

Elevation 370 feet. In T. 9 N., H. 20 W. The first stake of new town of Parker was driven June 6, 1906, by James Haddock, Otis E. Young and C. W. McKee. On Colorado river at Arizona end, Parker branch, A. T. & S. F. H. H.

"This town was named for old Fort Parker." Letter, P. M. Parker. There is no War Dept. record of any such post.

"In 1905 and 1906, I located the Santa Fe railroad line to the river where Parker is now located. There was an old Indian settlement on the river 2 or 3 miles below railroad crossing then known as Parker. William A. Drake who was then Gen'l. Superintendent and Chief Engineer said to me 'Parker, we will give you this town and call it Parker.' So it was put on railroad maps that way." Letter, Earl H. Parker. Phoenix, Mar. 3, 1931.

Several old timers agree that long before the railroad a Captain Parker lived with the Indians a few miles below present Parker. Who he was or what his business nobody seems to know. Some claim he was Indian Agent but records in Wash-ington do not show this to be a fact. Earl Parker's explanation is, of course, correct as to the modern town. P. O. established Aug. 24, 1876, Wm. E. Morford, P. M.

F. W. Croxen, Forest Ranger, says: "Payson was founded, 1882, as Union Park. Was also called Long valley. C. C. Callahan laid it out. John Rise, first Surveyor General of Territory, 1885 to 1889, with his brother Frank, built first house and started a store."

Named after Senator Payson of Illinois, chairman Congression-al Committee, Post Offices and Post Roads. P. 0. established Mar. 3, 1884, Frank C. Rise, P. M. An advertisement in Globe *Silver Belt*, Jan. 15, 1887, calls it "Payson (Green Valley)." Evi-dently Green valley was a common name for Payson.

Station A. T. & S: F. R. R. in extreme southern part Hualpai Ind. Res. Springs are about 6 or 7 miles north of railroad station. So named by early explorers because some peach trees were found growing at the springs.

Spanish tradition says at one time the Jesuit missionaries San Bernardino, Calif., sought a silver mine in that neighborhood. These missionaries planted fruit trees.

Dr. Coues says: "This was Peach Springs which Garces Pozos de San Basilio-St. Basilios Wells. Garces was here 15, 1776." He writes: "June 15, I set out up the arroyo northeast and north. We followed this arroyo and came upon some wells which I named Pozos de San Basilio."

Coues says further: "Peach Springs is so called from the that trees of that name are planted there. Some of them w evidence when I was there on June 18-19, 1881." On the Trail of a Pioneer. Several writers have credited Sitgreaves, 1851, with calling these springs by this name, Peach Springs. A

careful review of everything Sitgreaves or any of his party wrote does not justify this claim.

The Navajo and Hopi Indians had great numbers of peach trees which they undoubtedly secured originally from the Spanish settlements along the Rio Grande in New Mexico. Carson, In stance, in his official report of his campaign against the Navajos in western New Mexico and eastern Arizona in 1862-63 speaks of having "destroyed many thousands of peach trees owned by the Navajos as a reprisal against them for their constant raids Mexican settlement.'

When Elder Brigham F. Duffin, missionary for the Mormon Church, came to Moenkopi in April, 1878, he found "several small groves of peach trees bearing a heavy crop of fruit.' H estimated the trees to be at least six years old at that time. Letter, Nov. 24, 1934.

The writer feels that all these plantings in western Arizona were done by Mormon missionaries who were in this early as 1859-60; Hamblin, Haight, Roundy and others.


Hon. Anson H. Smith of Mohave county writes that the accepted story as to the origin of the peach trees at Pea Springs is that the planting was done by a party of Mormon pioneers who were on the south side of the Colorado looking for an easy crossing back into Utah.

This was in 1852. 'They camped at these springs for several days while exploring the region. A little girl who later became Mrs. Thomas Logan, planted some peach pits near the springs. They came up and from them came the orchard."

Several descendants of the original trees were flour the author visited these springs in October, 1934.

Mormons are credited with having brought the peach trees to the Supai Indians in the Cataract canyon many years ago.

The interesting thing about these trees at Peach Springs fact that although the place was visited by many early explorers, at least three of whom were accompanied by well known botanists, not one of them noted the presence in this far land stranger trees or wondered how and when they were planted.





Elevation 1,080 feet. North bank Salt river. "Å mass meeting of the citizens of Salt River Valley was held on October 20, 1870, for purpose of selecting a suitable piece of unimproved public land for a town site. Darrell Duppa, John Moore, and Martin P. Griffin were appointed as a committee to make the selection. They recommended the North ¹/₂ of sec. 8 T. 1 N., R. 3 E. and :hat the town be called Phoenix." Elliott's *History* of *Arizona*.


