimore during the last of September. I hope with all of the time and effort that I donate to them they will continue to look at our entire grant requests in a favorable light.

Included in your packet is a copy of the Lawsuit that has been filed against us from Anytime Waste Systems. I will brief you in more detail during the meeting.

Purpose

To standardize travel regulations and policies, provide supervision over travel and tighten control over travel expenditures.

Scope

This policy shall apply to all fire district related business travel.

Approva

All business travel shall be approved in advance by the Fire Chief and or the Board of Trustees.

Transportation

Travel should take place by the most economical means practical. Tickets for airfares should be purchased as far in advance as possible taking advantage of discounts and other incentives offered by the air carrier.

If ground travel is used it shall be in a Fire District provided vehicle. Gasoline and oil, parking fees and tolls should be paid with a fire department credit card.

Use of a rental car must be approved in advance.

Lodging

Hotel accommodations shall be provided at the single room in a hotel/motel recommended by the event organizers or in a mid price range hotel/motel consistent with business type travel. Reservations and payment will be made in advance by the Fire District.

Regarding: Travel Expense Reimbursement

Effective Date: 9/8/10 Supersedes: 10/24/04 Page 2 of 2

When possible, personnel should stay in hotels which are fully sprinkled and supplied with smoke detectors.

Meals & Miscellaneous Personal Expenses

The district will provide in advance a daily per diem for which the employee shall use to provide for meals, gratuities and miscellaneous expenses for which he may incur.

The per diem rate shall be determined by consulting the current version of IRS publication 1542. The rate for the specific community visited is determined by consulting the per diem charts contain within this document. IRS publication can be located at http://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/p1542.pdf.

Telephone

Telephone expenses are no longer reimbursed by the District. The employee is encouraged to use their own cellular phone.

Entertainment Expenses

Entertainment expenses are not reimbursable and will be at the individuals own expense. Consumption of alcoholic beverages shall be considered an entertainment expense and will not be reimbursed.

Documentation

All expenses requiring reimbursement should be submitted with proper receipts and a completed travel expense report within 7 days of completion of the business travel to the Fire Chief. Reimbursement checks will be issued within 7 working days of receipt of the expense report.

Per diem expenditures shall be recorded on the expense report.

Training prepares firefighters for the real thing

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (WDRB Fox 41) -- For firefighters from Kentucky, Indiana, Tennessee and Ohio, it is back to school.

Melissa Beachy with Meade County Kentucky Fire Rescue is one of 600 firefighters enrolled in the Jefferson County Fire School this weekend. There's classroom work, but also a lot of hands-on training.

Sunday at Louisville's Belvedere Park, she and her colleagues got training on aspects of firefighting they can't typically get at their home departments.

"I feel like I can give back to my community, and you know, benefit from them and hopefully they can benefit from me," Beachy said.

They're taking part in safety and survival classes, along with rescue techniques. A vacant house on West Chestnut Street in Louisville is also a training tool. Firemen try to bring occupants and other firefighters to safety. They work inside the house and also on the roof.







This is the 23rd year for the training in Jefferson County, and everyone leaves with a better understanding of what is required of them and how important the job is.

It doesn't replace the real thing, but it's close, crawling through tight spaces, up and down a stairwell, trying to make that rescue.

"It's hot, really hot, bulky, you feel like you're suffocating. But it is well worth it! Well worth it! It is very rewarding," Firefighter Beachy says.

Ventilation was established and salvage operations were conducted on the first floor.

MetroSafe was notified to have a fire investigator respond to determine cause and origin of fire. At time of this report, fire cause had not yet been determined.

Positive water was established and two additional hose lines were deployed but not charged.

Nobody was injured in the fire, which was reported about 9:45 a.m., said Capt. Rich Blivin of the Lyndon Fire Department. He said fire crews discovered heavy fire coming from two third-floor windows upon arrival at Lake Terrace, which is in the 1000 block of Lyndon Lane.

Firefighters tried to attack the fire from the inside, but it was too heavy and the firefighters had to exit the building and train water on it from the outside, Blivin said.

The fire was under control in about 30 minutes, Blivin said. The building's roof was gutted by the fire.

Besides the Lyndon department, St. Matthews and Middletown crews responded to the fire.

The cause is under investigation, Blivin said.

Blivin said about six of the building's 12 apartment units were affected.

LOUISVILLE, KY (WAVE) - Metro arson investigators are looking into what started a fire at a Lyndon apartment complex Thursday morning.

The fire started just after 9:30 at a building at the Westbury Harbour complex on Lyndon Lane. The fire destroyed the corner department. A Lyndon fire captain tells WAVE 3 News there are 12 apartments in the building, four on each floor. All of them were evacuated and have some smoke or water damage.

We talked with residents who describe the scene. "There was a lot of smoke. You could even see the flames reaching a good 15 to 20 feet up from the building itself. It was quite a sight to see when you first wake up," Dennis Sprowles said.

Thirty-five firefighters from three departments worked for about 40 minutes to get the fire under control. No one was hurt.

We'll let you know when investigators determine a cause.

Several people had to be evacuated after a fire broke out Thursday morning in an apartment complex near the intersection of Lyndon and Herr lanes, fire officials said.

Nobody was injured in the fire, which was reported about 9:45 a.m., said Capt. Rich Bliven of the Lyndon Fire Department. He said fire crews discovered heavy fire coming from two third-floor windows upon arrival at the apartments, which are in the 1000 block of Lyndon Lane.