"The earliest settlement was probably early in 1868 about 4 miles east of the present town where the flour mill was later erected. First called Swillings, then Helling Mill, after the mill owner, then called East Phoenix. When the question of a name came up Jack Swilling wanted to call it 'Stonewall,' after Stonewall Jackson, because he had been a Confederate soldier. 'Salina' was also suggested. These were turned down. Then Duppa, pointing to the evidence of a former civilization and occupation suggested the name 'Phoenix.' He declared, 'A new city would spring Phoenix-like upon the runs of a former civilization.' The name was accepted." McClintock.

On some early military maps name was spelled "Phenix." Many army officers and others believed it was after the noted army officer and writer John Derby, who wrote under pen name of John Phenix. Derby was for some time commanding officer at Fort Yuma. Theodore Roosevelt once told Col. McClintock that he Roosevelt, had always supposed the city was named after Derby. According to Farish, "The name Phoenix was first used when the Board of Supervisors of Yavapai county formed an election precinct by the name, May 4, 1868."

P.O. established as Phoenix, June 15, 1869, Jack Swilling, P. M. He served until July 8, 1870. John W. Olvany was the Captain Hancock was the third, taking charge February retiring December 12, 1872.

Elevation 5,346 feet. One-time capital, county seat and mining town. On Granite creek. On Ash Fork-Phoenix branch A. T. & S. F. R. R. Originally a branch railroad was built to Prescott "on the sod" from what was then called Prescott Junction, later Seligman, A. T. & S. F. R. R. When Santa Fe built from Ash Fork, this line was abandoned.

Name Prescott was selected at a public meeting on May 30, 1864. Suggested by Secretary of Territory, McCormick, in honor of the historian. Was In January, 1899, was moved to Phoenix. Has at times been called Granite, Gimletville, and Goodwin City.

McClintock says: "The official records in State Adjutant General's office show that J.¹Ross Browne, the writer, was appointed a Captain in the First Arizona Volunteers from 'Prescott, Socorro County, New Mexico.'"

Judge Wells says the first Apache attack on Prescott was March 16, 1864, when Joseph Cosgrave was killed while herding stock, almost in the town itself. P. O. established May 18, 1865, Calvin White, P. M.


"Jose Seavedra and father, first settlers, arrived here in December, 1872, in a two-wheeled oxcart. They built first bridge across Little Colorado to cross a band of sheep. Road to Fort Apache from Zuni crossed here and they made good money allowing freighters to use the bridge. Seavedra filed on a homestead and took out a ditch in 1875." *St. John's Herald*, March, 1926.

"Wilford Woodruff selected a location March 29, 1880, for Mormon colonists about 1½ miles below present St. Johns. Erastus Snow, September 19, 1880, advised changing to higher ground adjoining the Mexican town on west and north, resulting in pres-ent townsite. P. O. named Salem was established, but owing to anti-Mormon feeling, was never opened." McClintock.

Sextus E. Johnson was later appointed P. M. April 5, 1880. Office established under name St. Johns.

There is a letter from Charley Banta dated April 21, 1921, in which he claims he gave the name "St. Johns," stating that he added the "s" to it to make it euphonious.

The fight between the Greer boys and Mexicans, in which Nathan C. Tenney and Jim Vaughn were killed, took place St. John's day, June 24, 1882. Tenney was killed while trying to stop the fight. Place said to have first been called "El Vadito," the little ford. See Colorado Bridge.

Huning moved to Santa Barbara, California, where he died. Cooley moved back on to the Apache Reservation where he died, March 15, 1915.


Corydon E. Cooley, who was a government scout in Crook's campaigns, 1872 and 1873, located on what is now called Showlow creek about 1875. He and Marion Clark made the settlement together. They decided later there was room for but one location, so they agreed to play a game of Seven-Up to decide which of them should move. When the last hand was dealt Cooley needed but one point to win. Clark ran his cards over and said: "If you can show low you win." Cooley threw down his and said, "Showlow it is." Has been called Showlow ever since. Cooley told the author this story at Fort Apache in 1880.

Clark later moved up the creek near present town of and located a ranch where he lived for many years.





Hinton says this place was first called "Ebles ranch." Fish says: "There was a fight here, 1864, between a bunch of soldiers under Lieut. Monteith and some Mohave and Tonto Apaches. They left without burying the dead Indians. Later on Major Willis sent a scouting party out which found and buried the dead whose bones and skulls were lying round everywhere. Major Willis then named it Skull valley." This is doubtless the true story of this name. P. O. established April 26, 1869, John C. Dunn, P. M.


"Just as the new name was finding its way into use, Charles T. Hayden, father of Senator Carl Hayden, happened along looking for a location.

""Don Carlos,' as he was called by old timers, was a trader and promoter, not a farmer. It looked like a good point for a store, so he opened one. Likewise he started a blacksmith and wagon shop; also a grist mill with water power from the canal. The river was often unfordable, and so Hayden operated a ferry with a long rope. Soon the place was known as 'Hayden's Ferry,' and so showed on many early maps. But the name 'Tempe' prevailed and the theme of a Greek poet found a place in the Arizona desert." Hinton.


Hinton always wrote this name "La Tempe," but as McClintock remarks, "the word is not Spanish and should be pronounced as spelled: Tempee."

"Tuba is a veritable oasis—a patch of green in the midst of a forbidding desert. It has been the seat of an agricultural population long antedating the discovery of America. The Spanish padres found the ancestors of the Hopi cultivating corn and cot-ton in fields centuries old. There is a giant spring here." Gregory.

McClintock writes: "In 1879, John W. Young built a woolen mill here. It had 192 spindles. Yarn was first made in Jan., 1880. Abandoned principally because the Indians would not bring their wool to it; also due to lack of satisfactory laborers in the mill." Fish says this mill was at Moenkopi.

"June 20, 1892, Lot Smith was here shot and killed by Navajo Indians following a quarrel over grazing of Indian sheep. McClintock has some very interesting tales about Smith and his activities. Thomas W. Brookbank was first P. M., July 3, 1884.

#### Yuma

#### Yuma County

Elevation 137 feet. On Colorado river, southwest corner of State. Surveyed and survey filed at San Diego, 1854. California collected taxes on it for several years. Said to have been the only occupied place in 1854, in what is now Arizona. The author feels sure that Tubac antedated it by several years.

"While we were camped on the banks of the Colorado river, in July, 1854, we concluded to locate a town site on the strip of land opposite Fort Yuma. The actual survey showed 936 acres and this was quite large enough for a town site." Col. Poston, *Overland Monthly*, July, 1894.

Town first called Colorado City, also Arizona City, then Yuma City. On east side of river. An act of Territorial legislature, Feb. 2, 1873, reads as follows: "An Act, to change the name of Arizona City. Be it enacted, etc., that the name of Arizona City, the county seat of Yuma county, be, and is hereby, changed to Yuma, and shall be known as such from and after the passage of this act."

P. O. records at Washington show that John B. Dow was appointed P. M. at Colorado City March 17, 1858. It was then in Doña Ana county, New Mexico, and Dow's commission was issued that way.

These official records also show the post office was called Yuma before the passage of the legislative act in 1873 for the first post office was established under name Yuma, October 16, 1866, Francis Hutton, P. M.

"All authorities agree that it was called Colorado City at first. The big flood of 1862 practically wiped the village out and the rebuilt town was called Arizona City." McClintock.

In 1867, General J. F. Rusling wrote of this place:


"Directly opposite Fort Yuma, on eastern bank of Colorado, stands Arizona City, a straggling collection of adobe houses con-taining perhaps 200 inhabitants. Here, and at Fort Yuma, are located the government storehouses, shops, corrals, etc., as the grand depot for all the posts in Arizona. Hence considerable business centers here. But it is chiefly of a military nature and if the post and depot were removed, the city as such would speedily subside into its original sandhills. Being at junction of the Gila and Colorado, where the main route of travel crosses the latter, it is also the first place of any importance on the Colorado itself, and hence would seem to be well located for business, if Arizona had any business to speak of."

In 1874, the legislature authorized the Territorial Penitentiary Commissioners to purchase—"not less than 10 acres of land on which to locate the Territorial Penitentiary." This was first location of the Arizona Penal institution. Opened for business July 1, 1876. Writing of Yuma and its history, Donald Page, in *Arizona Historical Review*, April, 1930, says:

"Garces received his crown of martyrdom at the hands of the Yuma Indians, at the newly established mission of La Purisima Concepción, close to the site of Fort Yuma, on July 17, 1781, when the Spanish Padres, settlers, and soldiers at that place and at San Pedro y San Pablo de Bicuner, 8 leagues down the Colorado river, were all massacred.

"The padre's body was removed to San Pedro de Tubutama, where it was reinterred with all the honors due a fallen 'Soldier of the Cross.' And thus passed Tucson's founder." See Fort Yuma, also San Dionisio.