The fire destroyed the third-floor apartment where it is believed to have started, and a large corner of the roof above that apartment was gutted. The cause is under investigation, Bliven said.

Apartment manager Tonya Brichner said about four of the units may be unlivable, and the complex will do what it can to help displaced residents by offering transfers into other units on property or at other complexes owned by the company. She said about five people were displaced.

Many residents of the building stood in nearby parking lots and on sidewalks w atching smoke billow from the apartment.

Tabitha Clark, who lived on the building's second floor, said she heard a boom, "like someone had thrown a piece of furniture through a wall" followed by yelling and

someone screaming there was a fire in the building.

She and roommate Christopher Harris were able to get out and watched as the fire started coming out of the roof and small vents.

Kent Williams, who lives on the building's second floor, said he wasn't sure what was going on until he saw people standing outside. The fire did not reach his side of the building, but it did receive some water and smoke damage.

Bliven said about six of the building's 12 units were affected. He said the fire was under control in about 30 minutes.

Besides Lyndon firefighters, St. Matthews and Middletown crews also responded.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (WHAS11) -- An apartment fire rips through a Lyndon apartment, leaving some residents without a home.

It happened around 10 a.m. Thursday off Lyndon Lane. This is the second recent apartment fire in that area, it comes as the Lyndon Fire Department deals with a budget crisis.

The flames that shot through the roof at the Westbury Apartments in Lyndon were fought by a full staff of fire fighters. Budget problems however make that a rare occurrence these days according to Lyndon Fire Chief Russ Rakestraw.

Fire officials say someone saw flames coming from the roof and called for help. Three apartments were affected

by fire and smoke, and fire officials say there could be more damaged beneath them from water.

No injuries were reported.

Chief Rakestraw says there are two solutions to their money problems. The options are to lobby to get a tax cap increased that was set back in 1944, or add an ambulance service that would be run by the fire department.



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

Jack Monohan motioned to enter executive session, Rick Tonini seconded.



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

Fire damages Graymoor/Devondale home near Ballard High

A fire late Sunday night damaged a home in the Graymoor/Devondale neighborhood near Ballard High School.

The blaze was reported about 11:20 p.m. in the 7300 block of Glen Arbor Road after an elderly woman and a caretaker spotted a downed electrical wire sparking outside near the home, said Capt. Rich Bliven, a spokesman for the Lyndon Fire Department.

Once crews arrived on the scene, fire was spotted in the attic of the one-story home, he said. It took crews about an hour to get control of the fire, and the woman and her caretaker were able to get out safely.

The fire is being blamed on an undetermined electrical source, Bliven said, but the fire is still under investigation.

No other homes were damaged, he said.

Crews from St. Matthews and Worthington assisted in battling the blaze.


Comments from STMFD member Rick Tonini: The run was a single company "tree on fire" run. 2658 was returning from a run and asked 1602 if they should respond. Since it was so dry and windy they did respond and good thing they did, the entire roof was on fire. The fire was in the attic and the elderly women and her helper got out safely. 1602 asked for a structure response and 2634 and 2659 were dispatched along with other Lyndon units and Worthington units. 2658 laid out to supply Lyndon quint and 2634 used their deck mounted master stream to defensively fight the fire. With the exception of some hand lines to defeat hot spots and in through windows, the fire was

extinguished with master streams. The house was on a corner and they used two master streams from both streets. The structure was a total loss. I believe the cause of the fire was electrical. No one hurt. Lyndon has had several large fires recently.



Louisville's urban and suburban fire departments are trying to stop the number of false alarm calls.

The departments as well as alarm companies and the mayor's office are launching an education campaign aimed at promoting alarm system maintenance. Mayor Jerry Abramson says about a fourth of all fire calls are to false alarms, and each one costs the city money.

"It's estimated that false alarms cost the fire service throughout this community—all 18 suburban fire departments as well as the urban department—between one million and three million dollars annually as a result of false alarms," he says.



There is not currently any penalty for false fire alarm calls. Louisville Fire Chief Greg Frederick says if false alarms don't decrease, a fee could be imposed.

"We have statistics going back many years looking at the number of false alarms that we make. We're going to continue to look at those as we work through this education campaign and at a later date, we may entertain looking at either a fine or a commitment to repair and maintain the system," he says.

There is a fee for false burglar alarm calls made to the police department.



He said crews were able to contain the fire damage to the restaurant, but a travel agency next to the business in the strip center received smoke and water damage.


No one was injured and there was no one in the businesses at the time.

Additional information:

St. Matthews units and a Lyndon engine were dispatched at 3:02 am to a structure fire in a strip center at the corner of Thierman Lane and Oechsli Avenue. Units arrived within minutes to find heavy smoke coming from the roof structure of the entire east end of the building. It was determined the fire was in the small restaurant second from the end. 2634 make an attack and extinguished the fire that consumed the entire area. They kept the fire out of the attic space which was remarkable. I would have bet upon arrival that the attic space was involved but they made a great stop and kept the fire out of the attic. Had the fire gotten into the attic the entire building would have gone (end cap to fire wall). Bill Seng called for two extra engines (McMahan and Harrods Creek). Neither were used.

An investigator was called because it was an obvious arson. The investigation had been in the building and was outside talking with Bill and Stuart when I noticed words sprayed on the blackened wall "NIGGER GET OUT OF HERE". I called the investigator to see the message and after further investigation several more signs were discovered. Because this could be a hate crime, the investigator called for additional investigators and ATF.
